TRICK PREPARED

on the go for over an hour, and the  
animal gives every evidence of having  
been terribly abused.

Goshawks' Changing Plumage.

Forest and Stream.  
I know no bird which passes through  
such a change of plumage and color  
of eyes as the goshawk.

A young one which I have mounted  
is about the size of a small hen. Its  
eyes are pale blue. I colored the eyes  
exactly from life. When fully grown  
the first plumage is dark brown above  
and the eyes are pale yellow. No one  
would be likely to suspect this being  
a goshawk who had only seen adult  
birds.

Later it changes to the dark shad-  
y blue of the adult, and the eye  
passing through all the intermediate  
changes in color—from straw yellow  
orange yellow and pink, finally as-  
sumes the deep rich red of the adult.  
This is the "outgrowth" of New York  
influences.
