Fears Roosevelt Might Become Such.

A SENATOR'S FEARS

MAY BE KEPT AT WASHINGTON FOR LIFE.

Senator Guggenheim thinks the United States is being Anglicized—People Are Fond of Being Presented at Court—Imitating Methods of Royalty.

Paris, Aug. 21.—There is a crisis approaching in the United States, said Solomon B. Guggenheim of New York, to-day. "If President Roosevelt can be re-elected attempts will be made to assure him a permanent tenure of that office. The consequences of so great a departure from American and republican tradition are too great and far-reaching to be estimated."

Next to the Rockefeller group, there is probably nowhere in America so vast an aggregation of family wealth as that which is held by the seven Guggenheim brothers. They control the big smelter combine. It is supposed they were to divide their wealth they would have a notable, quotable fortune of about \$100,000,000 each—a fortune of \$700,000,000 under the control of a family council.

"Usually speaking," said Mr. Guggenheim, "there are now three political parties in the United States. One, of course, will place William Jennings Bryan in the field for president. The second party is the republican party as Taft to head the republican party as the candidate to succeed Mr. Roosevelt."

"But there is still a strong third-party party for Roosevelt, in spite of his announced determination not to run again."

"As I have said, if Mr. Roosevelt can be prevailed upon to run, and if he is elected, there is a strong inclination that an endeavor will be made to keep him in the presidency for life."

"This may seem to be a revolutionary sort of talk for a business man to indulge in but look at the way things are going now in our democratic country. The changes in the ordinary customs of life at the White House in the past five years will serve very well to illustrate what I mean. They show a very great and pronounced tendency to form our morals on the style which prevails in European capitals and courts."

"At the White House there seems to be a rapidly growing tendency to make social life there more and more like that of a royal court."

"The fact is that many members of our rich and intelligent classes, when they visit Europe, are not satisfied until they have been presented at some court. To have been presented at some royal drawing room of the king of Britain and Ireland, emperor of India, and of the dominions beyond the seas, is to people of this class the very height and climax of social success. The distinction gives their social position at home an indelible seal of pre-eminence. They scheme for this honor, they spend vast sums in endeavoring to gain it."

"Very well, when such Americans go home to the United States, they like to renew their experiences. They will go to the trouble and undergo the difficulties of being asked to share in the 'drawing-room.' They are trying their best—and with a good deal of success—to make the White House and the social function a sort of a fashionable resort."

"If you like it better, I will call it running it, a kind of half-way house between the real house of London society. Then, again, intermarriages between the aristocracy and the bourgeoisie."

CAUGHT MEN

An Episode At The Napanee Station.

THIEVES SECURED

AND THE BOOTY FOUND UPON THEM.

The Arrests Were Made Without Much Trouble By Chief Graham and His Staff—The Young Fellows Had Stolen Jewelry in Belleville—Taken Back For Trial.

One of Most Influential in Mikado's Council.

The Marquis Hirobumi Ito, the famous Japanese reconstructive statesman, was born away back in the old time Japanese regime in the year 1838. He has been four times the head of the Japanese ministerial cabinet, and is to-day one of the most influential of the elder statesmen in the mikado's council. He studied in London in 1863, and after returning to his native country became minister of the province of Hiogo in 1868. Marquis Ito became vice-minister of finance in 1890. He resigned temporarily from public life shortly after this. In 1892 and 1893 he visited Europe and was made a G.C.B. by King Edward in 1902. His home is in Tokyo.

BLEW IT UP HIMSELF

Sensational Suggestions as to Recent Outrage in Ireland.

London, Aug. 21.—In the House of Commons, yesterday, Irish members made the sensational suggestion that Lord Ashdown blew up his own house for political purposes. Jeremiah McVeagh, nationalist member from Down, asked Mr. Birrell, secretary for Ireland, whether it was inquired of Lord Ashdown by his own house in 1892 and 1901 he visited Europe and was made a G.C.B. by King Edward in 1902. NO SIGNS OF DRUGGING.

Man in a "Trance"—Mystery to Experts.

Paris, Aug. 21.—The mystery of the young man found on Friday morning of last week in a trance on the steps of the Church of St. Non le Breche becomes more and more perplexing. He awoke suddenly in hospital yesterday, and declared that he could remember nothing about the case. He said that he was a native of Paris, named Klein, that he fell ill in New York and was sent back to France by Mrs. Pierpont Morgan, who gave him a check for \$125, telling him only to cash it when all other resources had failed. This check, he declares, has been stolen.

Klein arrived in Paris, he says, on July 15th. On Tuesday evening he took a train at the Gare St. Lazare, intending to go to the Bois. A powerful man, with a brown beard, was in his compartment. Klein "believed" he got out of the train at Porte Maillot with this man. After that he declares that he remembers absolutely nothing more.

Medical tests show no signs of having been drugged, while hot needles were used in vain attempts to rouse him when he was first brought to the hospital. There are, however, three slight punctures on his breast, which might have been made by a fine syringe.

Mangled Body On Track.
Belleville, Aug. 20.—The body of an unknown man was found this morning in the Grand Trunk yards here, horribly mangled and beyond identification. Half of the head was gone, and the right arm was severed. He was a heavy set man, and about thirty-five years of age. No one saw the accident but it is thought he was boarding a freight train during the early morning. He looked like a traveling man. Sixty cents and a copy of the Montreal Herald were the only things in his pockets. No inquest will be held, as Coroner Yeomans pronounced it an accident.

R. L. Borden opened his campaign tour at Halifax, last night.

The Goldstream Guards' band hopes shortly to again visit Canada.

The second reading of the Transvaal loan bill has passed the British House of Commons.

Work on the \$2,000,000 smelter at North Cobalt will commence about September 1st.

J. C. Hegler, K.C., of Ingersoll, will be appointed to vacancy on the county bench of Essex.

William Hipwell Diddle, of the Inland Revenue department, Orillia, died at Lake Couchiching, in his sixty-fifth year.

An explosion of dynamite has occurred under ground in the Parage mine, in China, killing two Germans, and 110 Chinamen.

The agent of the Banco Ginetti, Toronto, has disappeared and a warrant has been issued for his arrest. He is said to be \$20,000 short.

Gen. Sir John French, inspector-general of the forces, intends to visit Canada and make an official examination of the state of the defensive service.

The G. T. R. is to proceed without delay in the construction of the line between Kingston and Ottawa, as the route before the department is approved.

Reginald Glasser, Chatham, ran away from home and was arrested in Covington, Kentucky. Before he was taken home he had stolen some money from his mother's purse.

Rev. William Frizzell, pastor of the Queen Street East Presbyterian Church, Toronto, has resigned his charge, owing to ill-health, and intends to spend the winter in California.

BITES TO SHOW AFFECTION.
Mrs. Hagway Asks Divorce From Husband.

Seattle, Aug. 21.—Because he bites her to accustom his affection, Mrs. Mattie Hagway has asked the superior court of King county to grant her a divorce from Hecker Hagway and \$100 a month alimony.

Mrs. Hagway says that the first intimation she had that her husband was a biter came immediately after the wedding ceremony, May 19th, 1902. While delivering the customary salute to her new husband, he bit her on the neck. The wound was painful, but she took it as a proof of affection.

But he repeated the operation on the evening of July 4th, after he had been out with a party of friends. Later in the month, after they had returned from the theatre, he asked her how she enjoyed the play and at the same time bit her right ear. This time she kicked, but he only leaned over and chewed the other ear.

The statement is made in the complaint that some of Mrs. Hagway's friends have suggested that Mr. Hagway have his teeth pulled out in order to make him harmless, but she expressed the belief that he would procure a set of false teeth larger and stronger than those he has now and relapse into his former habits.

WOMEN DEFEATED AGAIN.

Throws Out Bill For An Upper House.

Wellington, N.Z., Aug. 21.—The women politicians, whose cause was championed by the House of Representatives of New Zealand, received scant consideration from the legislative council, which, without a division, rejected a bill providing for the election of an upper house by the House of Representatives. According to one of the clauses women electors were to be eligible as members of the upper house. The measure passed the committee stage in the House of Representatives, August 9th, the premier and three cabinet members voted for the clause, and the measure was on that occasion adopted by thirty-seven to twenty-six votes.

Luxury In France.

Paris, Aug. 21.—France is to be divided into eighty zones, and a first-class motor hotel, built in each, for the convenience of motorists and cyclists.

The scheme has been elaborated by the Touring Club of France and the Automobile Club. The hotels will have garages, forges, and everything necessary for repairs, as well as an electric plant, for recharging electric cars and accumulators.

Shelters, built of light material, so as to be easily removable, will have comfortable restaurants, bed rooms, and will be equipped with repairing shops and garages.

GOOD-BYE TO ICEMAN.

Rhineland, Wis., Aug. 21.—J. M. Darrow, connected with the paper mill here, claims to have discovered in a waste product of the mills a preparation which will preserve ice indefinitely.

The compound, it is said, can be manufactured at a cost of forty-seven cents for a thousand gallons. Housekeepers with this preparation in hand, it is asserted, can buy a cake of ice, coat it, and have no more melting. The iceman again all summer.
