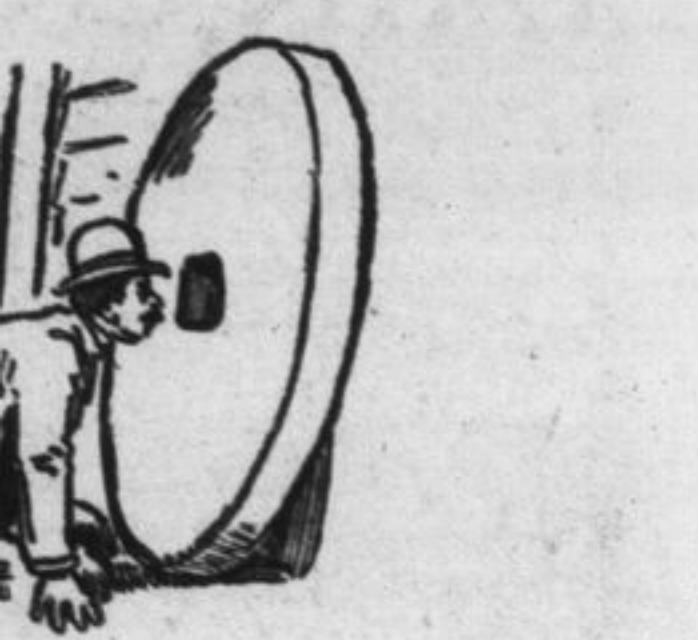

Accident to the Bridge. Quite a serious accident occurred at the Catarqui bridge, on Friday morning, when the steamer Wolfe Islander collided with the bridge with such force that it was shifted off the turntable, and moved a distance of eight feet. The boat was badly damaged, and the bridge striking the boat on the starboard side just aft of the forward gang way, tearing up the deck and caving in her side. It will be to-morrow morning, before the bridge will be ready for passage, and then it will have to be kept closed till the centre pier is finished.

THE DEADLY IVY

Many New Haven Meth-ODISTS POISONED. Nearly Half the Membership of the Village Church Affected by Contact With the Vine Used By Mistake in Decorations.

Quebec, N.Y., Oct. 18.—Poison con-tracted from ivy used in the decoration of the Methodist church at New Haven has attacked nearly half the Methodists of that village. Mistaking the poisonous vine for the harmless variety a score of the most prominent women of the church gathered the ivy one afternoon last week and hung it gracefully in the church parlors. The morning after the social the delegation which arranged the decorations was afflicted. Arms, faces and body swelled from the effects of those who are in bed suffering with the disease are Mrs. George Whitney, Mrs. Stephen Joyce, Clara Belle Whit-ney, Charles Warner, Ethel Stone and Ina Stone. A dozen others are in less severe stages of poisoning.

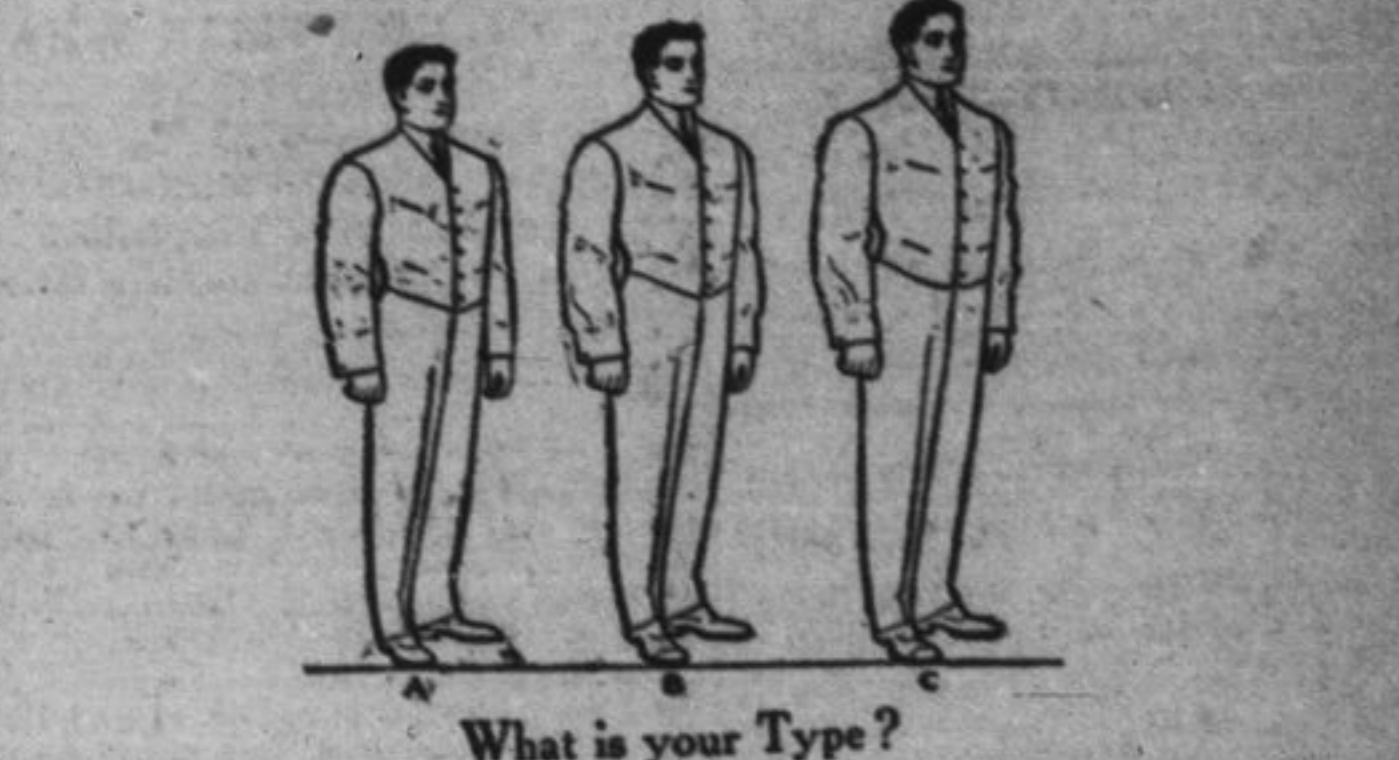
