Tips For The Farmers BY UNCLE JOSH.

Only twelve factories boarded at the regular meeting of the Frontenac cheese board on Thursday of this week, and it is stated that this is the smallest number boarded for this time of the year in a long time.

The August crop-bulletin, issued by the department of agriculture, says that the rain was not frequent enough for the best conditions. Fall wheat turned out much better than was expected, and there will be a fair yield of the spring wheat.

The great price of \$20 per ton was quoted on the Toronto market Monday for new hay.

The dry weather has been an excellent help for the killing of weeds.

Several of the farmers in the Kingston district have signified their intention of helping along the "Made in Canada" exhibition, to be held in Kingston shortly.

Some record making cheese was made for the Toronto exhibition. There was a greater quantity exhibited this year than last.

The fact cannot be questioned that the oat crop is the safest grain crop that can be fed to live stock, says Prof. Shaw. "It can be fed to a wider range of animals than any other grain."

The directors of the Eastern and Western Dairyman's Associations held their annual meeting in Kingston on Monday and discussed some very important matters.

SHUTTING OFF SUPPLY. Limits Governors in Making Staff Appointments.

Atlanta Journal. Georgia colonels will be as scarce as hen teeth after the military bill recently passed by the legislature goes into effect. Under its provisions the present and future governors of the state will find it impossible to gratify the ambition of many would-be colonels.

The abuse in the past of this appointive power in respect to colonels is believed to account for the rigid requirement fixed by the legislature. Where former governors had innumerable colonels on their military staffs future commanders-in-chief of the state militia will be limited to thirty and the prerequisites to appointment are such that few will fill the full quota if they confine their appointments to friends.

Governor Smith since his inauguration has appointed few more a paragon for the sportsman. Its "big game" is the kangaroo—half a dozen kinds of kangaroo and wallaby, not sufficiently distinctive to need particularizing—and this may be hunted over treacherous country with a bobbery pack of indescribable "hounds," the chase usually ending in some water-hole, where the marsupial, standing at bay, deals death with the long nails of its hind foot until the death-blow takes it from behind.

The denouement is consequently a mild reproduction of the death of Exmouth, the sport of any glamor that might otherwise invest it.

In addition to the kangaroo tribe there are the so-called "opossums," in reality phalangers. These also may be shot by anyone who is cold-blooded enough in his sport to care about salting forth in the moonlight and shooting these harmless and useless creatures as they creep so closely against the trunks of gum trees as to be easily mistaken for part of the bark.

The "Nimrod" gets the motionless little animal in front of the moon's disc and then peppers it. If he is lucky it falls to the ground. If not it clings, rigid in death, to some bough overhead and cannot be dislodged without riddling its skin beyond all hope of repair.

These excursions are hardly sport, though in the pursuit of kangaroos there is at any rate the excuse that these are vagrant and in the cattle range, much improved in 1830, when Goethe visited Marienbad and drank the waters, for he wrote to a friend: "I feel as if I were in the American colonies, where the forests are cut down to build up a city within three years." Nearly twenty thousand valetudinarians now annually make pilgrimages to Marienbad.

A Favorite Resort.

Marienbad, whither King Edward goes for his annual "cure," was almost unknown a century ago. It was virtually discovered by Dr. Neher, who published a booklet in 1813 describing the marvellous results upon patients of his who had been drinking the waters. But Dr. Neher recommended that all invalids repairing to Marienbad should take their beds with them, because no accommodation whatever was then provided in such a sequestered spot.

AN OFF YEAR REPORTED.

Only Fifty-to Seventy-Five Per Cent Crop Expected. (Oswego, N.Y., Sept. 13.) "This is an off year with the big man," said George Patten, of Sterling. "The honey yield will be the smallest in years. An average of twenty pounds of honey produced by a hive this season. The average amount of honey from each hive in a normal season is from seventy-five to one hundred and twenty-five pounds."

"The dry season, the lack of proper food in the fields, is the cause of this falling off. If it were not for the backward look, the bees would starve to death." Mr. Patten stated that an ordinary hive contained about 40,000 bees that in order for these to keep struck and make an average amount of honey over 3,000,000 clover blossoms must be visited for each pound of honey stored away.

Fruit Valley, the home of plentiful crops, will this year harvest from fifty to seventy-five per cent of the usual yield. Apples, pears and plums are scarce. The Bartlett pear crop has been contracted for, in the main, by the canning factories. The price paid averaged about two and three-quarter cents per pound.

The potato crop is about one-half of that of last year. The blight has struck the potatoes and many of them are rotting in the ground. Farmers in this vicinity have had their oats cut and standing in the field, rain soaked, for many days. The continued damp weather has blackened the grain. The corn crop, it is said, will not be sufficient to provide either fodder for the stock or care for man.

In most cases the cornstalks are stunted and the ears small.
