LIMIT IMMIGRATION

This is What Will Be Done By
Negotiations.

Ottawa and Tokio Have Been Busy for Weeks
---Canada Will See Rioters Punished---
Not Safe to Abuse Japanese.

Ottawa, Sept. 10.—Negotiations are
now in progress between Ottawa and
Tokio for a limitation of the Japanese
immigration into British Columbia,
whether the immigrants come from
Japan direct or, as has been the case
this summer, through the Hawaiian port of Honolulu. It has been
hoped all along that by this means
the effect of the safety measures will be
found of preventing the flooding of
the labor market of the Pacific coast
with Oriental labor.

The negotiations have been in pro-
gress for some weeks, and K. Ichi, of
the Japanese foreign office, is now in
this country for the purpose, it is be-
lieved, or reaching an understanding on
the subject. In the meantime Mr.
Ichi, who arrived in Vancouver on
Saturday morning, has been studying
the question both in the United
States, Pacific ports, and in British
Columbia for himself, so that he may
be fully seized of all the facts.

The Canadian government, eight
years ago, entered into an arrangement
with the mikado's ministers that
not more than five or six hundred
Japanese should be allowed to immigrate
to Canada each year. It has
been understood that the Canadian
authorities that the treaty of com-
merce recently negotiated between us and Japan should in any way interfere
with the previous understanding in
regard to the limitation of Japanese
immigration into this country, and it is confidently believed that the
Japanese government themselves have
no desire to depart from the arrangement
made in 1899. What the dominion
wants is a bargain that not more than
five or six hundred Japs shall be allowed to enter this country
yearly, whether they come from their
own country direct or from some other
of the world.

Of course, if we wanted, there is nothing to prevent our withdrawing
from the treaty of commerce with Japan after due notice, but this was
done on our part for the encouragement
of Canadian trade with Japan, which may mean many millions of dol-
lars.

The Canadian government will not tolerate the course which has been pursued toward the rioters in Vancouver in the recent riots, and looks for the speedy punishment of those
who are responsible. It is understood that regret will be expressed for these outbreaks, and that the authorities in Vancouver will be asked to see that the rioters are fully punished. The enforcement of criminal justice, of course, under our constitution, is a matter that rests primarily in the hands of the provincial authorities, but if the local authorities in this case fail to name someone to enforce the law the federal authorities will doubtless step in and do so themselves.

The Tribune says Sir Wilfrid Laurier's
admiratory message affords Japan
and China the assurance that they may
rightly demand that order be immediately restored and full justice done for much regretted violence.

The Telegraph says a policy of severe
restriction is intelligent enough
but to advocate such policy by rioting
and brutal attacks on the Asiatic
quarters is sheer anarchy. The racial
question of the Pacific slope cannot be
settled by the unreasoning hate and
prejudice of mobs but by statesmen
and good people.

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The News says the gravity of the
situation is emphasized by recent
events which may be the key-note to
changes yet undreamed of, the results
of which possibly will create a world
different from any we have known.
The wish of all who care for
the future of peaceful development
may well be concentrated on this, one
of the most difficult problems the
world has ever seen.

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
