HELP THEMSELVES
LORD AVEBURY HAS OLD AGE PENSION SCHEME.

Has Formulated a Plan to Offset the Proposition of the Socialists.

London, Oct. 24.—Lord Avebury and other economists have formulated an old age pension plan to offset the socialist proposition. The scheme is based on the encouragement and assistance of persons willing to make some sacrifice to entitle themselves to pension. It is suggested the government should co-operate with the various friendly societies, receiving from them contributions of candidates for pensions and allowing interest on them at 3 per cent. By commencing at 20 years of age to pay one pound, it is shown a man might entitle himself to a pension of £175 a week at the age of 65 if only 2 per cent. interest is allowed, but an additional 1 per cent. would add £72 to the pension. At the age of 70 pensions at lower and higher rates interest would be respectively £336 and £516, so the pension becomes nearly 50 per cent. more at 34 than at 23 years of age. An extra 1 per cent. is additional to the 2 per cent. which the government allows on friendly societies funds invested on a foundation of the pension system, and Lord Avebury points out that even if the total fund collected were \$500,000,000, interest at 1 per cent. would only amount to half the sum Asquith has set aside for the government pension scheme.
