BIG FORGERY

A Plot Unearthed In New York.

INVOLVED ESTATE

WORTH A MILLION—FORGED DEEDS ARE FILED.

Woman Named in Deeds Believed
to Be a Myth—Police Think It
Work of Persons Who Make It
a Business to Get Bonds For
Criminals.

New York, Aug. 8.—Details of an
alleged forgery plot said to have in-
volved the transferring of real estate
in this city valued at million dol-
lars were told, to-day, by witnesses
called at the Tombs police court to
testify in the cases of John Fough
and Paul Moore.

Charles Edgar Appleby, of Glen
Cove, L.I., whose wealth is estimated
at \$25,000,000, was surprised the
other day to read in a paper a notice
of a real estate transfer setting
forth that he had sold one of his
tenements to "Edith Stonebridge." It
was found that a forged deed had
been filed in the office of the register
of deeds.

By chance, it is said, the
officials of the district attorney's of-
fice, who they say are trying to uncover
one of the boldest plots ever known
and it is predicted that much val-
uable real estate in the heart of Man-
hattan will prove to have been af-
fected.

Moore filed the Appleby deed. He
is a searcher in the employ of a law
firm and works in the registrar's
office. He said Bouge had it to him
to file. Bouge, in turn, said Edith
Stonebridge asked him to have it
filed. The Stonebridge woman is be-
lieved to be a myth.

The police believe the practice of
forging forged deeds has been prac-
ticed by persons making a business of
providing bonds for persons arrested.
It was suggested that the deed to
the Appleby property was made in the
belief that the aged millionaire would
die soon and after his death it could
not be proved fraudulent, being duly
recorded.

WILL LIVE LONG.

Physician Says Oil King Will
See Ninety-four Years.

New York, Aug. 8.—That John D.
Rockefeller will live to be more than
ninety-four years of age, is the pre-
diction of Dr. H. F. Biggar, his fam-
ily physician, according to a Cleveland
dispatch to the American.

"He is the best trained athlete in
the sixty-year-old class in the world
today, and he is sixty-eight at that," says the doctor. "I tell you,
Mr. Rockefeller has been born twice
physically, and he is only fourteen
years old now. He is growing up
again, and growing up scientifically,
adding to his muscle, to his lungs, to
his heart power with every breath of
fresh air he takes on Forest Hill."

The doctor says it cost Mr. Rock-
efeller \$5,000,000 for his second life. In
1892 he was completely broken down,
but diet and exercise have rejuvenat-
ed him early in September.

Oliver Brusseau will spend the next
