PICTURE POSTCARDS

SALES IN KINGSTON VERY HEAVY.

Is a Fad No Longer, But Now a Recognized Industry—Viewed With Favor By All Classes.

The picture post-card is one of the marvels of the twentieth century. It is a fad no longer, but a recognized industry.

It is estimated that about 700,000 or 800,000 cards were sold in the city the past season, and perhaps there was more. A dealer informed the Whig, today, that he sold 50,000 post cards having on them Kingston views, and that he also disposed of 33,000 post cards known as the general class, such as views of Toronto, Niagara Falls, Montreal, and other outside places.

Some few years ago, a picture post card could only be purchased at a few stores, now they can be bought almost anywhere in Kingston. At stationery stores, news stands, cigar stores, drug stores, and other places of business, in fact one can secure a card almost anywhere except in a green grocer's. During the summer in Kingston, they could be purchased in the street, from boys, who were very eager to make sales. Items buy the post cards on a large scale.

MUST SERVE HIS SENTENCE.

Napanee Man Convicted of Criminal Offence.

The following judgment was rendered in the case of Reg vs. Armstrong, (1) on motion of John Armstrong, the defendant, for leave to appeal and for order requiring the police magistrate for the town of Napanee to state a case for the opinion of the court. The defendant was convicted on the charge, under section 201 of the criminal code, of carnally knowing a girl of fourteen years, not being his own, in the penitentiary for seven years, the magistrate refusing to grant the request of counsel for the applicant for a stated case, on the points whether it was sufficiently proved that the girl was not the applicant's wife, whether the girl appeared sufficiently to understand the nature of an oath to justify the marriage, and whether there was sufficient corroboration of her evidence. The application was with the consent of the crown treated as the argument upon the case stated. The court was against the applicant upon all questions, and affirmed the conviction.

Had A Pleasant Time.

The Sabbath school supper at Princess Street Methodist church, last night, proved to be an unqualified success, despite the threatening weather. Three hundred and twenty-five people sat down to the tables, which were bountifully spread and artistically decorated, and were presided over by the bright and genial principal of the school, Mr. Harrison, in his usual happy tactful manner, took charge of the interesting, but somewhat lengthy programme that followed. The musical part consisted of a fine anthem by the large choir, a solo, sweetly rendered by Miss Orser; a Scotch song, by Miss Rutherford; a patriotic number by Mr. Marshall, and a quartette by Misses Laidley, Sherbro, Messrs. Armstrong and Gardner. Rev. T. E. Burke gave an address on "Manhood," holding the attention of the large audience throughout. Rev. C. S. Snow followed with one of his characteristically eloquent speeches, combining pleasant and wisdom, which completely charmed the audience.

OLD KINGSTON MILL

SHERIFF SHERWOOD SAYS GOVERNMENT BUILT IT.

Grain Brought to It From Seven Miles Below Brockville—An Ice Road Furnished When Necessary—Judge McDonald's Note.

Judge Herbert Stone McDonald, of Brockville, having seen with regret, lately in the Whig, an account of the collapse of the old stone mill, at Kingston Mills, sends us the following sketch of its history, made by the late Sheriff Sherwood, of Brockville. This was sent by him to Dr. Camiff, Toronto, and published in Leavitt's History of Leeds and Grenville, and is as follows:

Sheriff Sherwood's father, Thomas Sherwood, a U. E. Loyalist, was the first actual settler in the county of Leeds, and located on lot No. 1, in the first concession of Elizabethtown, about the first day of June, 1781, when Ashiel, his son, was five years of age. Sheriff Sherwood says: "After the first year we carried a supply of Indian corn, but had no mill to grind it, and were therefore compelled to grind it in a large mortar, which was made into Indian bread, called by the Dutch, 'suppan'. The mortar was constructed in the following manner:—We cut a log from a large tree, say two and a half feet in diameter, and six feet in length, stunged it firmly in the ground, so that about two feet projected above the surface; then carefully burned the centre of the top, so as to form a considerable cavity, which was then scraped clean. We generally selected an iron wood tree, about six inches in diameter to form the pestle, and many a time have I pounded at our mill, until the sweat ran merrily down my back. Although this simple contrivance did well enough for corn, it did not answer for grinding wheat.

The government, seeing the difficulty, built a mill back of Kingston, where the inhabitants for several miles below Brockville, got all their grinding done. In our neighborhood they got along very well in summer by lashing two wooden canoes together. Three persons would unite to manage the craft, each taking a grip. It generally took about a week to perform his journey. After horses were procured, kind Providence furnished a road on the ice, until the road was passable by land.

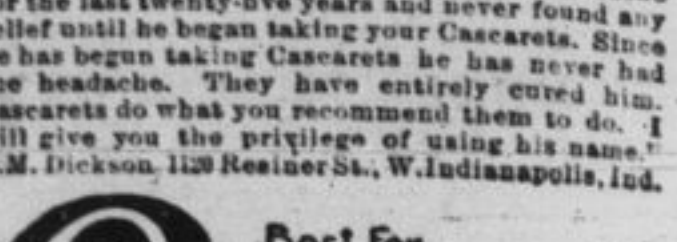
