**TIYPHOID IN PICTON**  
THE TOWN BADLY NEEDS A SEWER SYSTEM.

Reeve Terrill is Seriously Ill of the Fever—High School Teacher Wanted Elsewhere, But Picton Will Give Him More Money.

Picton, Oct. 1.—The town badly needs a sewerage system, but it looks as if it needed several fatalities to urge the town council to action. A sewerage system would be an expensive municipal undertaking, but it seems to be the consensus of opinion that it would be expenditure well made. There is an epidemic of typhoid fever in town.

At a special meeting of the high school board on Saturday evening, D. A. Gilchrist, English and history teacher, in the high school, made known an intimation that had been offered open to him to join the staff of Brockville Collegiate Institute. It is understood he was offered \$1,200, and a promise of \$200 additional next year. The Picton trustees were giving \$1,100. London and Brantford also sought Mr. Gilchrist, bearing out the fact that teachers are being lured away from Picton by the prospect of better pay.

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**DOINGS AT DENBIGH**  
Crops Turned Out Poor—A Physician Wanted.

Denbigh, Sept. 30.—Crops in general in this vicinity, this year, turned out to long continued rainy weather, considerable late grain got badly damaged in the fields. The yield of potatoes and root crops is also reported to be very much below the average.

In the meantime, the school is being run by Miss L. Grant, of Flinton, who has been engaged. Dr. Tennant is away to Toronto, and will probably return in about a month, during which time, this vicinity will again be without a resident physician.

**WILL DONATE DAY'S PAY.**

Christian Workers' Set Good Example For Our Churches.  
Rev. Herbert Mackenzie and his flock of the Christian Workers' church at London, Ont., have struck upon a decidedly original plan for the raising of funds to wipe off the mortgage of the church.

The mortgage amounts to \$1,500, and it had always been a thorn in the side of the congregation.

Monday, October 14th, has been set aside as a day especially for the raising of the mortgage money. The church, young and old, will give his or her day's wages for the church.

The business man will give his day's profits, the carpenter will give his day's wages, the washerman his earnings of the day, the store girl, what her day's wage amounts to, and so on.

Others who are not employed but have their own homes will make bread and give it to the church, make dresses, and the like, and donate them, and so on.

For some time past, the church has had collection boxes placed in the homes of the members of the church, and in six weeks \$300 was taken from them. People who formerly rode street cars, walk and put the money in the box which might have gone for car tickets. The subscription ranged from 25¢ to \$50.

Paris, Sept. 30.—Driven mad by poverty, a woman named Josephine Lambolez attempted to drown herself and her three-year-old son in the Moselle to-day. A young sister of the woman, distressed through an unfortunate love affair, had promised to die with her. Proceeding to the bank of the river at a secluded point, the sister tightly bound the child with a cord, and then attached it with a second cord to the mother's body. Wading into the stream the two women sank about evening the child's life.

The child's terrified screams were heard by a man fishing near by. He at once plunged into the water, and after a desperate struggle succeeded in getting the child from its demoted mother. Both women attacked him with savage fury, and sought to take the boy from him.

The child has been taken to the hospital, while he is recovering from the effects of his immersion, the two women have been arrested.
