INSOMNIA SEIZED WITH PAINS POISON IN THE MORNING MEAL
And Eight of Nine Calgary People Were Taken Ill—Chinaman Arrested.
Regina, Aug. 10.—A sensation was caused in the city by the news that a number of boarders at W. J. Steele's restaurant had been poisoned by a solution of arsenic in porridge. It appears Proprietor Steele sent a quantity of oatmeal to the Chinese proprietor of an adjacent eating-house. The oatmeal was daily returned, and Steele used some to cook the morning meal. Mrs. Steele and eight or nine guests ate the porridge, and almost immediately afterwards were seized with pains. Doctors Thompson and Meek visited them, though three of the sufferers, Harry Stewart, Cyrus Winters and John Fortune, are yet in danger. The oatmeal was confiscated and a portion submitted to Dr. Charlton, who certified to the presence of arsenic. The Chinaman, known here as "Mac," was arrested. It is said that an invoice showing he purchased two weeks ago a quantity of oatmeal all of which had been used. What valid reason he had to borrow oatmeal, with a stock already in his possession, remains a mystery.

MANY FIRMS INVOLVED.
Music Hall Stars to Be Ruled By Trust.
Paris, Aug. 10.—While Messrs. Klav & Erlanger are talking over their Music Hall trust, a number of other theatrical managers have formed one which controls the principal halls in Europe. Important cities of continental Europe. H. B. Martelli, the well-known manager of the Bouffes du Nord, is the originator of the scheme, spokesman of the trust. Associated with him are good names: J. Williams, who represents a combination known as the United Booking Office of America, in which the Bouffes du Nord, Hammerstein, Berger, the Olympia Parisiana and Primitiva Music Halls; Mr. Steiner, of the Boncher, in Vienna, and other managers of music halls in Dresden, Copenhagen, Munich, Budapest, Frankfurt, Cologne and all the managers and managers in Amsterdam, Brussels, Rome, Naples, St. Petersburg and towns of provincial France.
"Our object," Mr. Martelli declared, "is to put a stop to the competition of the Music Hall artists have a single one. Music hall artists have a rush for talent; but talent, even when it gets a high salary, dislikes a long rest. It, therefore, occurred to me that a powerful combine, which could insure long engagements for good 'turns' might be able to get those 'turns' at a far cheaper rate than those which they are now obtainable.
"London is not represented in our combine yet, but I hope to number many of the provincial ones in it before long."

Archduke Has No Designs.
Vienna, Aug. 10.—The ex-Archduke Leopold, Salvoir of Austria, has written to a friend in Vienna declaring that there is no truth in the report that he is a candidate for a Balkan throne.
He states: "I prefer to live a free French citizen with the blood of a palace revolution."
Herr Leopold Weillinger, as he is now called, is at present studying botany and mathematics in Paris.
Franz Weillinger, from whom he recently obtained a divorce, is claiming allowance from him. Mile. Adarovitch, as she was known when in the stage, is staying in Vienna with her sister, who is an actress. She has a life interest in \$200,000 placed in the bank for her before marriage, but declares that she is entitled to more, as the ex-archduke introduced her to the Simple Life set, quarrels about which led to the divorce. The ex-archduke receives an allowance of \$7,500 a year from his father.

Fire Brigade Disbanded.
London, Aug. 10.—The Helston fire brigade has been disbanded, because of the heavy premiums demanded for the firemen by insurance companies under the new compensation act.

OTHER RIOTS CONTINUE.
Priests Defend Cardinal's Palace.
Rome, Aug. 10.—Notwithstanding the Senate's concession by which Signor Nasi is permitted to remain in prison at his own private residence, instead of at the Regio di Cogli Prison, popular tumults in Sicily and the adjacent regions still preoccupy the authorities.
At Messina last night rioters plunged the city in darkness, hurled the customs officers' huts into the sea and stoned the Carabinieri and a party landed from the warship Sardegna. About thirty persons were wounded.
Furious riots, in which revolvers were freely fired and several soldiers and a brigadier were struck down, broke out at the same time across the straits at Reggio di Calabria. The mob stormed the cardinal-archbishop's palace, wrecking all the windows as well as the clock at the cathedral.
Cardinal Portanova called upon the commander of the Carabinieri to disperse the malcontents, but when that official pleaded inability for want of reinforcements, priests and seminarists beset the roof and hurled down bricks and tiles on the heads of the invaders.
The mob then rushed forward to seize the Liberal Confederation's buildings, but their volleys of stones were answered with a shower of chairs, tables, billiard balls and Champagne bottles that they had to beat a hasty retreat.
The visitors at the club were luckily unhurt, though the ceiling on an upper room was perforated with pistol shots.

Juvenile Suicide.
Berlin, Aug. 10.—The alarming increase of suicide among school children and very young people in Germany is receiving a fresh illustration by the suicide of a schoolboy at Heilbronn. The lad, who was 15, having heard from his form master that he had failed to pass a certain examination, drew a revolver from his pocket, and shot himself through the head in the presence of the entire school.
Professor Eulenburg, the eminent authority on nervous diseases, draws attention to the serious state of affairs which these frequently recurring suicides among children indicate. He states that during the last twelve years he has traced 1,252 cases of children who have committed suicide, of whom more than half have been driven to this act by failure to pass school examinations or to work at school.

Revives Beneath Knife.
Vienna, Aug. 10.—Johann Kovacs, a railway station porter at Bihar, in Hungary, had yesterday a narrow escape of being dissected alive.
Two days ago he fell down unconscious while at work, and was taken to the hospital. The doctors pronounced him dead, and a post-mortem was decided on for which all preparations were made, the body being put on the dissecting table, where a lecture was delivered over it to the students before the body was opened.
At the first prick of the knife Kovacs awoke with a start, and as soon as he realized the position, endeavored to assault the surgeon who held the dissecting knife. He had to be forcibly restrained by the doctors.

Milan, Aug. 10.—Fifty-two young German students belonging to St. Bonifacio College, Casale, Monferrato, who are passing their midsummer holidays at the Salesian College in Intra, set out yesterday laden with provisions for a couple of days' ramble in the Aurano mountains in company with the rector and professional staff.
While climbing Mount Sigletto, a height of over 5,000 feet, they were suddenly overtaken by a terrific thunder-storm. The whole party was struck to the earth by lightning. Two were killed instantaneously, the bodies being completely carbonized, while four others were so horribly injured that their lives are despaired of.
