

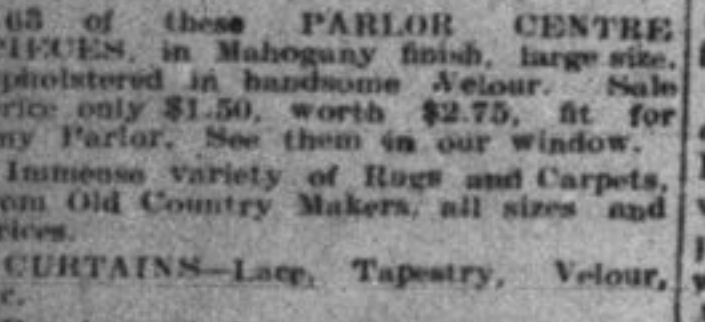

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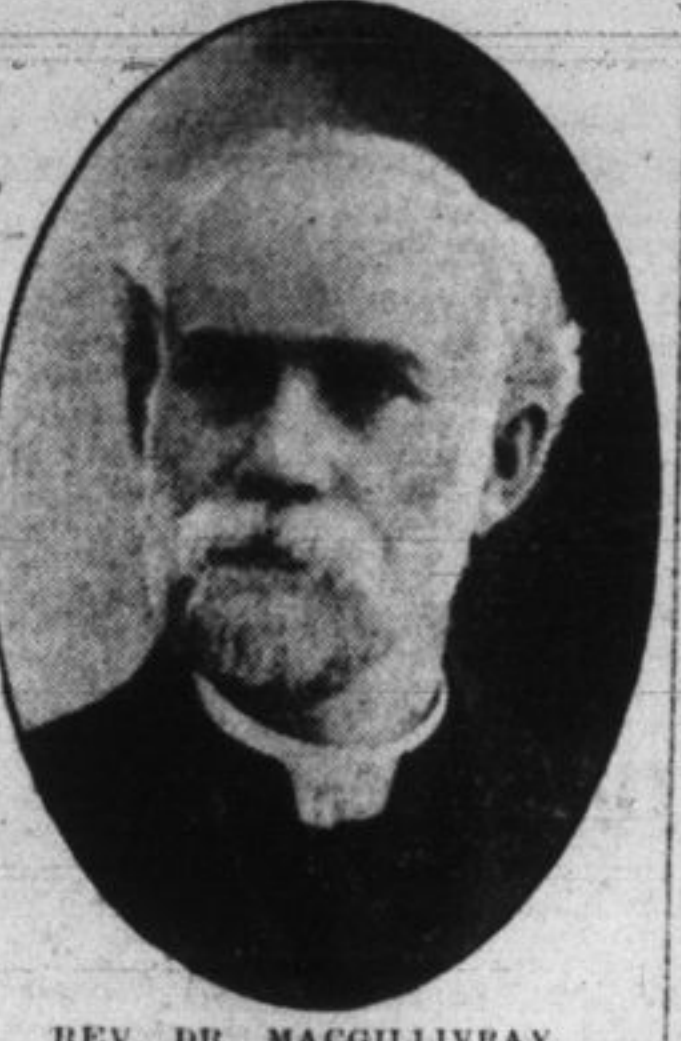
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DIAMOND JUBILEE

TO BE OBSERVED ON SUNDAY AT CHALMERS

The Church is Sixty-Three Years Old—A Brief History of It—Rev. Dr. Macgillivray Has Been Its Minister Twenty Years.

Chalmers church will to-morrow celebrate its diamond jubilee. It is three years late in doing so, for it first came into existence in 1844. In that year there was a split in the Church of Scotland, and the Canada Presbyterian church went out; Kingston was affected, for a considerable number seceded and held service in Ontario hall. Shortly afterwards another split occurred, one section wanting a Scotch minister, and the other an Irishman. This resulted in the formation of Chalmers and Cooke's churches. After the disintegration of the

Canada became known as the Free church, Chalmers church was organized under this designation in 1844, and for several years the congregation worshipped in the city buildings, going by the name of the "City Building Congregation."

Rev. Dr. H. F. Burns, formerly of Halifax, now deceased, was the first minister of Chalmers. He preached his first sermon in May, 1846, when nineteen years old, in the city buildings, and was ordained on July 1st, 1847.

Mr. Burns resigned in June, 1855. The foundation of the former church on Earl street, was laid on June 18th, 1849, and service was begun on December 23rd of the same year.

The completed church was publicly dedicated on June 5th, 1851.

After Mr. Burns' resignation Rev. D. B. Pearce succeeded for a time. The congregation having again become vacant, Rev. Patrick Gray was called.

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THE HALLS OF QUEEN'S

ARRANGING FOR FRESHMEN'S RECEPTION.

Hubert Osborne Will Direct the Dramatic Club—Science Students Go to Belleville to See Cement Works.

The executive of the Y.M.C.A. and Y.W.C.A. held a joint meeting yesterday afternoon for the purpose of arranging for the annual freshmen's reception. It was decided to hold the reception in Grant hall, on the evening of Friday, November 18th. The event will differ in almost every respect from the freshmen's receptions of former years. No one will be invited to the reception, but the members of the Y.M.C.A. and Y.W.C.A., and the students of the first year. Furthermore, the freshmen will be made to feel that the reception is expressly what its name implies, that they are more than mere participants in the opening social function of the session.

The students of the faculty of education convened yesterday afternoon for organization purposes. It is probable that a faculty society corresponding to the arts, engineering and Aesculapian societies will be organized by the pedagogy students.

At the regular weekly meeting of the Y.M.C.A. in Convocation Hall, yesterday afternoon, the president, M. N. Omond, delivered an address, choosing as his text: "Freely ye have received; freely give." If the first two meetings of the association constitute a criterion, the attendance at this session will be larger than ever before.

Now that the "hustle" of the science freshmen has passed into history, the sophomores admit that there was appointed at their first regular meeting a "scrap committee," which assembled in secret almost daily since October opened, and to whose efforts must be ascribed the victory of the second year men.

The Dramatic Club is fortunate indeed in availing itself of the services of Hubert Osborne, who has volunteered to superintend the preparation and preservation of "Mach, Aho Aho Nothing." Mr. Osborne who formerly attended Queen's, has attained to considerable distinction in the realm of Shakespearean drama, having been several years a member of Ben Greet's company.

At a meeting of the Engineering Society yesterday afternoon, nominations were made for the society's officers. The elections take place next Friday.

As a result of the efforts of several practical science professors, excursions to Belleville was arranged for Friday, in order that the final year students might have an opportunity of visiting the Belleville Portland Cement company's plant, and the Lehigh Portland Cement works, the latter of which is now in the course of erection. The excursion was well patronized.

The struggle for the tennis championship is progressing rapidly. Two evenly matched contestants were compelled by darkness on Wednesday afternoon to abandon the courts with the laurels of victory undecided.

The first meeting of the German Society was held yesterday afternoon. This society whose organization was effected by Prof. Macgillivray, exists for the purpose of discussing questions of interest to German students, and is proving very helpful to all concerned.

Three Queen's graduates, Alfred Fitzpatrick, B.A., John Sharp, M.A., and James Hales, are floating a mining concern at Larder Lake, to be known as the Combined Gold Fields, Limited, capitalized at three million dollars. Circulars are being sent to Queen's men with a view to having them subscribe for stock.

FIRE INSURANCE RATES. For Kingston to Be Reduced Fifteen Per Cent.

There was no business for the fire and light committee to transact yesterday afternoon, beyond the passing of accounts. Those present were Ald. Cox (chairman), Nickle, Graham and Robertson.

The chairman stated that in view of the small fire losses in Kingston for years past, the Underwriters' Association had decided to decrease the insurance rates by fifteen per cent. Kingston for a long time, has been paying high insurance in view of the heavy losses in Toronto, Montreal and Ottawa. This was deemed most unfair. This city has a pretty efficient brigade and very adequate protection otherwise. It has had the lowest fire loss in proportion to any other city or town in the Dominion. Hence, it was sheer robbery for the insurance companies to tax Kingston such high rates as have been imposed especially since Toronto has had such big losses by fire. The attention of the Underwriters was several times drawn to this fact. At last they have decided to treat Kingston fairly and accordingly the rates of fire risks will be reduced.
