ENGLAND AGAINST OPIUM. Consents to Cut Importation of Drug.

Shanghai, Sept. 6.—The British minister, Sir John Jordan, has sent a memorial to the Chinese board of foreign affairs, offering to reduce the importation of Indian opium ten per cent. in three years as an experiment, and also to increase the duty if the native drug is equally taxed.

Dedicated The Monument. Buffalo, N.Y., Sept. 6.—In a heavy downpour of rain, and before a multitude of people, the McKinley monument, on Niagara square, was dedicated and formally turned over to the state of New York yesterday afternoon, through Governor Charles E. Hughes.

Hamilton Gets Industry. Hamilton, Ont., Sept. 6.—A deal was completed the sale of the old Hooper works and fifteen acres of ground to the E. C. Atkins company, of Indianapolis, Ind. The price is said to be \$50,000. The company is one of the biggest war manufacturing industries in the United States.

Robbed And Murdered. Chicago, Sept. 6.—The body of a man, supposed to be E. A. Hooper, son of a wealthy family, was found, early yesterday, floating in the lagoon in Garfield Park. Evidence that the man possibly was waylaid and robbed and then thrown into the lagoon, where he drowned, was disclosed by the pockets, turned inside out.

Car Hit Mail Wagon. London, Sept. 6.—A stone thrown by a mischievous boy caused a collision between a street car and a mail cart at the corner of Dundas and Waterloo streets, yesterday, and as a result the horse was killed, the cart was smashed, and the driver had no close call for his life.

Brookville Man Drowned. Buffalo, N.Y., Sept. 6.—William Casey, a watchman on the steamer Clarion, was drowned in Buffalo Creek last night, while trying to release the steamer's lines. He was a young man, a native of Brookville, whose brother is proprietor of the Grand Central Hotel.

THE ANNUAL MEETING OF WOMEN'S CHRISTIAN TEMPERANCE UNION.

The Work of the Year Reviewed—A Police Matron is Suggested for Kingston—Officers Elected. The W.C.T.U. resumed its regular meetings after the usual holiday season, on Thursday, in the Y.W.C.A. rooms, with a good attendance.

The recording secretary gave a brief report of the year's work. The principal items of interest referred to the visit of Mr. Beall, the W.C.T.U. White Cross missionary, to the public schools of the city, and neighboring districts. Mothers' meetings held, lectures and comfort bags sent to lumber camps, etc.

The treasurer reported the finances in a favorable, if not a flourishing condition. There are no outstanding debts, and there is a balance to begin another year's work. A kind note and brief report from Miss Oford, the Victorian nurse, was received, and, although the nurse is in the hospital, yet it is felt that a greater effort ought to be made on her behalf, for the supply was not nearly equal to the demand.

The report of scientific temperance instruction in schools had its bright side. A copy of the Teachers' Temperance Manual had been given to each of the teachers, and it was found in talking with them that quite a number were using Prof. Knight's text book, and were finding it very helpful. Mrs. Macalumn's evangelistic report was full of interest; many incidents were given showing application from those of whom it is often least expected.

MADE GOOD HIS ESCAPE. Hunted by Men and Dogs, He Eluded All. Brookville, Ont., Sept. 6.—In the section of woods between Caintown and Charleston, a large bear has been seen running at large. It was noticed a few days ago by a man driving along the road near Caintown, who at once gave the alarm, and a number of men with shotguns and dogs surrounded the animal in an open field. After making it the target for several shots without effect, the hunter made for the woods close by and has not been seen since.

Out Of Her Course. Thousand Island Park, Sept. 5.—There have been but few instances at the Thousand Islands where vessels have run closer to shoals and escaped destruction than happened last night on a large freighter bound down the river. Engineer's Spine Fractured. Brookville, Ont., Sept. 6.—A young locomotive engineer named J. McMahon, lies in a local hospital badly cut up from injuries received in a railway wreck. He also has typhoid fever. While running a train about ten miles out of Depot Harbor the engine jumped the track, and falling down an embankment carried McMahon and his fireman with it. McMahon was caught between the tender and the engine, sustaining a fracture of the spine.

Judges Of Peace. The Hague, Sept. 6.—Joseph H. Choate, one of the American delegates to the peace conference, has the satisfaction of obtaining approval for the anti-American project, except the paragraph referring to the allotment of judges. It has been decided that the judges of the court are to receive a fixed salary of \$2,400 a year, and, in addition, \$48 a day while sitting on the court.
