COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

What is Going on in the Business World—The Markets.

Wisconsin Central's annual report will show a surplus after all charges for the year of \$1,000,000, against \$800,000 deficit of preceding year.

The Dominion Bridge Company of Lachine, will, it is reported, shortly increase its capital from \$1,000,000 to \$1,500,000.

After seven years' consideration, the British colonial office has at length resolved to commence railway building in Nigeria, and the result will be the opening up of huge tracts of some of the most fertile country in West Africa.

Montreal Street railway ended its fiscal year, on Monday, September 30, with a net profit of \$2,474,000 or \$219,000 over 1906, showing an increase of more than \$1,000,000 a day. The stock last week sold at the lowest price in years.

The total cut of logs on the coast of British Columbia for the year ended June 30th was 239,348,622 feet according to the books of the government supervisor of logging. It is estimated that the entire cut of British Columbia was not more than 250,000,000 feet.

According to compiled statements made by officials of Missouri railroads the total passenger rate last year cost roads \$1,400,000 during the last three months. The law became effective in Missouri on June 17th, and by agreement with Atterbury-General Hadley the railroads complied with it as a test, the test to end October 1st.

Madras exported rice during the year ended March 31st, which is an increase in value of \$21,500 over the previous year. The United Kingdom took 6,752 and Germany 2,250 hundredweight. The United States took a small portion of the export, a good deal of it was of inferior quality.

The total output of salt in Japan during the year ended March 31st last amounted to 1,257,361,528 pounds. The import of foreign salt during the same year amounted to 35,961,392 pounds.

Mr. Spangenberg stated that the season at the island has not been financially a success except in some instances. The Columbian, now closed, enjoyed a successful season, however.

London, Oct. 1.—Alfred Davies, who for some years was an M.P. and was familiarly known as the "Pickwick of the House," because of his marked resemblance to Leach's pictorial representations of Dickens' immortal character, is dead, after an illness caused by the shock that followed the death of his eldest son, who was lost in the wreck of the Berlin last February.

HORSE WAS WILD

EDW. LAMBRY, HOSTLER, KILLED AT SMITH'S FALLS.

Went Into the Stall to Feed the Animal—Rescuers Had to Knock the Horse Down With a Club Before They Could Get Him Out.

Smith's Falls, Sept. 30.—Edward Lambry, hostler of the Union hotel, died Saturday in the general hospital from injuries received on Thursday night. He went to the stable to feed a horse, and on entering the stall he apparently frightened the animal and it began to kick wildly. The proprietor, J. B. Clinton, hearing the commotion, went to the stall and found the unfortunate man lying unconscious in a pool of blood. He made an attempt to rescue him, but he was forced himself to seek refuge in the manger. He called for help, and a hay fork was rushed to his aid, but by this time the horse had become so infuriated that no one could approach it, and it had to be killed with a club before anyone could enter the stall. Lambry was removed to the hospital, where it was found he was terribly injured. He remained unconscious till his death. The deceased was sixty-five years of age, and so far as known he has no relatives in this country.
