**SOCIALIST DELEGATES WERE NOT "UNWASHED"**

Obvious Respectability of Participants Striking Feature of Stuttgart Congress.

Stuttgart, Sept. 17.—One of the most curious features of the International Socialist Congress, just concluded at Stuttgart, was the obvious "respectability" of a vast majority of the delegates. The average outlook which they presented in conventional working-class holiday garb, must have puzzled to see nine-tenths of the representatives exhibiting every sign of a comfortable prosperity.

The congress, in fact, consisted largely of well-dressed and well-nourished men. As they lounged about the passages of the Liebfrauen, or smoked their cigars and drank their beer in the restaurant they lent an air of ease and comfort to a gathering whose revolutionary nature might never have been suspected by a deaf printer, Paul Singer, who was the permanent chairman, to the neat little Parse, Kama, who was immaculately dressed in a gray morning suit, and beautifully groomed, there was hardly an individual who did not wear the hall mark of unimpeachable respectability.

Even the uninvited representative of the "Natural Life" did not escape this description. It is true he walked through the beautiful streets of Stuttgart and into the congress with bare feet and a shaggy coat, but his graceful brown cloak were of the best woolen material, and his cut was probably of the very latest fashion of the forest. Emil Vandervelde, the Belgian member of parliament, presented the picture of a dapper gentleman in his well-fitting white frock coat. The Japanese delegate, Dr. Cane, came from Paris, appropriately dressed for the fashionable Schutzenfest of Stuttgart.

The majority of the German delegates could not have been picked out from their fellow-countrymen, who thronged the entrance of the hall as side spectators, but for the red-winged delegates' buttons in their coats. The Frenchmen, the ponderous Dutch, the stave Italians, the gloomy Spaniards, and the nervous Russians, all presented a general picture of well-being. They set out at the best hotels, and sometimes strove to the congress in their own horse carriages. They ate and drank of the best wine and wine in Wurtemberg, and feasted and feasted each other at the best gartens.

**DISGRACEFUL SCENE**

**VANCOUVER PEOPLE DEEPLY LAMENT RIOT.**

Cannot Find Language Strong Enough to Condemn the Outbreak of Lawlessness—Guilt Lies at Doors of Irresponsible Speakers.

Vancouver, B.C., Sept. 9.—(To the Editor): "Whatever a man says, that shall be also." "I already, even before I start to write this letter, the news has flashed over the wires to all parts of the world concerning the subject of which I write. To had said or done. That he has injured his reputation with the better class is a fact which is not concealed, and I have heard him denounced in the strongest language by many of our best citizens. That a man could be just as big a fool as he wanted to be, and do you know, I believe it. The words used at the head of this letter formed his text for the evening subject, but while it was most appropriate it was not largely dealt with. He doubtless had prepared his sermon from this text before the exciting incident and when he came to deliver it brought the text too close to his own door, and that was what made him uncomfortable.

To-day, as a result of the brand which was unwittingly kindled and hurled to the lower depths of degradation and business is at a standstill in the city. Before nine o'clock this morning hundreds of guns had been purchased by the Japanese and Chinese, and at the present moment the situation is a serious one. At that hour the hardware stores were thronged with these people, clamoring to be served with guns, and the sidewalks were blocked with others trying to gain admittance, when the police served orders upon the dealers to sell these people no more guns. A large number of special constables have been sworn in, and many of these are kept in readiness on horseback, at police headquarters, for prompt action, and it is evident from the city authorities that the man who creates the first disturbance will not be trifled with.

There are enough fair-minded people in Vancouver to take care of this matter, and they are just in the right frame of mind to-day to take care of it. The cry for a white British Columbia is all right, and I am heartily in sympathy with it, but let us go about it in a right way. These people have been admitted here and some of them have become quite large property holders, and now to turn upon them and destroy their property and smash their windows, as was done by the hundred, Saturday night, is a shame and a disgrace to a people called themselves civilized. As a consequence of this unfortunate state of affairs hundreds of white people are out of employment to-day, as there are not sufficient men here to run the industries
