**INDIGNITY ON THE BENCH.**  
The judicial mind is sometimes misunderstood. The judge is usually regarded as one learned in the law, as possessing certain qualities that fit him for the bench. He is supposed to be dignified in his bearing, calm in his demeanour, and just in his decisions. Perhaps he has been a leader of men, a parliamentarian of note, and as such was suave and gentle.  
There is a rude awakening when it is reported that a wearer of the ermine has become annoyed with the argument of counsel, snaps at him, and finally, as a certain document is being read, slams a book shut and leaves the room. Next day there is a repetition of the impatience or irritation, and his lordship, discovering cynicism in the observation of counsel, rebuffs the "discourtesy," and announces that he will stand no more of it.  
The man on the bench must not be corrected under any circumstances, but when he scolds the man at the bar, and accuses him of discourtesy he will, under the circumstances, be excused when he remarks, "There are others."

**SUCCESS IS IN SIGHT.**  
F. C. Wade, of Winnipeg and the Yukon, and one of the counsel for the federal government in the Alaskan arbitration, has been given the London Chronicle his views on the Asiatic immigration question. The trouble in British Columbia owes its origin, he says, to a race prejudice which has always been intense so far as the Chinese are concerned, and less intense towards the Japanese since the Russo-Japanese war. Then there is the labour element, which was made unfriendly by the American agitators. Mr. Wade's conclusions are forceful, thus:  
"One would not have to be an extremist to say that, while no province in Canada desires to hinder the mother country in her varying relations, any imperial protection which would surrender the richest and most magnificent province in Canada to Oriental occupation, would be worse than useless. The solution of the problem would seem to lie in steering a middle course. There is a great deal of work in British Columbia, which always has been done and always must be done by Orientals. For that reason the only solution of the present difficulty seems to be along the lines of restriction of immigration, which can be justified in such a way as to be in no sense offensive to either Japanese or Chinese. As a corollary to this restriction of labor in one direction, there must, of course, be vigorous efforts to obtain a large British emigration to British Columbia."

That is what the federal government is aiming at, and advice from Ottawa indicates that its plans are likely to be successful. The Canadian government is sending an envoy to Japan with the concurrence of the imperial government.

**CHIEF OFFENDER ESCAPES.**  
The Toronto News unmercifully castigates the Whitney government for its surrender to the spoils system. The party has suffered because the administration has not been true to its promises. It began its rule well. Its license department was to be non-political.  
"But it soon discovered," says the News, "that this course was unattractive to the patronage element. These gentry desired to traffic in licenses. They wanted inspectors who would be responsible to partisan representations. They wanted commissioners who would administer the license system in the interest of the conservative party, and under the instructions of its local leaders. The chief advocate of this policy and the principal organizer of disaffection in the ward association was a minister of the crown. He endeavored to secure a license for a notorious violator of the law, and when he could not succeed, set to work to make a change in the license officials. Powerless with the commission he succeeded with his colleagues of the cabinet, the old inspectors were dismissed, and the license board resigned. They held that with officials nominated by the ward associations they would be embarrassed by back-door strategy, and powerless to give full effect to the policy to which they were committed."  
The troubles and the scandals followed. An inspector was deposed, a commission got notice to quit, "the chief offender," was protected, "the member of the government who was touched, as the cartoonist pictured, with a feather while the former political boss, Dr. Beattie Nesbitt, was struck with a club. A profound mistake, says the News, was made in the license business, but so far the government has shown no signs of repentance.

**MR. AVERY REJECTED.**  
Mr. Avery, M.P., rejected by the conservative convention as a candidate for re-nomination, is not likely to regard the treatment with very much favour. Did he not do all that was expected of the purely party man? Did he not register himself as in accord with his leader on every occasion when a diversion of opinion was called for? Did he not endorse the motives and measures that the party recommended to him?  
It is not alleged that he has been neglectful of any public duty in a manner calculated to forfeit him the confidence of his friends. He did not make many addresses in parliament. He does not pose as a remarkable public speaker, and does not on the forum appear to the advantage of Dr. Edwards. But he exercised his business knowledge like so many others in parliament, and had no reason to anticipate the reprobation of his party.  
Frontenac has not, in the past, wearied so readily of the service of members in the commons or legislature. Custom and precedent urged that he be continued the standard bearer so long as he was willing to serve the party, and the movement to supplant him has been deeply significant. Mr. Avery may, become reconciled to his rejection, under circumstances so very irritating, and he may not. He has certainly, been very badly used.

**THE NEW SCHOOL READERS.**  
The minister of education has decided to do something towards producing new school readers. The slogan in the last election was cheap books, and a perfect public school system. There has not been much done for the system or in the new school book line. The aid of a commission was invoked to cancel the school book contracts which were in force, and one of the worst deals was made—it has yet to be explained and defended—in giving the publication of the old readers for a time to one firm without competition. Having a monopoly of the business, and probably some of the old stock, it wanted to work off, bargain day prices were established for a season.  
Commissioner Cooper prophesied in a very candid way, and very much to his credit as an independent critic whom a small government favourer could not silence, that when new and modern books were issued the price would be high enough. By the way the Educational Association seems to have aroused the government and impelled it to action. At a meeting of the association recently there was a call for new readers which would more adequately or correctly express the national sentiment of to-day. These books, it was urged, should be suggestive of the educational "miasma of the day" and "be models of excellence in illustration, type, paper and binding—" and with a separate reader for each grade.  
For the supervision of the work, or the editorship of it, the education department has had to go out of the province. Dr. Gow-in is a man of experience and scholarship, it is said, and he has been an active campaigner for the party. He went before it, as a kind of trumpeter, during the elections in the newer provinces, and he was imported into Ontario during a couple of bye-elections when it was attempted to influence them by appeals to religion and the prejudice these appeals inspired. He may be a very capable man, but there are others in Ontario, though not active election campaigners.

**EDITORIAL NOTES.**  
Sir Sandford Fleming is entitled to be represented at Queen's by a bust or any other article suggestive of his spirit. It has had many evidences of his devotion.  
The Hamilton Herald and Ottawa Journal nominate Prof. Shortt, Wallace Nesbitt, K.C., and Mr. O'Donoghue as a permanent board of consultation. Good idea.  
Branford the wickedest city in Ontario! Who would ever have suspected it? Isn't that the home of one of the government's political executioners? Perhaps that accounts for it.  
Here is the president of the Rock Island railway system declaring that he favours "wise and just federal regulation," but there is a wonderful difference of opinion as to what this means.  
The Globe is after Dr. Pyne. Is it any wonder? He was the "chief offender" in the license scandals, according to the Toronto News, and our contemporary chides him as a friend.  
Mr. Pope, of the secretary of state's office, in Ottawa, is going with Hon.

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Mr. Lemieux to Japan. The acquaintance Mr. Pope made of Prince Fushimi while in Canada will not be forgotten.  
The Mail holds Sir Wilfrid Laurier responsible for the Newfoundland fishery troubles. He is also probably responsible for the troubles in the conservative conventions in London and Frontenac.  
Premiers McBride and Roblin promised to join Mr. Borden at Edmonton, and failed him. Why? They were advertised to appear, and the disappointment is all the talk at Edmonton.  
Perhaps the public school teachers will be satisfied to do their best before the teacher-in-training, when they are given an allowance for it. The normal school teachers in London got \$50 each.  
Newfoundland forced into an acceptance of the *modus vivendi* so far as the American fishing interests are concerned. The "humiliation" is resented by the Islanders. Perhaps now they will think better of Canadian annexation.  
Those appeals of the Montreal Star to the wealthy people to make sacrifices in the interest of the deserving politicians are not fully understood. Did Mr. Graham not get into trouble over his political gifts? Why tempt others into grief?

Kipling's cure for the yellow fever is to pump the whites into British Columbia, and in sufficient number to meet the needs of the province. He is so outspoken on this point that some people now regard him as an emissary of the imperial government.

It is good news for Canada that a government expert estimates that the North-West wheat crop at \$3,000,000 bushels. Now we have a definite statement from the dominion immigration agent at Vancouver that the number of Japanese immigrants holding passports direct from Japan and entering Canada since January 1st, has not largely exceeded the number agreed upon between the two governments. The number of Japanese who arrive at Vancouver with passports since January 1st last was 3,000. About three-fourths of these came from Honolulu or were destined for the United States while the remainder, the passports direct from Japan to Canada. The inference is that Japan is trying to abide by her agreement. If this official statement had been published earlier many a million of ill-effects might have been avoided. Now it is just as well that a Canadian envoy is to go to Tokio.

**John Bull Long Headed.**

The immense bonus awarded to the ship *Lusitania* by the British admiralty which amounts to an annual expenditure by the British government for an option on the purchase of that steamship, to be exercised in the emergency of war, gives the government a cruise or transport reserve with a capacity for ten thousand armed men. Notwithstanding the objections raised that the *Lusitania* may prove too large for effective use as an auxiliary cruiser, the advantages secured by a high-speed transport are hers. If it be true, as claimed, that all the officers and half the crew of both the *Lusitania* and her twin of the Cunard line, the *Mauretania*, are members of the British naval reserve, it is evident that, in case of war, the two great passenger steamships could be transformed without delay into formidable factors in the struggle for supremacy. Altogether it looks as if the British admiralty has as much cause for satisfaction and congratulation on the completion and success of the two steamships as have the owners themselves.
