Hays, president of the Grand Trunk Pacific railway, F. W. Morse, vice-president, and A. W. Smiley, director from London, are making an inspection of Prince Rupert, and C. C. Smith said they will complete the details regarding the building of permanent works at that point. They are expected to return to Montreal about October 10th.
