OUR PARIS LETTER

WRITTEN BY THE MARQUIS OF CASTELLANE.

What the Old King Might Have Said—Is Transylvania a Delightful Country?

Paris, Sept. 28.—I was the first to announce in these columns some six weeks ago the approaching marriage of the daughter of Prince Roland Bonaparte to the son of the King of Greece. But a thing I could not announce, because it could not be foreseen, was the enthusiasm caused by the news of this union, which is now officially confirmed, among the conservative classes and monarchical parties generally.

But it is impossible for me—and I am sure that Americans, who have so just a sense of social dignity, will share my opinion—it is impossible for me, I say, to avoid protesting against this marriage, which makes it possible that one day the grandson of a keeper of a gambling house may be placed upon a throne.

I am, of course, referring to the famous M. Blanc, who for thirty years at Monaco (Monte Carlo) filled the position of chief creditor, and who smiles upon his lips raked in the money of the whole world at the cost of ruin and self-murder.

The immense fortune of Princess Bonaparte, the coming bride, is however an ill-gotten one, and one which, therefore, a king's son cannot accept for his own without disgracing himself. If our monarchs are no longer capable of affirming and upholding public morality, I would like to know what they are good for.

If Prince George of Greece had been able to ask his grandfather, the old king of Denmark—whom we call the grandfather of Europe—whether he could with honor marry the granddaughter of a croupier, the old king would without a doubt have replied: "No, young man, is not a gambling hell."

Transylvania, although not particularly famous in Europe, deserves attention on the part of tourists, who would find there some remarkable but interesting manners. Thus one finds there a fair existence which, without any arrière-pensée, is called the day of kisses. It falls on the day of St. Theodore, when the women offer their cheeks, and then a man can do a deal made of plums, to the lips of the lady who pleases them. A kiss and a mouthful are partaken of, and in exchange they pocket a small monetary consideration.

There are no girls and no widows at the fair—only married women, without their husbands, but, on the other hand, under the protection of their mothers-in-law.

Among other interesting habits of Transylvania is the fair of young girls, the most celebrated of which takes place at Mount Gains. The young peasant women in a cart carrying with them their trousseau in beautifully decorated trunks, and the young fellows come on horseback, also with their worldly fortunes contained in their belts.

They look at each other and examine each other, then the girl weighs the lad's belt and the youth weighs the maiden's coffee. The agreement is made by the exchange of two embroidered handkerchiefs, which are carried ostensibly for this purpose. Shortly they will marry, and next year the young wife will take her place at the fair of kisses held at Anghel.

Is not Transylvania a delightful country?

Before returning to Paris I made a tour of the coast of Normandy, where fashionable winter holds its summer as it is called in order to find out whether America had played any part in the course of the summer that has just past.

I noticed first of all the arrival of a fresh beauty, namely the wife of Mr. Rutherford Stuyvesant. This charming young lady, in her beautiful villa at Deauville has been the queen of elegance, and her grace, beauty, and fortune united have made her a rival of the famous Mme. Leddier, who hitherto reigned supreme.

I have no doubt Mrs. Rutherford Stuyvesant will this winter in Paris be as much admired as she was during the summer in Normandy.

It is also to be noted that a young woman of the demi-monde who is known as "La Panther," recently made the conquest of a very wealthy American whose name I shall not divulge, although it is on everybody's lips. For six weeks they travelled together, and so much was the millionaire in love that he is to enjoy the happiness of matrimony—I say so, because the child is not yet born.

The imprudent American is now reduced to this dilemma—either he must get a divorce from his wife and marry the demi-mondaine, or he must part from the latter at the cost of a very large sum of money. People who know of the affair are betting heavily on the result.

I have the pleasure of announcing to my readers the approaching marriage of the daughter of Baron Dijon, the wife by a first marriage of Count Foulque de Maille, whom she divorced three years ago.

After the separation this young lady who occupied a position in Parisian society to which she was entitled alone by her beauty and her husband's name, retired entirely from fashionable life, and has since lived in the strictest retirement.

She now reappears, not among those who were the companions of her youth in Paris and her rivals in the art of society at Madrid, in official circles, where I am pretty sure she will win a place similar and even more brilliant than she enjoyed in the fashionable world of Paris. Her future husband is Señor d. Rivera an officer of the Madrid garrison, and she is the daughter-in-law of the governor-general of Gerona and the niece of the Spanish minister of war.

There is at present one slight obstacle in the project—namely, that the marriage of the ex-Comtesse de Maille has not yet been annulled by the Vatican—but well-informed persons declare that this will shortly take place, and of course the parties chiefly interested

are occupying themselves with the matter.

A non-commissioned officer named Ruffin, of the Third Regiment of Zouaves, has had a remarkable experience. He was present with the first army corps, which is now going through manoeuvres in the north of France, and his battalion was quartered at a little village, Gognecourt, the soldiers being assigned to their various billets by the mayor.

On the soldier arriving at the house to which he had been assigned what was his astonishment to find that the door was opened to him by his own wife, who had left him three years before in South Africa. After a few years of married life the wife had been unable to agree, and the wife had left her husband, returned to France and had taken a situation. They lost track of each other, and she finally went to live with her brother, who kept a farm in the village of Gognecourt.

The husband had recently exchanged into one of the home regiments of Zouaves, and it was the lack of his remarkable meeting with his wife. They have now agreed to try married life once more, and the wife will join her husband at the end of the manoeuvres.

The Noblest Example.

The Statue of Christ in the Andes has been well illustrated and explained in these columns. Around it, 1,500 feet above sea level, it is to be held a remarkable picnic. The people of Chili and the Argentine republic will send their way to this great peace movement, a religious service will consist of feasting and dancing, with a parting blessing.

Seven years ago these high-spirited republics were on the verge of war, they were increasing armaments, and spending upon preparations for war \$5 annually per capita of their population. But through the instrumentality of churches of both countries, the dispute of 8,000 square miles of territory along the border—was submitted to the arbitration of King Edward, of Great Britain, and his decision, which is now being carried out, is a popular movement, the two governments went further, and in 1901 concluded a treaty by which they submitted themselves for five years to submit all controversies arising to arbitration, the first general arbitration treaty ever concluded. They agreed also to reduce their armies to the proportion of police forces, to stop the building of battle-ships. The results of this disarmament have been remarkable. With the money saved internal and social improvements have been made. Good roads have been constructed. Chili has turned an arsenal into a school, is building a breakwater in the harbor of Valparaiso, and is systematically improving her commercial facilities.

Infinite Variety.

The Faithful Community, whose comprehensive gospel ranges from the creation of man to the "glory and labors of the gods and goddesses of the Eberian Heavens," is the latest addition to London's static religious sects. In that liberty-loving city the Chinaman burns his incense stick in josshouses in the East End, the Mahometan has his mosque, the Malayan his temple near St. George's-street east; the Parsees worship the sun in Bloomsbury, the Mormons have a mission in Islington, and in several places the Buddhists and Ancestor Worshipers perform strange rites. Of Christian sects in London there are at least three hundred, including the Cokesley, the Wesleyans, the Peculiar People, who prefer prayer to physicians; the Sandemanians, the followers of Joanna Southcott, the prophets of the Shakers and the Seventh Day Baptists.
