## PUT ON POLICE BOAT

The Canadian officers are without means to cope with the thieves.

### COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

#### What is Going On in the Business World—The Markets.

The United States peanut crop for last year is estimated at 11,600,000 bushels, valued at \$2,000,000. The first sale of the 1907 Georgia crop was sold at 20 cents per bushel, and the second sale at 22 cents per bushel. The Cooper Oil smelter now handles 500 tons a day, and preparations are being made to double the output this year.  
A deal is said to be on for the sale of the Imperial Silver Mining Company's holdings, just-up subscribers to be given a substantial dividend.  
The St. Paul Fire and Marine Insurance Company of St. Paul, Minn., having made the necessary deposits at Ottawa, is about to commence business in Canada.  
The merger of the Utah, Idaho and West Idaho Sugar Company has been completed under title of the Idaho Sugar Co., with capital of \$12,000,000, under Utah laws. The company has been organized with Joseph F. South as president and T. H. Cutler, treasurer.  
It is estimated by the American Iron and Steel Association, from figures gathered from manufacturers, that there were produced in the United States during the first half of 1907 15,476,000 gross tons, or an increase of something over 750,000 gross tons above the record for the first half of 1906, while during the first half of this year there were produced only 12,782,000 gross tons.  
The syndicate of New York and Canadian capitalists including Mr. William Van Horne and William Lumsden Ball, which for some time has been engaged in traction street, harbor improvement undertakings in Brazil, has last placed its operations to steam railroads under consideration. The syndicate is said to have under consideration the construction of a line of 2,000 miles of railway from Montreal to connect and extend existing lines.

#### Confessed To Robbery.

Somerville, Ont., Aug. 1.—The authorities here have been notified that Earl Bolton Brown, arrested at Port Huron, has confessed to the officers that he had committed a robbery at Somerville, Ont., July 24th. Bolton, when arrested, had in his possession jewelry, razors and gold chains, which he admitted taking from a hardware store here. He was released from Central Prison, Toronto, only in February, after serving time for larceny.

#### Another Coal Bed.

Sydney, N.S., Aug. 1.—It is learned that the staff of men engaged by the Dominion Iron and Steel company in boring operations at South Bar, just across the harbor from North Sydney, have found very good indications of coal after reaching a depth of about six hundred feet. It is anticipated from these indications that the mine will be reached at a depth of an extra two hundred feet.

#### Surrounded Barracks.

Seoul, Aug. 1.—At ten o'clock, last night, Japanese troops surrounded the Korean barracks, after an imperial proclamation had been issued, disbanded the Korean army, composed of seven thousand men.

## SUFFLED THE ROLLS

### THE NAMES WERE IMPROPERLY PUT ON IT.

The Town Clerk Says it Was Not Fraud—But the Assessor Refused to Do the Work.  
Trenton, July 31.—The attention of the attorney-general's department has been called to some startling irregularities in the preparation of the voters' list for the town of Trenton. The manhood franchise part of the list, the fruitful source of trouble and political chicanery, has been loaded up with no less than 310 illegal and unauthorized names. As hung up by the assessor, it contains the names of 376 alleged manhood franchise voters, while the assessment roll, as returned by the court of revision on November 14th, the roll from which the voters' list should have been transcribed, contained only sixty-six names of that class of voters. The unwarranted preparation of the list has prompted inquiries and investigations. These disclosed the further fact that the assessment roll returned in September, 1906, contained a big "blow out" on Thursday night. 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## GIVEN MONTH IN JAIL

### ENGLISHMAN WHO STRUCK SCOTCHMAN IN FACE.

Arthur Osborne Found That It Did Not Pay to Use His Fists Too Freely.

Osborne, a young Englishman, who boards on Queen street, and who has only been in this country a short time, was accused in the police court this morning of assaulting Alexander McGregor, a god-hearted Scotchman, who was the one referred to in last night's Whig, the row taking place at the foot of Queen street, where McGregor was at work in a drain. Osborne was not employed on the job. The magistrate found Osborne guilty and sentenced him to one month in jail without the option of a fine. In the witness box McGregor said that he was working in a drain, for the city, at the foot of Queen street, between one and two o'clock on Wednesday afternoon. Osborne came up to him and said, "I'll kill you yet, you scoundrel." Osborne, "Go away, I don't want anything to do with you. I want to stay at my work." McGregor said that the accused afterwards struck him twice on the blow being given on a both men were standing in front of the foreman of the job. This was the second time that Osborne had assaulted him. "He's telling a lot of falsehoods," said Osborne, to the magistrate, after McGregor had told his story. "Didn't you strike me with a shovel?" asked Osborne of McGregor. "I only raised a shovel in self-defence," was McGregor's reply. In Ernest Robert's dock in the city engineer's office said that McGregor had asked Osborne to go away. He saw Osborne strike McGregor. Walter Patterson, Bell, a young Englishman, said that he was with Osborne when the row occurred. He and Osborne boarded at 102 Queen street, and early Wednesday morning left the house together. They went to where the men were working. The driver and he saw Osborne push McGregor. The magistrate said that from the evidence given he was convinced that Osborne had been the aggressor in the case. He had no right to interfere with the man in his work and said that a month in jail would be a good thing for the accused. Osborne was placed under arrest at his boarding house by Acting Detective James Batson and Constable John Naylor, McGregor having called at the police court and secured a warrant for Osborne's arrest. Edward DeWolfe, a traveller, was recommended to work on a charge of drunkenness. He was found by Police Constable Hughes at an early hour this morning in a doorway near the corner of Brock and King streets.

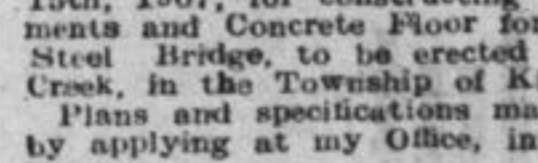
