CHAUFFEUR HURT

MOTOR CAR PLUNGES OVER BANK INTO LAKE.

Disaster at a Level Crossing Ends in a Dive of Sixty Feet.

Geneva, Sept. 30.—An extraordinary motor car disaster occurred at the eastern end of the Lake of Geneva last night. The car belonged to M. Claire, a wealthy Frenchman, who, with his chauffeur, was driving four friends to Montreux by the road which runs along between the south of the lake and the railway.

At Bouveret the road crosses the railway, recrossing again just above the town. Of this fact the chauffeur was evidently unaware. At any rate, the car, a large and powerful one, and proceeding at great speed in the darkness, after having negotiated the first crossing, dashed headlong into the closed gates of the second crossing.

The impact was terrific. The gates gave way like paper, and the car sped across the railway. As the gates were crashed through, however, a piece of the flying debris struck the chauffeur and stunned him, causing him to entirely lose his control over the car.

Thus, with no help on its fleeing wheel, and with no slackening of pace, the car continued its career across country straight for the lake. The few hundred yards which separate the railway from the water were covered in a minute or two, and the next moment it has jumped the sixty-foot bank into the water.

New York, Oct. 1.—A cable dispatch to the World says: "Although the family of Joseph Chamberlain have repeatedly denied that his physical condition is serious, his son, Austen, has at last acknowledged publicly, its menacing nature. He, however, endeavors to make as light of the illness as possible. His father continues to improve, although his progress is not all that we could wish for. He cannot yet walk without assistance." The report sent out a year ago that Mr. Chamberlain's condition was so apparently stepped firmly into his father's political shoes, there now remains no reason for keeping the public in ignorance of Mr. Chamberlain's leprous condition. The Deseronto smelting furnace has resumed work after a long shut-down.

LIVE STOCK MARKETS.

The Price Paid at Various Centres.

Montreal, Sept. 30.—At the Point St. Charles work yards, about 1,000 head of butchers' cattle, 900 calves, 100 fat hogs and 300 sheep and lambs were offered for sale. There was a fair demand for the good quality, but slow sale of average. Prime beefs sold at 44c, while 5c was asked in special cases, and a few of the best were held at 3c, to 4c, and the common stock at 2c, to 2 1/2c, per lb. The calves were mostly grassers, which sold at from 2c, to 3c, per lb. Sheep sold at 3 1/2c, to 4c, per lb., and the lambs at 5c, to 6c, per lb. Good lots of fat hogs sold at \$6.10 to \$6.30 per 100 lbs., the latter price was paid for select lots.

PUPPY DISCHARGED RIFLE. Boy Badly Wounded Near Portage la Prairie.

Portage la Prairie, Sept. 30.—Peter Garrioch, aged nineteen, is in the local hospital with a rifle bullet in his breast, the result of an accidental discharge of the weapon. He had been out shooting wolves and was resting on the butt of his loaded Winchester on the ground when he talked to an employee of the farm. A puppy came frisking around, and in jumping about the animal's foot came in contact with the trigger of the rifle, which was discharged. The bullet entered the chest and struck the left side, and went through to the right arm pit, breaking a rib in its passage. The bullet could not be found by probing, and an attempt will be made to locate it by means of the Roentgen ray as soon as the patient is strong enough to stand the strain.
