### THE SEDUCTIVE SUNDAY Some of the Soda Fountain Men in New York.

There is always the soda water fountain. Let's go and have a soda, used not to mean much. You went and had a glass of fizzy water, and if you sipped a little variety you took it through a straw. No need to resort to a straw now for variety. A visit to the soda fountain nowadays means a wide choice almost in drinkables, and eatables, too, for that matter, as the choice of an average menu. Chopped nuts of all kinds, chopped figs, dates, peaches, bananas and all the other fruits in their time; ice cream, maple syrup, malted milk powder, eggs, chocolate, mineral waters, beef juice—these are a few of the things that are fully appreciated, said Henry J. Young, who served in the system over the soda water counter of the day. And that New Yorkers appreciate the modern developments of the "soft drink" is shown by the crowds that often surround the soda water counter.

"It is 'sundae' or 'soud' or 'Sunday'?" asked an inquisitive man of the artist who was composing one for him. It is an American missionary, who has lived in China for more than thirty years. He was the most far-sighted thing that has been done in American statesmanship that I know of, for the reason that China for the next generation or two is going to prove a veritable El Dorado for the employment of American capital and the trading of American goods. Though China has been asleep for 4000 years, her 450,000,000 people are going to be developed sufficiently to want things this country has to sell.

"The United States would do well to go further and encourage the coming to this country of Chinese students. There are thousands of young Chinamen who would rather come here than anywhere else on the globe, not even excepting Japan. They know that the Japs copied our inventions, and as they wish to study them also, at first hand. The young men of to-day in China are the statesmen of to-morrow, and it would be good policy to treat them well. To use a homely simile, it is like a great boiling caldron of sugar; just now there is nothing but black sludge on the top, but this will give way to the finer stuff. The people consider the Tartars, who have governed them so long, as foreigners, and will throw off the yoke if they can. A mighty revolution will come, perhaps bloody. Education, liberty and individuality are becoming dearer to the Chinese, who are very intelligent. For a long time I have preached that thirty years from now the revolution will have been completed, and that China thereafter will be for the Chinese."—Washington Post.

### SOME BIG FEES PAID. Fee For Physician Who Effected Difficult Cure.

Some fault has been found with the gift of \$250,000 made by way of honorarium to a physician in respect of his services in Egypt. But that a way Britain has in rewarding distinguished public services, and the sum paid to Lord Cromer and Lord Kitchener are not large in comparison with the fees paid great physicians for private professional attendance. On one occasion, at least, a physician received a million dollars for a single cure, and \$200,000 was paid in another case. A Philadelphia physician, however, holds the record for high charges, a case of \$1,500 being demanded and paid for a case of a child who had a disease lasting one minute. Dr. Jenner got \$50,000 for attending King Edward for a few weeks when his Majesty then Prince of Wales was sick. Two days' attendance on the late Czar was worth \$75,000 to a Moscow physician; and for attending the Emperor of Russia, a physician received \$1,000,000. Dr. Morell MacKenzie presented a bill for \$100,000 and was paid without a murmur. Dr. Thomas Dimdale received a pension of \$2,500 and a cash gift of \$50,000 for vaccinating a country of Russia. The total value in dollars and cents of all these expert services would not amount to one half the value of Lord Cromer's services to Egypt, and cannot be said that he was overpaid. That he has many years before him in which to enjoy his fortune is the universal wish.

### Synopsis of Canadian Northwest HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

Any person numbered section of Dominion lands in Manitoba or the North-West Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may homestead by any person the sole head of a family, or male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 acres, more or less. Application for homestead entry must be made in person by the applicant at the office of the local Agent, or Sub-Agent, or by proxy may, however, be made on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader. An application for entry or inspection may be made personally at any Sub-Agent's office, or by letter to the local Agent by the Sub-Agent, at the expense of the applicant, and if the land applied for is vacant on receipt of the telegram and application to have priority and land will be held until the necessary papers to complete the transaction are received by mail. In case of "personation" the entry will be annulled and the applicant will forfeit all priority of claim. An application for inspection must be made in person. The applicant must be eligible for homestead entry, and only one application for inspection will be received from an individual until that application has been issued. A homesteader whose entry is in good standing and not liable to cancellation, may, subject to approval of Department, relinquish in favor of father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister, if eligible, but to no one else. Where an entry is summarily cancelled or annulled, the homesteader is not entitled to a refund of cancellation proceedings, the applicant for inspection will be entitled to priority of entry. Applicants for inspection must state in their application the name of the person to whom the land is to be transferred, and if subsequently the statement is found to be incorrect in material particulars, the applicant will lose any priority of entry, and the land will be held until the necessary papers to complete the transaction are received by mail. A settler is required to perform the conditions of a homestead entry upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother. Applicants for inspection must state in their application the name of the person to whom the land is to be transferred, and if subsequently the statement is found to be incorrect in material particulars, the applicant will lose any priority of entry, and the land will be held until the necessary papers to complete the transaction are received by mail. A settler is required to perform the conditions of a homestead entry upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.
