General Manager Balfour, of the Union Bank, is out with the statement that this year's western crop will bring in as much cash as last year's. That will do nicely to go on with.

A Stirring Rebuke.
Lieu.-Col. Davidson has been telling the people of Toronto that they will never get good municipal government until the big men in "the community, as they do in Great Britain, consent to serve on municipal bodies. At the same time the Japanese declines to become an aspirant to the mayoral chair because he hasn't time to properly attend to the duties of the office. Why does he not do as they do in Great Britain, make the time necessary by sacrificing his own interests?

Some Very Loose Talk.
In his speech he gravely announced that if he ever came to power—he would appoint a commission to see what was in the claim, and pledged the conservative party to that, including, no doubt, his friends of the Whitney and Roblin governments, who have considered the claim when the Conservative Party was in power. It is a conference, and turned it down. Mr. Borden, in other words, will not side with the labor congress or with Sir Wilfrid Laurier on the question of denouncing the Japanese treatment which he holds Sir Wilfrid to be to blame for something, neither will he take sides as between Mr. McBride on the one side and Messrs. Whitney and Roblin on the other, though he does think the wicked liberal members of British Columbia are wretchedly at fault for having allowed the better terms difficulty to exist.

Hit All Around.
The majority of the Japanese arriving in Canada this summer have come from Hawaii, and not from Japan direct, but the nikudo has the power to regulate that, and we may be sure that his desire would be to relieve the Laurier administration from embarrassment. Those responsible for the anti-Japanese demonstrations, however, have demanded from Sir Wilfrid Laurier's administration, and Mr. Borden seems to have taken advantage of their unreasonable and blind prejudice to secure temporary applause. He talks about a "white west," and asserts that the arrival of Asiatics has prevented the immigration of white persons from elsewhere, but he offers no proof of that, and we have no evidence to support his view. Rather the reverse, it is true, white people will not do much of the work accepted by the Japanese and Chinese, such as domestic service, and laundry work, and where the oriental does the same work as the white people, we are assured he demands as much pay for equal service. It will be noted that Mr. Borden's discourse upon this subject commits him to nothing. It is not the work of a patriot to embarrass the government, simply for the sake of embarrassing it, on a question of the greatest difficulty, in which, if he had himself the responsibility, he would naturally look for the aid and sympathy of all good men.

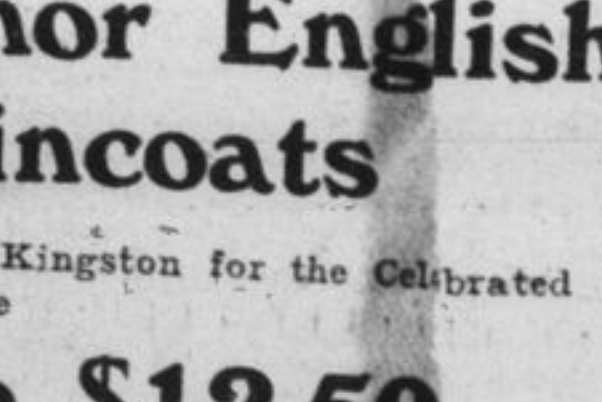
