A BOND SALE FAILURE.

The city of New York has experienced a second bond sale failure during the current summer, the later one being only a trifle less humiliating than that of June 28th. On the former date, out of a total of \$29,000,000 in municipal securities offered, only about \$2,000,000 was bid for this week bids came in for \$2,713,485 out of a total of \$15,000,000 offered. It is significant, too, that in August the average price had dropped to 100.004 from 100.094 in June; sixteen months previous the bids averaged 108.042 for the same class of city stock.

PRISONERS' TREATMENT.

T. W. Crothers, barrister, St. Thomas, has written to the attorney-general's department about the practice of placing prisoners in the dock while on trial, and protesting against throwing prisoners into foul, unsanitary police cells before the trial. This objection to the dock has from time to time been much discussed. There may be a certain obliquity in connection with it, but there is also that in connection with the arrest, that only one prisoner should be in the dock at a time, that is to say, an accused person should not be herded in the dock along with a number of drunks and fallen women, for instance. It is argued that the dock is a safer place for a prisoner than in a seat beside his lawyer, and judge and witnesses have a better opportunity of seeing him there. We cannot but sympathize with him, says the Hamilton Times, in his protest against the hardships inflicted upon untried persons by consigning them to dirty, comfortable cells. This is a matter that the government should take up at once. Untried, and consequently presumably innocent, persons should receive decent treatment, at least until they are found guilty.

NOT ALL FAILURE.

The Anglican Bishop of Madras has been writing frankly to the Nineteenth Century Review, and for the first time the world receives a frank and comprehensive estimate of Christian mission work in Southern India, which can freely be accepted as an index for all of that teeming nation. The churches receive from missionaries a wealth of detail regarding stations and experiences with individuals, but rarely an analysis of progress as applied to the heathen masses and to the ultimate hope of their conversion generally. But the Christianity which has survived a century of rebuff and discouragement in the east can safely invite the frankest of statements and criticism, since they would breed fresh resolution rather than discouragement.

FINED FOR QUITTING.

STURGEON FALLS PAPER MILLS SHUT DOWN.

No Signs of Settlement—Management Refuses to Meet Committee Not Composed Exclusively of Former Employees.

North Bay, Aug. 15.—The plant of the Imperial Paper Mills Co., at Sturgeon Falls is still practically shut down although an attempt is being made to operate the pulp mill, but with indifferent results. The local magistrate has imposed a fine of ten dollars and costs upon James Murray, dynamo tender, for deserting his post and endangering the property of the mill. Murray was not on strike with the others, and as a result of this judgment actions have been entered against six other employees. The strike has injured the town, and business is practically at a standstill, but settlement seems as distant as ever, the mill management refusing to meet any committee not composed entirely of employees engaged in the mill. The paper makers have nearly all accepted positions elsewhere, and the management will not meet the officials of the international union. The officers of the local pulp workers' union, were all discharged prior to the strike, and according to the mandate of the mill management are not eligible for the conciliation committee.
