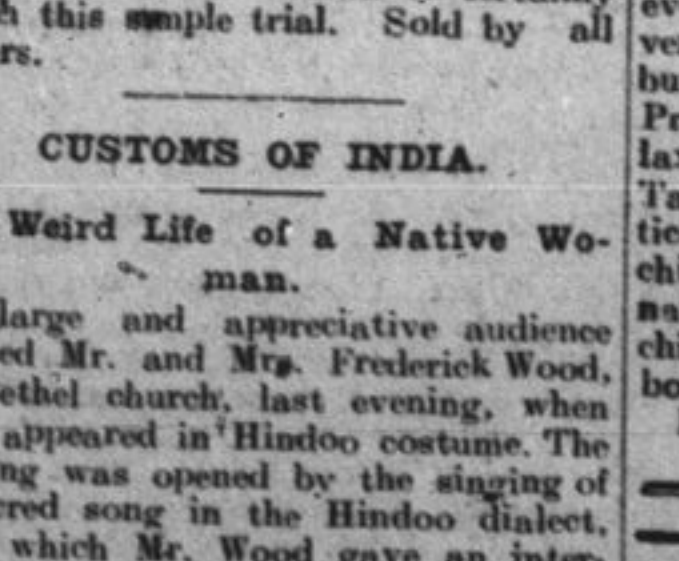

CUSTOMS OF INDIA.

The Weird Life of a Native Woman.

A large and appreciative audience greeted Mr. and Mrs. Frederick Wood, of Beaulieu, last evening, when they appeared in Hindoo costume. The meeting was opened by the singing of a sacred song in the Hindoo dialect, after which Mr. Wood gave an interesting and instructive address on the social conditions in India.

Not less than forty-five distinct languages, and 200 dialects were spoken in that great country.

The people of India were not progressing very rapidly on account of their living without any regard to the laws of health. His hearers were greatly surprised at his vivid description of the life of the native women; at seven years of age she is betrothed, and at twelve years she leaves her parents home to begin a life of slavery in her husband's house.

Mr. and Mrs. Wood have been engaged in mission work in India for some years and are in this country only a few months for rest, before returning to their labors.

Had Narrow Escape. Three young men, one hiding from Garden Island, the other two from Kingston, had a narrow escape from drowning, in the harbor, on Tuesday afternoon. Their row boat was upset, but they clung to it and were picked up by a steam tug passing.

Was Not Broken. A. E. Oakes, electrician for the street railway, suffered a slight accident yesterday afternoon. Mr. Oakes was working on one of the car motors, when the cover fell jamming the call of his left leg. A very serious bruise was the result, but luckily the bone was not broken.

G. Y. Chown, registrar of Queen's, was asked for the reason, and stated that only the applications of those who applied for scholarships were considered. There was no use considering those who did not apply. This rule has been in force for years.

Clear The Corners. The crusade on the corner loafers, made by the police in the spring, had the effect of keeping the street pretty clear during the summer, but now again the loiterers are appearing. Brook, from Ontario to King streets, and the lower part of Princess street are the worst places. The police are busy clearing the corners. The corner of King and Clergy streets has its crowds. At this corner the gathering is mostly young ladies who seem to have no other object than to spit tobacco over the walls, and use bad language. Some of the loiterers should receive another taste of the law.

LET THERE BE LIGHT

MANY TREES REQUIRE TO BE TRIMMED

To Allow the Street Lamps to Shed More Light—Some Suggestions Offered By a Citizen.

Kingston, Sept. 3.—(To the Editor): In my peregrinations about town I cannot help noticing the many imperfections and defects to be observed everywhere about the city, there being, among other things, a great lack in street lighting, much of which could be overcome and rectified at a merely nominal cost, in many parts of the town, especially where shade trees extensively abound, by adopting the plan of freely lopping off of the limbs and branches of these trees, wherever they interfere with the light, and where it is so much needed, and at the same time thereby removing the prominent shadows thrown on the sidewalks and which interfere with and perplex pedestrians, and also interfere with them after darkness sets in, in their movements about the city. Much of this would certainly be overcome and remedied were a free use of the ax, knife and saw applied in the doing, in way with all of these interfering branches and limbs, whether found to be projecting high up or low down from the trees or wherever they exist, and create the interruptions complained of, and it could be done at little cost and without creating any injury or disfigurement of the trees if neatly, carefully, and properly done, and the parings or cuttings removed by being carried off to the respective set aside for them in their grounds, and there buried after they have become sufficiently dried.

Were this done it would greatly overcome the darkness created by the heavy foliage of the shade trees, which they extensively exist and also obviate the heavy expense of erecting more street lamps in many of these places where additional light is now felt to be so much needed. In fact many of the trees themselves should be removed, as many of them have outgrown their usefulness, as street decorations, and some of them should be less than thirty feet apart, wherever. As prominent cases in point, attention is called to the south side of Princess street, between Division street and University avenue, and on Brock street, between Harris and Alfred streets, in the most congested parts of which it is positively dangerous, for pedestrians, especially ladies, to walk on the sidewalks next to which these trees stand, from unavoidable collision with the trees, rendering limb-breaking and skull-cracking obnoxious, as well as insults from ill-mannered and low-lived blackguards, a number of which, here and elsewhere in the city, could and would be remedied and overcome were the necessary trimming and removal of unnecessary trees adopted, and a few of the existing lamps, where unnecessarily placed, removed, and located where they are needed and would render necessary aid and not left needlessly where they are and where they were never needed, etc. All several of these, and especially one of them, has often been pointed out by others in times past, should be removed to where they are absolutely not needed, and where no aid is needed, and where they would render necessary service as they do now. These being the best, most necessary, and most economical, and efficient plans which I can at present think of or suggest, and the most easy of accomplishment, I, as one of the taxpayers, urge the doing of this urgent needed work at once, which can now best be done, when and where it can best be seen and accomplished before the leaves fall. Some paring is done now, I am aware of, but not nearly enough of it to meet the demands.—MORE LIGHT.
