LOVING SENTIMENTS

Conveyed to a Bishop by Non-Catholics.

Quite a Significant Circumstance--A Mark of Courtesy That Bishop Lorrain Regarded With Pleasurable Feelings, Indeed.

Pembroke, Ont., Sept. 26.—This week the festivities in connection with the celebration of the Right Rev. N. Z. Lorrain's silver jubilee have been carried on. There was a special benediction service and a sacred concert in the cathedral on Tuesday. Wednesday there was pontifical high mass, sermon, and banquet, and last evening a reception, the citizens of the town paying their respects to his lordship.

A most happy circumstance, and indeed a very significant one, was that one of the first addresses presented came from the clergymen of the different churches throughout the district. It was a message of congratulation, containing loving sentiments, and involving entire cordials from the North Renfrew Ministerial Association to the Roman Catholic bishop of Pembroke. This mark of extreme courtesy not only showed the high esteem in which Mr. Lorrain is held by all persons, but should do much to further strengthen the bond between the different forces all laboring towards the same end. In his reply the bishop said:

"It is a proof of the good feeling that prevails in this part of the country, perhaps the most beautiful in our grand dominion, between Catholic and non-Catholic clergy. There is no doubt the prosperity, the comfort and the home and social happiness that exists in our community is due to that broadness of mind which buries prejudice and fosters a social Christian spirit."

For his part, he had kept in mind, he continued, the lesson early learned in school, and since in the church, that his neighbor was mankind without exception. He had endeavored to practice the virtue, and this probably explained why he held the good will of non-Catholics. In concluding the bishop spoke most feelingly, giving the representatives of the ministerial association this message: "Best of all, you and the people of your flocks, that I will do my best, during the few years Almighty God will spare me, to be as good a neighbor as I have been in the past, yes, and even to amend and do better."

ENGINEER SENSELESS.

He Was Knocked on Head By a Pole.

New York, Sept. 26.—While Henry Robertson, engineer of an Erie passenger train, lay helpless on the floor of his cab, with a fractured skull, he having been struck by a pole when he put his head out of the window, even though the locomotive full speed toward Jersey City terminal, threatening destruction to the train and its passengers. Finally Fireman Fleming, climbing into the cab and checked the train. None of the passengers who they left the train knew of their narrow escape. Robertson may die.

Great Hole in Steamers.

Montreal, Sept. 26.—It was found necessary to transfer the passengers from the Mongolian to the Huron, indicating that the Mongolian must have been severely damaged, when the Huron rammed her in Belle Isle Strait.

J. M. C. Williams, the operator at Father Point, says the Mongolian has a gash on the port side of her stern from the water line up to the deck. The Huron has her stern and her anchor driven in, and an opening up from the red water line.

The Mongolian sailed from Montreal for Glasgow on Thursday and had on board 162 passengers, almost all of whom were travelling second-class. Nearly all of them came from the western states and there were very few Canadians on board. There were not any passengers on the Huron.

Seven Daughters Wed Early.

London, Sept. 26.—The birthday of the Duchess of Buccleuch is a reminder of a family record that must be with out a parallel. She is one of the seven daughters of the late Duke and Duchess of Buccleuch and none of the Duchess of Buccleuch's six sisters has married a peer of less rank than an earl.

PITH OF THE NEWS.

The Very Latest Cullied From All Over The World.

Ninety Halifax dock workers are on strike for \$2.30 to \$3.20 a day. Two workmen were killed in the New York Central yards at New York. Henry Chernock, crazed by illness and remorse, attempted to kill his wife at New York.

LAWS SUSPENDED.

St. John's, Nfld., Sept. 25.—An imperial rescript forbidding the service by any colonial authority of any legal process regarding American vessels, and suspending the collection of duties, authorizing colonial officials to seize American vessels for alleged fishery offences, has been proclaimed here. This, it is believed, will make it practically impossible for Premier Bond to carry out his recently announced decision to enforce the colonial fishery law.

SCARE FROM ST. PETERSBURG

United States Sweeping Waters of Pacific. St. Petersburg, Sept. 26.—The conviction prevails here that war between Japan and the United States is inevitable in the distant future. The Novoye Vremya published an article entitled "The New World Power," picturing the marvellous growth of American sea power during President Roosevelt's administration, warning Russian diplomacy not to be caught unawares by coming events, and adding: "The day when the United States fleet passes out of the Straits of Magellan and sweeps into the waters of the Pacific will open a new era for the eastern world. Official courtesies and the temporary lull in war talk do not conceal the fact that America is reaching out for the mastery of the Pacific, and already is strong enough to attain it."

THE TEXT GIVEN OUT

The Anglo-Russian Convention Work Now Known

Published Simultaneously in London and St. Petersburg--Britain Will Not Exclude General Trade in Persian Gulf.

London, Sept. 26.—The text of the Anglo-Russian convention was made public by the foreign office, in conformity with an agreement with simultaneous publication at St. Petersburg and London. The time originally fixed for this publication was September 26th, but it was found advisable to hasten it by one day. The text of the convention follows exactly the outline already given in despatches, but with the condition of a letter from Sir Edward Grey, the British and foreign secretary, in which it is pointed out that the arrangement respecting Persia is limited to the frontier of Great Britain and Russia in Asia, and as the Persian Gulf is not a part of those regions in Asia, therefore, it was not considered necessary to introduce into the convention a positive declaration with respect to Great Britain's special interests in the Gulf, which are an outcome of British actions in those waters for more than one hundred years.

Continuing, the foreign secretary says his majesty's government will continue its direct efforts for the preservation of the status quo and the maintenance of British trade on the Persian Gulf, but it does not desire to exclude the legitimate trade of any other power. In diplomatic and political circles this statement of the British position in the Persian Gulf is considered most significant.

SEEKING HIS WIFE.

Rhoades Sent to Prison and Since Released.

New York, Sept. 26.—Alfred Field Rhoades, who enlisted in company F of the 15th infantry in New York, and was subsequently transferred to Madison Barracks where that regiment was then stationed, is now looking for his wife, who is Kate Keenan and whom he claims to have first met while at Sacketts Harbor and married her in 1896. Rhoades was sentenced to serve five years for murder in the Philippines, but after spending six years in a military prison, President Roosevelt has pardoned him. Rhoades is of the opinion that his wife, if she is living, believes that he is dead. He is now in Brooklyn pursuing his search for her. Her home was formerly in Brooklyn and she was an orphan.

Secret Marriage.

Trenton, N.J., Sept. 26.—Fearing that she would not recover from a severe attack of appendicitis, Anna L., daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Antrim, of Trenton, confessed to her parents that she was married in New York almost a year ago to John H. Liebenhoff, of Dayton, Ohio, whom she met during his college career at Princeton University.

The couple kept their love-making secret until the young man worked his way through Columbia law school. Then they married, but decided not to tell any one until the young man had become permanently located in his profession.

Following the revelation of the marriage, the young husband was summoned the parental forgiveness and blessing were given, and now the wife is recovering.

WERE PICKED OFF ISLAND

Finds 243 Shipwrecked Passengers in Behring Sea.

Washington, Sept. 26.—A story of a timely rescue of a large party of shipwrecked persons in Behring Sea is told in a despatch to the treasury department from Capt. Munger, commanding the revenue cutter McCulloch. The ship John's Carver was wrecked in Behring Sea several weeks ago, and the whereabouts of the passengers who were believed to have escaped, was not known for some time.

The whole party, who were in a destitute condition, were found by the McCulloch on a barren rock called Unimak Island, near the entrance to Behring Sea, from the Pacific Ocean. The party was encamped in a half-circle on an incrustation of Nelaus' lagoon. There were 243 in all. They had only a month's provisions at the time they left the wreck and could have subsisted only a short time longer.

Conductor Frederick Cook was acquitted at Whittier, of the charge of manslaughter in connection with the Myrtle collision. A special passenger train, running from Paris to Cherbourg, was wrecked in the Braval tunnel and twenty persons were injured.

Earthquakes during the nights of September 23rd and 24th damaged many houses and churches at Guatemala City, Guatemala. The Toronto board of control refused to order an investigation by a county judge into charges made against the parks department.

There are suspicious circumstances connected with the death of Henry Kelly, on the railway at Birdsall's Station, and foul play is hinted at. James R. Smith, of Uniontown, Pa., shot the man who eloped with his daughter, seriously wounding him, and was compelled to pay \$15,000 damages.

Thomas McDermott, aged sixty-five years, a wealthy Pittsburgher, rather than take treatment for the liquor habit, jumped in front of a train and was killed. The Canadian Pacific railway company, through its president, Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, has contributed \$5,000 to the anti-tuberculosis fund, now being raised in Vancouver.

Hon. Dr. Young, minister of education and provincial secretary in the British Columbia government, is in Toronto and says that the situation regarding the immigration of Asiatics is very grave.
