### MR. FOSTER UNDER FIRE.

The Toronto World has not recanted what it said about Mr. Foster. When the ex-finance minister fell from grace—or rather when he was exposed by the insurance commission—it declared that the task of defending him was bigger than the conservative party could undertake.

The impression has gone abroad, says the World, that however censorious the opposition may be of wrong-doing or scandal on the government side "it is content to harbour an Achan in its own camp."

Mr. Foster has not been as showy as formerly, but he has been airing his opinions some in Toronto. And still the World does not weaken, but holds to the opinion it has expressed that "there are signs that his own party in Mr. Foster's present constituency will reverse the policy adopted in Ottawa with regard to him."

### A VERY EFFECTUAL SNUB.

An invalid printer, destined for the home kept by the International Typographical Union, at Colorado Springs, and supported by Canadians as well as Americans, was stopped and turned back at the frontier. This causes one to meditate. Hundreds of Canadians go to the American institutions every year for medical treatment. They spend their good money in the United States, and some of them do not come home cured. This refusal to let a printer pass over the line because he was not in health is a new experience.

What is the inference? That no one is wanted in the United States who is physically unfit to pass medical examination? Evidently not. It would not be a good thing for the sanitarians if such a ruling were established. The printer's case, however, raises the question that all people, under similar circumstances, should be treated alike, and if Canadians cannot get what they want in the United States, they had better see if they cannot get it at home. The sooner our people become more self-reliant, and loyal to their own institutions the better.

### HE WOULD A-WOOLING GO.

The Weekly Sun has been gold bricked beyond a doubt with regard to the Frontenac nomination, using the expression as an indication of the manner in which our contemporary has been imposed upon. Its information is that Dr. Edwards has received a preference over Mr. Avery because the latter did not "oppose the increase in the sessional indemnity."

It is possible that some thought may have been given casually to the indemnity question in Frontenac. To say otherwise would be to argue that the electors have not been influenced in any way by the Weekly Sun and its frenzied denunciation of the salary grab. At the same time it is clear that the indemnity was not a circumstance that divided public opinion so far as the recent conservative convention was concerned.

Dr. Edwards has had his ambitions. He has desired to represent the people in parliament. Twice his name went before conventions and twice the preference of the party went to another. Some men would have been discouraged with this experience and pursued the coveted position no further. But the politician, like the lover, knows the value of persistency when he would a-wooling go. He continued his courtship and he had the satisfaction of being accepted.

The Sun did not know this, else it would have treated the Frontenac nomination in a different way.

The New Yorkers are organizing a clearing house for trust companies. What is wanted is something which will clear Wall street of some of its nefarious ways.

## TRAFFICING IN OPTIONS.

Talk about bribery! The biggest scheme of the past dwarf beside those of Mr. Borden, leader of the opposition, and all the while he is touring about the country and making noisy appeals for public favour.

The bids for popular favour at the coast, and in the provinces east of the Rockies, were trifling in their quality in comparison with those in which he indulged in Manitoba. Here he leagued himself with the Roblin party in his attacks on the Central government. The dominion had not, as was reported, handed over all the swamp lands to which the province was entitled, and Mr. Roblin made the painful estimate that the loss was about \$15,000,000.

Manitoba is the richer in consequence. The lands that will be hers eventually—when they have been surveyed and deeded over—may be saved from wanton waste such as has been made of other lands it has possessed. Some of the rankest scandals in recent years have arisen over the Roblin government's sale of the public domain, and in the interest and for the benefit of the party.

Mr. Borden, however, joins the local government in making large demands on the federal government. He wants Manitoba to be given a lot more territory right away in order that it may be exploited for political purposes. If all his promises could be granted at once there would be a slump in the federal assets and to the extent of millions of dollars.

## TROUSERS OF RECENT ORIGIN.

Hundred Years Ago Were Thought Immoral. The modern custom of wearing trousers was taken from the military dress introduced into the army by the Duke of Wellington during the Peninsular war, says the Tailor and Cutter. In early days these were known as Wellington trousers, after the duke.

When they were coming into general use at the commencement of the nineteenth century, the religious world and the fashionable were most determined in their opposition. A clause in the original trust deed, dated 1820, of a Sheffield Nonconformist chapel provided that "under no circumstances whatever shall any preacher be allowed to occupy the pulpit who wears trousers."

But this was not all. Some doubts were expressed in many quarters concerning the question whether a man could be religious and appear in trousers. One of the founders of the Primitive Methodist body remarked to a colleague in the ministry that "trousers wearing, beer drinking and so on will never get to heaven."

Father Rice, a famous Methodist minister, twice president of the conference (born in 1765, died in 1850), could not be induced to adopt trousers, and among the Methodists was the last to follow popular fashion in this respect.

## SAVED CHILD'S LIFE

### GALLANT ACTION OF O. SCOTTE, BRAKEMAN.

Stood on Cowcatcher of Engine and Picked Up Child From Between the Rails.

Montreal, Oct. 25.—When the Ottawa train from Montreal left Rigaud the other night, O. Scotte, brakeman of the Smith's Falls division, performed an action which saved the life of a small child, who, but for his bravery and presence of mind, would certainly have been killed.

When the train leaves Rigaud the brakeman stands on the front of the engine in order to be able to open the switch a short distance up the line. Scotte, standing there, saw in front of him a small girl right in the middle of the track. He shouted to her, but could not attract her attention. There was no time to stop the train, so without a moment's hesitation and at the imminent risk of his own life, Scotte grasped the cow-catcher with one hand, leaped forward, and as the engine reached the child he lifted her to a place of safety.

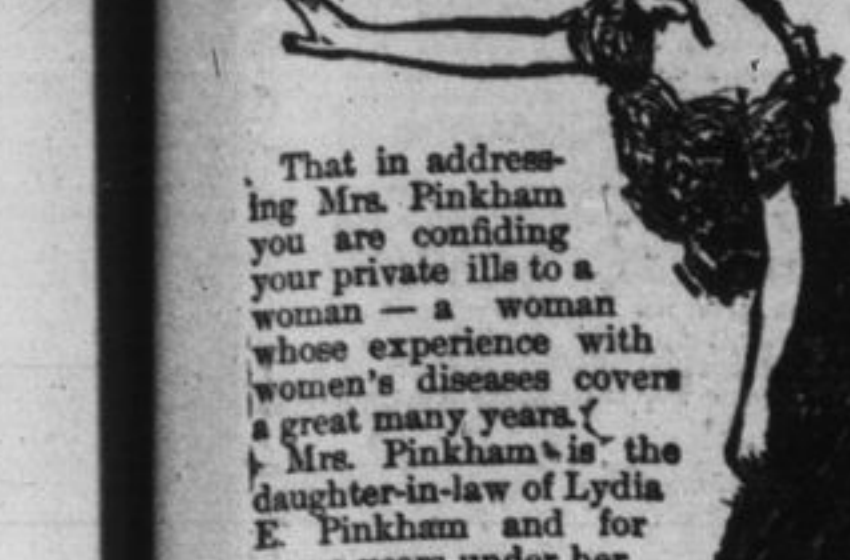
