

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest

HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS. Any even numbered section of Domination Lands in Manitoba or the North-West Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person the sole head of a family, or male over 18 years of uge, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 acres, more Application for homestead entry must

be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency, Entry by proxy may, however, he mad at an Agency on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader.

An application for entry or cancellation made personally at any sub-agent's office may be wired to the Agent by the Sub-agent, at the expense of the applin receipt of the telegram such application is to have priority and the land will held until the necessary papers to implete the transaction are received by

In case of "personation" or fraud the applicant will forfeit all priority of claim or if entry has been granted it will be An application for cancellation must be made in person. The applicant must be eligible for homestead entry, and only one application for cancellation will be replication has been disposed of. Where an entry is cancelled subsequent to institution of cancellation proceedings.

Applicant for cancellation must state in what particulars the homesteader is in A homesteader whose entry is not the subject of cancellation proceedings may subject to the approval of Department, relinquish it in favor of father. mother, son, daughter, brother or sister

DUTIES-A settler is required to perform the duties under one of the following plans :- (1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years.
(2) A homesteader may, if he so desires, perform the required residence duties by living on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of his homestead. Joint ownership in land will

not meet this requirement.
(3) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased; of a homesteader has permanent residence on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicini-ty of the homestead, or upon a homestead entered for by him in the vicinity, such homesteader may perform his own-

(4) The term "visinity" in the two preceding paragraphs is defined as meaning not more than nine miles in a direct line, exclusive of the width of road allowance crossed in the measurement. his residence duties in accordance with the above while living with parents or on farming land owned by himself must notify the Agent for the district of such intention.

Before making application for patent the settler must give six months notice in writing to the Commissioner of Do-minion Lands at Ottawa, of his inten-tion to do so.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-· WEST MINING REGULATIONS. COAL-Coal mining rights may be leased for a period of twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1 per acre. Not more than 2,560 acres shall be leased to one individual or company. A royalty at the rate of five cents per ton shall be QUARTZ-A person eighteen years of lage or over, having discovered mineral in place, may locate a claim 1,500x1,500 feet.

The fee for recording a claim is \$5.
At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year or paid to the mining recorder in flest thereof. When \$500 has been expended or paid, the locator may upon having a survey made, and upon complying with other requirements, purchase the land at \$1 per acre. The patent provides for the payment of a royalty of 21 per cent on the sales.

Toronto, Oct. 25 .- Commenting upon he present financial situation B. E. Walker, president of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, observed that if he wanted to borrow \$1,000 he could saved that amount. That is what is the matter to-day. The people have been extravagant, business expansion has gone ahead at a great rate, and the money stringency follows. But the banks have been cautioning ---patrons and getting them to cut down their requirements, and beneficial re-
