FRUITLESS SEARCH

NO TRACE OF VICTIMS OF VERENNES TRAGEDY

To Search River Surface—Fleet of Tugs, Launches and Row-boats to Hunt From Centre-Colour Up To-Day.

Verennes, Aug. 7.—Another day of search has passed by and still the searchers for the bodies of Shirley Davidson and Miss Hingston are as far as ever from solving the mystery of their death or the place where their bodies lie. All hope of finding the bodies by dragging the river was abandoned last evening after an arduous day's work on the river, and a council was held at which it was decided that this morning the dragging of the river should be abandoned and a systematic search of the surface undertaken. It is thought that by now, almost three days since the disappearance, the bodies of the victims may have risen to the surface.

At daylight a small fleet of tugs and launches proceeded down the river. The fleet consisted of about fifteen boats, and they were slowly returning, searching every nook and corner of the shore, and islands on their way.

The conviction that the accident occurred at the foot of the island, was caused by examination of the boat, which showed that the latter sails were tied up and, which is accepted by the fishermen as proof that the boat was being headed up the river when the fatality occurred.

APPOINTED MEAT INSPECTOR.

W. A. McGill, V.S., Kingston, Gets a Position.

W. A. McGill, V.S., has been appointed a meat inspector by the Dominion government, at a salary of \$1,200 per year. The district in which he will be engaged, has not been announced, but he will receive instructions as to this later. He will commence his new duties on September 3rd.

The government, some time ago, decided to appoint inspectors in the various centres, and it was necessary for all applicants for the position, to take a special course in a college at Chicago. Mr. McGill took this course, and made an excellent showing. He is also a graduate of Queen's Veterinary College, and was considered very clever. He is a member of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, and his appointment will not necessitate his resigning from this position.

Although Mr. McGill has received no word as to the district in which he will be engaged, he may be called upon to leave the city, and, at any rate, he will be compelled to be out of town a great deal.

LADY BAREHEADED

RECTOR REPRIMANDS HER FOR BREAKING RULES.

Sensation Created in St. Barnabas' Church, St. Catharines—Made No Move to Retire.

St. Catharines, Ont., Aug. 7.—Quite a sensation was caused at the evening service in St. Barnabas' church by the appearance in church of a lady in her bare head. In the course of his sermon, the rector, Rev. R. Barrington Nevitt, severely reprimanded her for so appearing in church, and called attention to the fact that the church with their heads uncovered was one of the most stringent of the lesser rules of the Anglican church, and had come down from apostolic times. The lady, who is a stranger in St. Catharines, remained in church during the entire service and made no move to retire, even after she was reprimanded by the rector.

RESULT OF BAD WIRING.

Candles Being Used in Woodstock, N.B.

Woodstock, N.B., Aug. 7.—For a score of years this town has not been lit at evening. A hurried search has been made in warehouses and storage rooms for lamps and candles to be used in dwelling houses and business places, and only such crude lighting will be available for some weeks to come. This is the outcome of the recent series of fires due to wires. The secretary of the Brunswick Insurance Company that if their plant were started he would recommend that all insurance in the town be immediately cancelled. The companies, therefore, decided to shut down the entire electric light system of the town until such time as satisfactory arrangements can be effected and the rewiring of the town completed.

Hamilton, Ont., Aug. 7.—Magistrate Jelle, this morning, gave his decision in the case of James Henry, a Toronto man, charged with practicing dentistry without being a member of the Royal College of Dental Surgeons.

Henry is the proprietor of the Hamilton Dental Parlor, but employed qualified dentists to do his work for him. The authorities of the college claimed that this did not exempt him from having to be himself, a graduate of the college, and after taking a week to think the matter over, the magistrate agreed with them and imposed a fine of \$20 and costs, the alternative being a month in jail. An appeal will be entered.

To Go To Three Children.

Kingville, Ont., Aug. 7.—Application has been made in the surrogate court to probate the will of the late Dr. S. A. King. The inventory which accompanies the application places the value of the estate at \$157,000. The estate is to be divided equally among the three children. The government will receive over \$9,000 in succession dues.

Cutworm is New Pest.

Leamington, Ont., Aug. 7.—L. Casat, the representative of the Ontario Agricultural College, who has been making an investigation of the new pest which has been destroying crops near here, classifies it as the cutworm, which did great damage on the Pacific coast in 1900.

Mitchell George, an Indian employed by the Calumet company, at Grenville Island, is at the general hospital, suffering from a fractured leg. While at work, Tuesday, a heavy piece of timber fell on his leg, with the result of a severe laceration. He is doing as well as can be expected.

Many Were Killed.

Berlin, Aug. 7.—A passenger train was derailed, last night, between Post and Thon. The two engines were overturned, and three cars were demolished. Up to noon twenty bodies have been recovered from the wreck.

OPENING OF PARLIAMENT.

Second Week in November Date Fixed on.

Ottawa, Aug. 7.—A prominent politician, probably one of the best posted in Quebec, outside of the ministry, to-day gave it as his opinion that Parliament would be summoned to meet not later than the second week in November. Indeed, he believed, he said, "It is the policy of the prime minister not only to meet the house early, but to have all government business ready to bring down within the first two weeks of the session. For instance, we may have the budget speech, with Mr. Fielding's announcement of a new French treaty, during the second week of the session. All the departments are peering away at their reports, so that, as far as the government business is concerned, the work of the session could be put through by Christmas. No. 1 don't care if it will, but that will be the position of affairs, parliament may propose in March, and again, of course, it may be a long session. It all depends on what the opposition bring forward."
