This act, it is stated, marks the final severance of the ex-premier from the official life of his country.

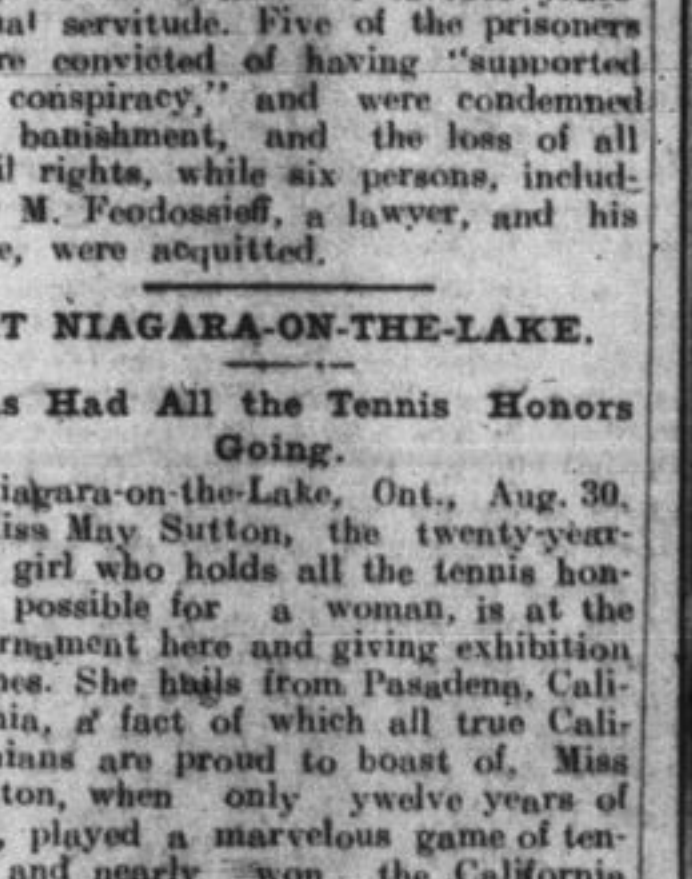

MACKENZIE IN WRECK. Escaped Serious Injury But Got Shaking Up. Halifax, N.S., Aug. 30.—While returning from a tour of inspection of the Halifax & Southwestern railway yesterday, the special train conveying William Mackenzie, head of the Mackenzie & Mann railway system, and C. W. Stacey, general manager of the Canadian Northern's eastern lines, wrecked at Ingersport. They escaped serious injury, but were badly shaken up.

SWAMPED NEAR CUTLER. Accident Results in Loss of Three Lives. St. John, N.B., Aug. 30.—By the swamping of the tug Alert near Cutler, Capt. Kennedy, of Thessalon, Engineer Joseph Smith of Sudbury, and William Boyer, resident of Cutler, were drowned. The Alert, towing a raft of logs, was in turn being towed by a larger tug, the Seymour. The lines slackened for a moment, and when the tug started the strain was too great for the smaller boat, which went under. The bodies of the drowned crew were all recovered.

KILLED AT HILLSBORO. Boy of Fourteen Victim of Accident. St. John, N.B., Aug. 30.—Two fatal accidents occurred at Hillsboro, Wednesday. John Taylor, a boy of fourteen years of age, and the son of Jas. Taylor, employed by the Albert company at the wharves, was killed by the windlass that was used for hauling up the machinery when the machinery started and caught him, drawing him in. His chest was crushed and his neck broken, death being almost instantaneous.



OVER 300 TIMES. Lord Strathcona Has Made Many Trips. New York, Aug. 30.—Lord Strathcona, high commissioner of Canada, who has just returned for England on the steamer Oceanic, completed his 104th round trip across the Atlantic. This means that when he has finished his present trip he will have made 392 voyages across the ocean. Lord Strathcona is eighty years old and made his first ocean voyage when a child.

BEFORE THE MAGISTRATE. Cases Heard in Gananoque Police Court. Gananoque, Aug. 29.—Ashley, and his wife, who was placed in the lock-up yesterday afternoon, appeared before P. M. Philip Heald, in the police court, this morning, charged with disorderly conduct on the public streets of the town, and were fined \$2 and costs. Robert Benson, whose case had been adjourned from the 22nd inst., pleaded guilty to drunkenness and was also fined \$2 and costs. Noah Lalonde and James Butler, also charged with drunkenness and disorderly conduct, had the same fine, \$2 and costs, imposed.
