TO BE SOON IN FORCE

Packing Houses Will Be Subject To Inspection.

New Canadian Law, Which Goes Into Force Next Week will Insure Purity of Food--Rigid Provision with Regard to Cleanliness.

Ottawa, Aug. 28.—Next month all of the large packing establishments of Canada will be under the strictest possible inspection and all the fruit, fish and vegetable canneries will be subject to inspection.

used in connection with any establishment shall be maintained in a clean, comfortable and sanitary condition, and shall not be used for the fattening of swine or other animals, nor shall any offal or other refuse from the establishment be utilized for feeding purposes.

The most impressive of the new regulations for the packing of meat are those relating to cleanliness. It is declared that all establishments having inspection shall be suitably lighted and ventilated.

Peace in Central America is now assured through the intervention of the United States and Mexico.

The plans for the building of an hotel on Major's Hill Park, Ottawa, by the G. T. R. are complete, and work will go ahead immediately.

Fielding and Broderick continue to have daily conferences with the French government representatives respecting the Franco-Canadian treaty.

Capitalist Bailey, of the Salvation Army, who conducted a three years campaign in Canada, has decided to go on the variety stage in London.

Nelson Morris, the well-known packer of Chicago, died Monday, after an illness of several weeks, of heart disease complicated with kidney trouble.

It is announced, officially, that the amount taken in the alleged \$250,000 mail robbery on a Chicago, Burlington and Quincy railway train recently was \$250.

The Earl of Dunmore (Charles Adolphus Murray), the most prominent Christian Scientist in England, died Monday at Trimley Manor near Canterbury, Eng.

George Shippi, commercial traveller for Robinson, Little & Co., London, Ont., died at the Winnipeg General Hospital, following an operation for appendicitis.

N. E. Burth was appointed county clerk of Oxford county, in the place of James White, resigned. Mr. Burth has had a long experience in municipal matters.

Mark Shaw, one of New York's oldest business men, died suddenly in the lobby of the Narragansett Hotel, New York, last night.

The marriage of Mrs. Grindlay and Bishop Reeves, of Toronto diocese, took place quietly at the Wesleyan Methodist church, Toronto, last night.

At Medicine Hat, Alta., W. E. Martin, J.P., of Irvine, formerly a school teacher and one of the best known men in the district, died Saturday evening.

The engagement will be announced shortly of Prince George of Greece, ex-high commissioner of the powers in Crete, to Princess Napoleon Bonaparte, heart niece of Prince Roland Bonaparte.

Paris, Aug. 28.—A telegram from St. Petersburg states that Sator Matouchenko, the ringleader of the famous mutiny on board the Russian battleship Kiaz Potemkin, has been arrested accidentally at Odessa.

AGED CLERGYMAN SHOT AND KILLED.

Tulsa, I.T., Aug. 28.—Rev. Mr. Sylvester Morris, seventy-four years old, a retired Methodist minister, was shot and killed here by C. R. Wilson, a deputy United States marshal, who mistook Dr. Morris for a "bootlegger."

LET THE PEOPLE DECIDE

Church Union Committee To Finish Report For Submission.

Toronto, Aug. 28.—The Church Union committee, which holds its next meeting in this city, beginning on the 11th of September, will likely have a full attendance of the delegates from all the negotiating churches.

The expectation of the committee is that at this meeting the matter will be got into such shape as to allow the question to go to the courts and congregations of the negotiating churches for decision.

The subcommittee on "doctrine" completed its labors last December, unless there may be some slight amendments to its report, deemed advisable.

The committee on "policy" has practically completed its work also. The report on the "ministry" was adopted up to a certain point, and part was held over for consideration at this approaching meeting.

The committee on the question of entering into the union is decidedly decided by the people. There remains therefore only the completion of the report of the committee on the ministry and administration.

DROWNED IN RIVER

A Regrettable Affair In Napanee on Tuesday.

Contracting Typhoid Fever And In a Weak State And With Mind Affected Mr. Knight Jumped Into The River And Drowned.

Napanee, Aug. 28.—Napanee citizens were shocked, yesterday morning, when it was learned that Edgar L. Knight had committed suicide by jumping into the Napanee river near Dalrymple's mill. Mr. Knight had not been feeling well for a couple of weeks, but nothing would induce him to quit work and go to bed for a time, although he was so weak for the past few days that he had to lie down for an hour or two each day.

NEW KIND OF WARFARE.

Women Fit Out Drunks With Tar and Feathers.

Bayard, Ia., Aug. 28.—Bayard is worked up to a high pitch of excitement and the entire town is speculating as to the identity of a gang of women whitecaps who administered a dose of tar and feathers to six drunks picked up on the streets.

As the climax to the latter prohibition fight a town drunkard was given a sticky coat last week and the ultimatum was sent broadcast that similar treatment would be meted out to every man who allowed himself to be become intoxicated.

FOREST FIRMS RAGE.

Thousands of Dollars' Worth of Timber Destroyed.

Perry Sound, Ont. Aug. 28.—Forest fires are raging in many parts of the surrounding forests and upon the islands in Georgian Bay, between here and Midland. The heavens are lit at night by the glare of fires that exist in every direction.

The country is very dry and fire spreads with amazing rapidity.

IMPERIAL COUNCILS

To Be Advisory in Regard to India.

London, Aug. 28.—In connection with the recently announced commission, to enquire into the Indian administration, with the view to the decentralization of some of its functions and the bringing of the executive power into closer touch with local conditions, it is officially stated that the government wishes to establish an imperial advisory council and also several local advisory councils in India.

SLEW A LION

Which Escaped From His Care in Park.

Pittsburg, Pa., Aug. 28.—With a roar that threw into panic 1,500 persons, Cedar, an African lion, escaped from his cage at Luna Park, yesterday afternoon, and, before he was killed, fatally injured Mrs. Anna Huckle, aged sixty-four. Four policemen fired fifty shots at the animal before he was killed.

Red Shawl Flags Train.

Utica, N.Y., Aug. 28.—Train No. 618 on the Mohawk and Malone division of the New York Central was saved from disaster about two miles south of Fulton chain, by two young women, who discovered a giant tree lying across the track on a curve and flagged the express, using a red shawl for the purpose. The train was speeding down grade at sixty miles an hour, and every seat in the half dozen coaches was occupied.
