COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

What is Going on in the Business World—The Markets.
Officials' figures show that France will reap bountiful harvests this year. New York City railway receivership will not adversely affect other traction interests.
Hostilities have again broken out between Russia, Persia and Iran over the Russian Central.
The Manitoba and Northern Ontario Railway returns for June are out, as follows: Receipts, \$31,868; Operating expenses, \$42,648; Surplus, \$28,727. The passenger receipts showed an increase of \$14,000 over the previous year and the freight increased about the same.
The forest reserve just created by the president in southeastern Alaska embraces 2,000,000 acres or almost enough to make two states as large as Delaware or Rhode Island. This Tongass National Forest.
The total amount to be paid out in the United States in October in dividends and interest by railroad industries, telegraph, telephone, lighting, traction, mining and other corporations will be \$125,210,666, as compared with \$122,968,088 a year ago in the same month. There is an increase of \$2,242,578. In dividends the railroads will distribute \$45,890,158, as compared with \$40,438,702; the industrial and miscellaneous companies will pay out \$88,255,968, as compared with \$81,391,960. In interest the railroads will pay \$30,309,264, as compared with \$28,808,939; with the industrial and miscellaneous companies will disburse \$16,245,231, as against \$5,026,414.

DOGS SMUGGLE OPIUM.
Hundreds of Pounds Brought Across Boundary Lines.
One of the most clever methods of smuggling silk and opium into the United States from British Columbia, which has been discovered by customs officers at Blaine, Wash., on the international boundary line. Trained dogs were used to carry on the business and the officers believe that hundreds of pounds of the contraband drug have been brought into this country in that manner. As a result of the discovery by the officers, Thomas Smith is in custody awaiting trial on a charge of smuggling.
The first inkling that dogs were used for smuggling came a few days ago, when Officer Lane of the Bellingham station shot a dog which he saw running through the thick timber near Blaine. The canine was loaded down with a leather saddle in which were found three pounds of opium, and a package of silk. Where the dog came from and where he was going are mysteries which the officials at once began to find out.
The officers took a coon dog with them to the boundary line where the first canine was seen. For three days they waited before another dog came along with a pack-saddle on its back. This time there were three dogs loaded down with the drug. The men let them pass, and then with the aid of the coon dog, they traced them to an old shack near Blaine. The officers afterwards arrested Smith on a charge of smuggling.
The leather saddles were fashioned after those used by the horrid dogs in the Australian army. It is a mystery how the smugglers obtained the saddles, but it is likely the confederates of the man in jail were well versed in the training of dogs.
James Carr, a farm laborer of Leland, brought action against James H. Moxley, balance of wages. After hearing evidence the magistrate decided that the \$6 rightly belonged to Carr. Moxley was assessed for costs.

When at the corner of Clarence and Wellington streets, the team broke away, and ran out Wellington street. A man and two women were in the rig, but were not injured. The horses were caught near the City Park.

TRAGEDY IN QUEBEC BUSH.
Congressman Shoots His Host While Hunting.

It was followed for some time, when, after crossing a small lake and leaving the canoes for the woods again, Gaston decided to remain behind and rest. On the return Johnston fancied he saw the movement of a large animal in the bushes and fired.
Gaston had been paddling himself inland a ready-made among the trees, which gave him the appearance of something moving in the bushes.
The bullet severed the femoral artery and caused almost instant death.
Gaston was a wealthy retired lumber dealer.

HELD BY POLICE

WAS OWER YOUNG TO MARRY YET.
Declared That Architect of South Orange, N.Y., Had Promised to Wed Her—Only Sixteen Years Old.
New York, Sept. 26.—A strikingly handsome young girl who got off a train at Grand Central Station, Wednesday afternoon, told Detective Sullivan that her name was Jennie Errington, that she lived at Morrisburg, Ont., and that she had come here to get married. She added that she was sixteen years of age, but she did not look it.
The girl's plight was revealed by Dr. Edward McLaughlin, also of Morrisburg, who was on the same train. The physician talked with the girl on the way here, and tried to dissuade her from remaining in this city, but she declared she would not go back until she had seen the man who was to make her his wife.
The doctor on getting off the train, then called Detective Sullivan's attention to the case.
Miss Errington was taken to headquarters, and from there to the Children's Aid Society, where she will be held until her parents can be communicated with. The girl wore no hat, but was otherwise tastefully attired. She said the man who had promised to wed her was an architect named Carter, of South Orange, N.J.
