WON'T STAND FOR IT BOARD OF EDUCATION WANTS MR. KIDD.

It Will Refuse to Part With Him—Government Should Have Provided a Decent Amount of Money For Pedagogy School. "Every attempt on the part of Queen's authorities or the superintendent of education, Mr. South, to have Inspector W. G. Kidd, of the public schools, resign, will meet with vigorous opposition from us," said a member of the board of education.

As far as can be ascertained, the majority of the trustees will refuse to part with Mr. Kidd, no matter what the faculty of pedagogy offers. A new inspector might be got who would be lacking on the side where Mr. Kidd is strong.

Let the Ontario government give Queen's a grant sufficient to engage a capable staff, so that there need be no doubling up," said a trustee.

MARINE NEWS. The Items Gathered About the Harbor.

The schooner Dundee, loaded with stone from Toronto, cleared from the penitentiary. The gasoline launch, What Next, that was sunk here a week or so ago, came up from Alexandria Bay last night. The yacht has been overhauled and is now running as fast as ever. M. T. Co's. The tug Mary arrived from Montreal, with two barges, and cleared for Montreal, with two grain laden barges, the steamer Rosemont will arrive, from Fort William, Sunday, with wheat. Swift's Steamer Belleville, up, steamer Rideau Queen, from Ottawa, to-night. The steamer Nevada, which ran aground near Farran's Point, was towed to Kingston, last night, by the steamer Donnelly, and will go into the government dry dock at once.
