PUREST OF FOODS

**STATUTES NOW CALL FOR
RIGID EXAMINATION.**

Meats and Canned Goods to Bear
Stamp of Dominion Inspectors
Before Shipment—Officials to
Destroy All Edibles Not Up
to Standard of Excellence.

Ottawa, Oct. 17.—The inspection of
meats and canned foods act is now in
force. Stringent regulations to secure
cleanliness, purity and wholesomeness
have been adopted, and cannot
but result with good effect upon the
markets abroad as well as at home.
About forty Canadian inspectors
went through a course of training in
the stock yards and packing houses of
Chicago and passed the necessary ex-
aminations before being appointed to
their duties under the Canadian act.
Canada's veterinary director-general
and commissioner of agriculture, made
the schooling of the Canadian inspectors
with the United States authorities, so
that they enter upon their duties
thoroughly prepared for the work. The
inspection covers the entire process.
The cattle, swine, sheep, goats, or
poultry, as the case may be, will be
examined by the inspector before the
slaughtering takes place, so that the
raw material for the packing house
may contain nothing that is diseased.
When animals are found to be affect-
ed with any one of a specified list of
twenty diseases, they will, under the
authority of the inspector, be prompt-
ly condemned and destroyed. The re-
gulations allow of the holding of ani-
mals of which the inspector is not
fully satisfied. The keys of the sus-
pect pen and of the condemned pen in
all packing houses will be in the
hands of the government inspectors.
The latter must be provided also with
all necessary accommodation on the
premises for the prosecution of their
duties with which they are entrusted.
The stamp of the Canadian govern-
ment inspection will be a crown with
the words "Canada, approved." Care
is also to be taken of the holding of
meats and railway companies that they
do not carry for export, any of these
food products subject to government
inspection which do not bear the au-
thorized certificate of purity.
The act means cleanliness and
wholesomeness. It will do much to
preserve Canadian trade abroad, and
local establishments, upon these and
other grounds, welcome its enforce-
ment.

CERTAIN HUSBANDS BANNED.
Telephone Girls Get List of Men
They Cannot Marry.
Paris, Oct. 17.—There is a storm in
the telephone teacup in Paris, owing
to a circular which has been sent out
to the girl telephone clerks.
The circular states that telephone
employees in future will have to get
the authorization of the postmaster-
general before they may marry. Until
this permission is granted no date for
the ceremony may be fixed.
The employees are not allowed to
marry foreigners, members of the po-
lice force, detectives, mayors, mayors'
clerks or officers. The reason given for
this peculiar rule is "the safe-
guarding of the secrets of the pub-
lic."

Death Foretold In A Dream.
London, Oct. 16.—A Lewisham
mother who found her baby dead in
bed beside her, told the coroner, yester-
day, that she had dreamed two
hours before that the child had died.
Her husband said the woman told
him about the dream, and on taking
the child up he saw that it was dead.

Letters Delayed By The Sun.
London, Oct. 16.—Two letters posted
at Walton-on-the-Naze on May 27th,
1901, only reached their destination
on September 17th, 1907. The delay
was occasioned by the letters falling
between the wood and zinc lining of
the letter box, which had become se-
parated by the heat of the sun.

respondence, which is treated confi-
dentially, from those who desire hus-
bands or wives.

White Monkey Captured.
Cape Town, Oct. 16.—J. Cuyler, of
Port Elizabeth, Cape Colony, has cap-
tured in the neighboring bush a white
monkey, the first of its kind ever seen
in South Africa.

Ban Upon Married Teachers.
London, Oct. 16.—Three women
teachers who married during the re-
cent school vacation have been called
upon by the Gateshead-on-Tyne educa-
tion committee to resign.

Thigh Broken By An Ostrich.
Cape Town, Oct. 16.—While walking
near Grahamstown, Cape Colony, Wil-
liam Rubb, a British settler, was kic-
ked and knocked down by an ostrich,
the bird being a fractured thigh and
other injuries.
