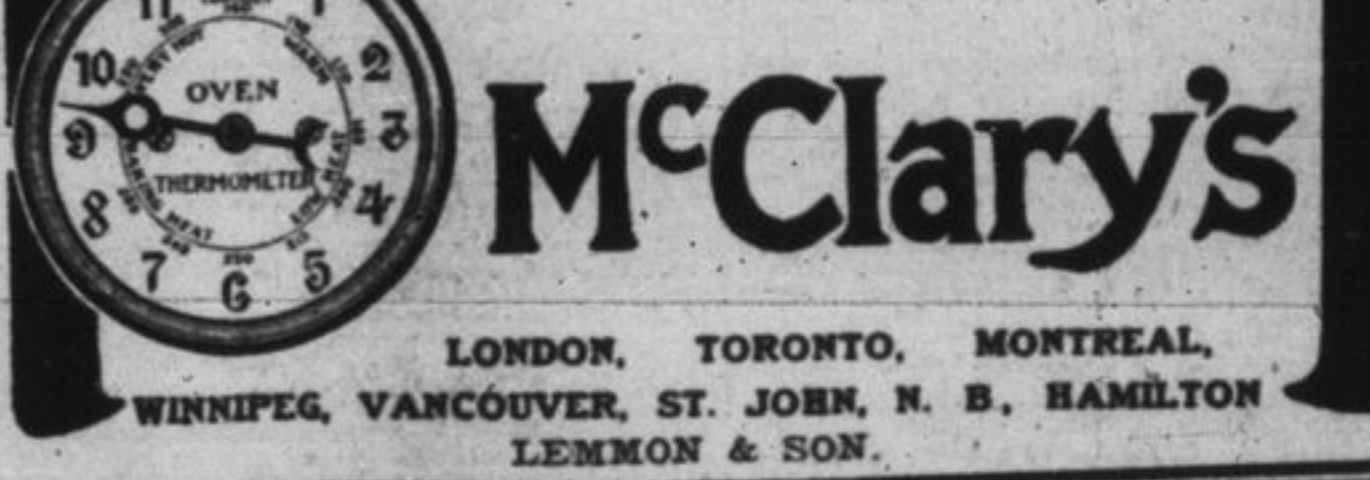

AWFUL SCOUNDREL

A VITRIOL THROWER INFESTS BALTIMORE.

Madam Drenches Little Girl With Acid and, Shrieking, Hobbles Away.

Baltimore, Aug. 27.—Jack the Vitriol Thrower, who seems to delight in attempting to disfigure little girls, after an absence of such a length that the police were ready to believe he had ceased operations altogether, has again made his appearance.

This time he appeared in the western district and threw acid on two small children. In one case he went further than ever before and threw a quantity of acid in the face of Frances Lascula and burned her severely.

This was the first time that the acid had ever touched the face of a victim. In other cases, that of Rosie Fonte, the vitriol fell on her dress, and she cut and threw the acid on her dress, burning a large hole in the garment. The double offence is said to have been perpetrated about 4 o'clock in the afternoon.

Rosie Fonte was standing almost in front of her own door when the man approached and threw something on her from a large bottle. She ran from him into her home, where her mother discovered that a large hole had been burnt in her dress.

Meanwhile, according to the story told by a colored woman who was an eye-witness, the man, who seems to have been a cripple, hobbled as fast as he could to the corner of Pearl street and Saratoga, where the Lascula child was standing, and yelling like mad all the while threw some of the deadly stuff directly in her face. Then continuing his uproar he ran up past the Lascula home.

Mrs. Lascula, unaware that her child had been burned, came to the door just in time to see the cripple run by. As he passed he raised his hand as if to throw something, whereupon Mrs. Lascula hurriedly shut the door.

Both the children are Italians and could not give lucid accounts of the happenings, nor could they describe their assailant. The negro woman who witnessed the affair gave a good description of the man. There is a total of thirty cases now charged against the vitriol thrower.

Distinguished Visitors.

"I saw on the hotel register at the Cecil the other day the name of Charles Marquis, of Toledo. Pocahontas in London.

Shakespeare was yet alive while a strange procession of natives of Virginia, Guyana and New England deluded through English ports. Of most of them the dramatist doubtless caught a glimpse, as his writings attest. But it was just after his death that the most impressive of Virginian visitors reached London. Pocahontas, the young daughter of the chief Powhatan, had conceived as a child a romantic attachment for the English, and had (it was alleged) protected more than one of them from the murderous designs of her kindred. In 1613, when not more than eighteen years of age, she boldly defied Indian and English conventions by marrying an English settler. Immediately afterward she accepted Christianity, and expressed anxiety to visit her husband's Christian country. Accordingly, in 1616 she arrived in the English capital with her husband, an infant son, her brother Tamacoma, and some native women attendants. A splendid reception was accorded the Virginian princess. James I. received her and her brother at court. The Bishop of London entertained her "with the greatest pomp." The princess's portrait was painted, and engraved by trait was generally commended, although hints are given by Ben Jonson that the princess was occasionally seen to the dismay of her hosts, to shorten her visit, at the end of ten months, she travelled to Gravesend, and embarked for her native land. But while tarrying at the port, the general grief she fell ill of fever and died.

MUST NOT FLIRT.

South Dakota Council Hits at Spoozy Persons.

Highmore, S.D., Aug. 27.—The common council of this city passed an ordinance, Thursday night, which has since been approved by acting Mayor J. E. McDonald, which forbids spoozy couples from flirting in public places, and makes the penalty for each violation a fine or imprisonment. The ordinance provides that it shall be unlawful for "male and female persons to loiter on the steps of any church, public building or doorway of any store for the purpose of visiting, eating candy or peanuts or any like thing on the street, alley or vacant lot or other obscure place, for the purpose of flirting in the evening time."

It will be unlawful for the parents of guardians or other persons having minors under their control knowingly to permit any violation of this ordinance by such minors. The ordinance becomes effective after two weeks' publication in the official paper.

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Synopsis of Canadian Northwest HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

Any even numbered section of Dominion lands in Manitoba or the North-West Provinces, excepting 3 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person the sole head of a family, or male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 acres, more or less.

Application for homestead entry must be made in person by the applicant at the office of the local Agent or Sub-Agent. Entry by proxy may, however, be made on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader. An application for entry or inspection made personally at any Sub-Agent's office may be wired to the local Agent by the Sub-Agent, at the expense of the applicant, and if the land applied for is vacant on receipt of the telegram such application is to have priority and the land will be held until the necessary papers to complete the transaction are received by mail.

In case of "personation" the entry will be summarily cancelled and the applicant will forfeit all priority of claim.

An application for inspection must be made in person by the applicant at the office of the local Agent or Sub-Agent. Entry by proxy may, however, be made on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader. An application for entry or inspection made personally at any Sub-Agent's office may be wired to the local Agent by the Sub-Agent, at the expense of the applicant, and if the land applied for is vacant on receipt of the telegram such application is to have priority and the land will be held until the necessary papers to complete the transaction are received by mail.

Applicants for inspection must state in what particular the homestead is vacant, and if subsequently the statement is found to be incorrect in material particulars, the applicant will lose any priority of claim.

Where an entry is summarily cancelled or summarily abandoned, the applicant on institution of cancellation proceedings, the applicant for inspection will be entitled to prior right of entry.
