Paris, Aug. 24.—M. Camille Flammarion, the well-known astronomer, sends some interesting details of the new comet.

The comet is now at about 100,000,000 miles from the earth. It has seven tails, the longest of which is about 7,000,000 miles in length. The diameter is twenty-five times that of the earth.

The comet may be seen between one o'clock in the morning and dawn in the east under the Pleiades, the most brilliant period will probably be during the present month.
