**WORLD'S END NEAR**

**BISHOP GIVES HIS REASON  
FOR THINKING SO.**

**WOMAN TO BE SWEEP AWAY**

—Four Reasons For Thinking the End of All Things is Coming—Prediction By Free Methodist Bishop.

Fort Wayne, Ind., Oct. 4.—Bishop Walter Sellew, of Jamestown, N. Y., who has been presiding at the Free Methodist conference for Northern Indiana, which closed with religious services greatly excited the members of the Free Methodist church by a series of predictions the end of the world within a few months. He did not mean his word, that the planet was to be destroyed, but that all the works of man were to be swept away, and Christ was to come a second time to rebuild it and make it fit place for the dwelling of the Holy Spirit.

The bishop minced no words in describing the certainty of destruction by flames to those who did not believe in him.

First.—The conditions are now similar to those that prevailed when Christ was born. Men have set up false gods.

Second.—The strain upon matter has reached the breaking point.

Third.—The savants of the world who study the Bible, have gained an insight into the world to come, and they may not publicly acknowledge it, but the world is near, they are themselves making ready for it.

Fourth.—The time is at hand when the word of God will soon have penetrated to the remotest races and the prophecy fulfilled that the gospel will be preached to every human soul on earth.

**Municipal Ownership.**

Brockville, Oct. 3.—In the past year the municipal gas works of Brockville manufactured 2,000,000 feet more than double the quantity of gas produced by the same works at the time they were taken over by the municipality.
