### COMMERCIAL MATTERS. CHARLES McCONVILLE IN THE POLICE COURT.

**Found Guilty of Assaulting and Robbing a Visitor in the City—Money Was Found in His Possession.**

Charles McConville, aged about twenty-four, was found guilty, in the police court, this morning, of assaulting and robbing a young man a visitor to the city, who was stopping at the Randolph Hotel. He was sentenced to three months in jail.

When called to give his evidence the young man said that he was stopping at the Randolph. About one o'clock this morning he went to his room, accompanied by the prisoner. They had a drink and then went down stairs. He came up to the room again in a short time, and on this occasion he choked the witness and relieved him of some money and keys, which he had in his possession. Witness said that he was aware of what the prisoner was doing.

Witness said that after he had been robbed he went down stairs and noticed the hotel clerk, and also denounced McConville to some of his friends who were there.

Another witness, said that he heard the plaintiff say that he had been robbed of some money, and the clerk at the hotel, was called. He told of the plaintiff and the prisoner going up stairs to a room. He saw the plaintiff come down the stairs, and heard him say that he had been robbed. Witness telephoned the police.

Constable Thomas Mullinger, sworn stated that at 12.45 o'clock, this morning, a call was received from the Randolph Hotel. Witness and Constable Robert Hughes responded, and they placed McConville under arrest.

McConville was found to have in his possession a quantity of money, which he had not stolen any money from the plaintiff. His father had given him fifty cents, and that he had forty cents left. He was rattling the money in his pocket.

Witness searched the prisoner, at the police station and found in his possession a \$2 bill, a bunch of keys, and a watch. The watch was not the prisoner's, but he did not remember telling the constable that his father had given him money. He admitted being with the plaintiff, but denied the charge made against him.

"What conditions made against the prisoner in?" asked the magistrate. "He was drunk, sir," was Constable Mullinger's reply.

The magistrate would have to be in better condition than that "remarked the court. The magistrate told McConville that it was not the first time he had been before the court. From the evidence given, and the fact that the money and keys had been found in his possession, he had no doubt in his mind as to his guilt. The prisoner's actions had been anything but right. This was shown by evidence of the witnesses who had no interest whatever, in the case.
