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LIMIT IMMIGRATION

This is What Will Be Done By Negotiations.

Ottawa and Tokio Have Been Busy for Weeks

---Canada Will See Rioters Punished---

Not Safe to Abuse Japanese.

Ottawa, Sept. 10.—Negotiations are now in progress between Ottawa and Tokio for a limitation of the Japanese immigration into British Columbia, whether the immigrants come from Japan direct or, as has been the case this summer, through the Hawaiian port of Honolulu. It has been hoped all along that by this means an effectual and safe means will be found of preventing the flooding of the labor market of the Pacific coast with Oriental labor.

The negotiations have been in progress for some weeks, and K. Ichi, of the Japanese foreign office, is now in this country for the purpose, it is believed, of reaching an understanding on the subject. In the meantime Mr. Ichi, who arrived in Vancouver on Saturday morning, has been studying the question both in the United States, Pacific ports, and in British Columbia for himself, so that he may be fully seized of all the facts.

The Canadian government, eight years ago, entered into an arrangement with the mikado's ministers that not more than five or six hundred Japanese should be allowed to immigrate to Canada each year. It had not been the intention of the Canadian authorities that the treaty of condition recently negotiated between us and Japan should in any way interfere with the previous understanding in regard to the limitation of Japanese immigration into this country, and it is confidently believed that the Japanese government themselves have no desire to depart from the agreement made in 1899. What the dominating opinion is a bargain that not more than five or six hundred Japs shall be allowed to enter this country yearly, whether they come from their own country direct or from some other part of the world.

Of course, if we wanted, there is nothing to prevent our withdrawing from the treaty of commerce with Japan after due notice, but this was made on our part for the encouragement of Canadian trade with Japan, which may mean many millions of dollars.

The Canadian government will not tolerate the course which has been pursued toward the Orientals in Vancouver in the recent riots, and looks for the speedy punishment of the offenders. It is understood that regret will be expressed for these outbreaks, and that the authorities in Vancouver are fully punished. The enforcement of criminal justice, of course, under our constitution, is a matter that rests primarily in the hands of the provincial authorities, but if the local authorities in this case fail to name someone to enforce the law, the federal authorities will doubtless step in and do so themselves.

HEAD OF THE TRUST.

The Combination Has Existed for 80 Years.

James B. Duke, the head of all the big tobacco combinations in this country and a leading spirit in the British-American organization is fifty years of age. He started in the tobacco business in Durham, N.C., where he was born and was soon the real power in the big firm of Duke Bros. & Co. He is president of the American Tobacco Company. He went to New York in 1884 and five years later organized the American Tobacco Company with a capital of \$25,000,000. His home is at Somerville, N.J., where he has spent millions in creating what is described as one of the most gorgeous private establishments in the world. He was married on July 23rd, to Mrs. William Inman, a noted Georgian beauty.

FATAL RUNAWAY.

Wife of Col. Notting Killed Four Others Injured.

Halifax, N.S., Sept. 10.—In a runaway accident at Bridgewater, on Saturday, Mrs. T. Notting, aged sixty, wife of Col. Notting, retired United States army officer, was instantly killed; her daughter, Mrs. Philip A. Moore, had her wrist broken and several ribs fractured. Quitty Moore, aged two years, daughter of Mrs. Moore, had her hip broken, and the driver of the team was severely cut and bruised. The party were returning from a drive, as they reached the top of a steep hill, the harness broke and the horse ran away. On the way down the incline the horse collided with an ox cart, upsetting the wagon, with fatal result. Mrs. Moore is the wife of P. A. Moore, manager of the Moniac gold mine, who owned the turn-out.

\$200,000 TO EDUCATION.

Leaves Fortune to Schools and Churches.

Boston, Sept. 10.—The will of Mrs. Margaret E. Lingell, widow of Prof. G. U. Lingell, of the Harvard Law School, made public, leaves nearly \$200,000 for religious and educational purposes. Phillips Exeter Academy gets \$50,000; the Harvard Law School, \$25,000; the aged clergy fund of the Protestant Episcopal church, \$25,000; St. Mark's church, Cold Water, Mich., \$10,000; Christ church, this city, \$10,000; a fresh-air fund for outings for poor children, \$10,000; and the Cambridge hospitals, \$20,000.

Was An Undesirable.

London, Sept. 10.—Annie Lillian Ellis, a domestic servant departed from Canada, was sent to Rochester, for three months for theft from her employer, a police inspector.

Responsible For Death.

Montreal, Sept. 10.—As the result of the coroner's inquiry into the circumstances surrounding the death of a cabman, Edward Renaud, early on Monday morning, the coroner will have to answer to a charge of murder, the jury holding him criminally responsible for the death. Polopuan was one of a party of five men who engaged Renaud to drive them to the Back River, Saturday night. It is claimed that there was a fierce fight and Renaud was thrown from his cab and sustained such serious injuries that he died before reaching the hospital.

Hanged Himself With Strap.

Ottawa, Sept. 10.—Hans Christian Holder committed suicide by hanging himself with a dog strap at Ottawa East, on Saturday. He had been drinking heavily.

MILLIONS ARE UNFIT

Condition of Children in the Schools of United States.

Defects of American Children are Appalling

---Five Millions Have Enlarged Glands; and Seven Millions Defective Breathing.

New York, Sept. 10.—The re-opening of the public schools throughout the country is to be the occasion of a report on the physical condition of school children by a committee of prominent educators, headed by Chairman Burlington, former president of the New York Board of Education. The enquiry has taken a wide scope, and the observations apply not only to the school children of New York, but also to those of Boston, Chicago and other cities. In general, the report shows children in the United States are behind their proper grade because of physical defects that could be remedied. A synopsis of the report says in part:

"Based on the physical defects and home conditions of 1,400 school children of New York city, it is estimated that 12,000,000 of the children of the United States have physical defects which should receive attention from parents and physicians. If the percentages recorded by the board of health should be maintained throughout the country (and it seems likely they would be) an enormous and impaired vision, malnutrition, and defective breathing are found in rural as well as urban schools there must be 1,400,000 ill-nourished children, 5,015,000 with enlarged glands, and 6,925,000 with defective breathing in the United States. In New York city the estimated figures are: Malnutrition, 48,000; enlarged glands, 127,000; and defective breathing, 230,000.

"The large percentages of the defects indicated are easily remedied and many could be prevented by proper care, though, except in the case of defective vision, the cures are not always easily determined.

"A comprehensive plan for dealing with the physical defects of school children, is outlined in the report, including a thorough examination of all children, application to parents, the enforcement of existing laws, and securing proper authority, where this is not lacking, to compel parents, who refuse to take necessary steps; enforcement of existing health, consent laws, and child-labor laws; the enforcement in connection with the education of school hygiene; the building of school buildings as no constructive work should be conducted that they cannot themselves produce or aggravate physical defects, and that school curriculum be so devised and executed as neither to produce nor aggravate defects of health, and see clearly the relation of health and vitality to present happiness and future efficiency.

The Very Latest Culled From All Over The World.

John Wattle, Newboro, was killed by falling down the shaft of the Hanlan mine in Burgess.

A Cleveland man, said to have been shot by his wife, had on his deathbed to his last breath.

Arthur Barclay, the negro president of Liberia, was received by King Edward at Buckingham palace.

An unusually good fishing season for the French colony of St. Pierre and Miquelon, has caused great joy.

Reports from Vancouver say the Japanese are arming themselves and fear of further outbreaks of rioting are grave.

Prof. Murray McNeill, assistant professor of mathematics at McGill, took to his bed, on Saturday, with influenza.

Dr. Kenneth N. Mackenzie, aged twenty-three, son of Mrs. George Mackenzie, of St. Thomas, died in Ottawa of diphtheria.

The James River bank at Frankfort, S.D., was dynamited, and the robbers escaped with \$8,000 in cash and valuable papers.

A German at Columbus, Ohio, has discovered an anti-toxin that will kill diphtheria germs in the living human organism in three minutes.

A collection was taken up in the Catholic churches of Montreal diocese yesterday in aid of the families of the Cochin-China Indians killed at Quebec.

Rev. Walter Clark, of Cassopolis, Mich., has donated \$10,000 toward the establishment of an old people's home, to be controlled by the Brethren church.

The friends of F. H. McGuigan will be glad to learn that he has so far recovered from his recent attack of appendicitis as to be able to visit Montreal on a business trip.

Hon. W. J. Hanna has started with the prison labor committee, which will journey as follows: Detroit, September 10th and 11th; Cleveland, September 12th, 13th and 14th; Chicago, September 16th and 17th; Milwaukee, September 18th and 19th.

Harvesting is now advanced all over the west and later reports are of a more cheerful character. Excellent yields are reported from Indian Head, Athabasca and eastern districts. There was heavy frost in Northern Alberta, but damage was very light.

CIGARETTES TABOOED

Cannot Be Purchased in State of Washington Under New Act.

Spokane, Wash., Sept. 10.—Five-dollar gold pieces could not be exchanged for a cigarette over the counter of any tobacconist in Spokane or throughout the state of Washington, today, the anti-cigarette law, supported by the last legislature, providing for fines up to \$300 or not more than eighty days' imprisonment, or both, being in operation. However, this does not prevent the smokers from getting their "dope," as dealers at Coeur d'Alene, Ida., thirty-four miles east of here, and Baker City, Ore., Whitfish, Mont., and other towns outside the state have laid in big stocks, one of them in the Idaho city having invested \$50,000 in manufactured cigarettes and papers and tobacco in anticipation of a heavy mail order business.

Dealers in Spokane sold their remaining stock at bargain-counter rates on the night of August 31st, and what was left at midnight, when the "lid" was clamped on, they gave away or destroyed in the streets, while jobbers sent their supplies to Oregon, Idaho and Montana, it is estimated that smokers in Spokane spent from four hundred and fifty to five hundred dollars a day for cigarettes before the law went into effect, and while many probably will smoke pipes and cigars in the future or quit the habit, it is declared that at least a hundred thousand dollars a year will be spent on the "sticks" outside the state, as the law does not prohibit anyone from smoking them.

There were reports that several of the big eastern and southern factories would make a test case in Spokane, but this has been abandoned, since competent lawyers declare the law is constitutional.
