ROMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitobs or the North-West Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person the sole head at a family, or male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 acres, Application for homestead entry must be made in person by the applicant at the office of the local Agent or Sub-Agent. Entry by proxy may, however, be made on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader.

An application for entry or inspection made personally at any Sub-Agent's office may be wired to the local Agent by the Sub-Agent, at the expense of the applicant, and if the land applied for a scant on receipt of the telegram such application is to have priority and the land will be held until the necessary papers to complete the transaction are received
