Archdeacon Harding Talks of North-West Affairs. Archdeacon Harding, formerly curate of St. George's cathedral, arrived in the city, yesterday, on his way to attend the meeting of the Missionary Society of the West, in Toronto, on Thursday, October 24th. The archdeacon has been working in North-West Canada during the last fifteen years, and reports great development in the work of the Church in England, in the province of Qu'Appelle, Rupert's Land, Calgary and Saskatchewan. In the diocese of Qu'Appelle, where the archdeacon labors as general missionary, there are now fifty-five clergy, eighty churches, some thirty stipendiary and honorary lay readers, and fifty Sunday schools. A school, or training school, for the clergy, has lately been established in Regina, the capital, with Rev. C. R. Litter, B.D., St. John's College, Winnipeg, as warden, and already there are seven students preparing themselves for the work of the sacred ministry. The bishop and the executive committee of the diocese are now in the city.

BERGERON IN A FIRE. He Saved His Brush and Comb From Burning. Hamiota, Man., Oct. 23.—Within two hours for R. L. Bergeron had registered at the Hotel Cecil, fire broke out in the kitchen basement. The maids ran through the house, bringing forth the contents of their wardrobes, the guests rushed for their clothes, and J. G. H. Bergeron, the conservative leader's doughnut-benchman, was seen gliding downstairs, carrying his hairbrush and comb, having been fortunately quickly put out, and the company forgot the panic in a hearty supper.

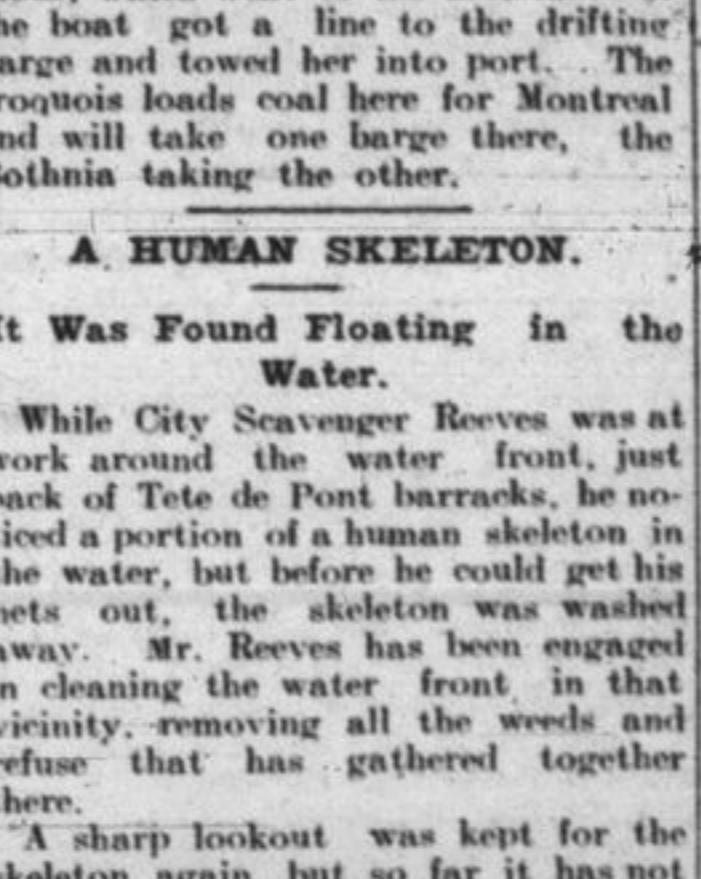
