COMMERICAL MATTERS.

What is Going on in the Business World—The Markets.

There are in China 2,742 miles of completed railroads and 1,622 miles of under construction.

The Amalgamated Copper Company at its directors meeting cut its quarterly dividend from 2 to 1 per cent.

A telegram from London states that the Canadian Securities Company, with a capital of \$300,000, has been formed. The directors of the Montreal Street Railway last week were \$71,160, an increase of \$12,000 over the same week last year.

J. Pierpont Morgan told friends that the worst of the financial storm was over and that he was very confident as to the future.

The directors of the Boston and Montreal Copper Company declared a quarterly dividend of 10¢ as against a former dividend of 12¢.

The Kullbacker Trust company, New York, which suspended pay 50 per cent. dividends. The stock was last quoted at 1,175 bid and 1,310 asked.

Montreal hears that the quarterly dividend of the Richfield & Ontario Navigation Co., concerning which there has been a good deal of speculation, owing to its marked slump in the stock, will be declared at the board meeting to be held November 14th. It is payable December 1st.

The annual statement of the Montreal Street Railway Company for the year ending September 30th, which was issued this afternoon, shows that the gross earnings for the year amounted to \$1,000,000, as compared with \$2,100,000 for 1906; operating expenses were \$2,200,000, as against \$1,520,719. Net earnings \$1,520,997, as compared with \$1,245,786.

Use Indians on War Path.

Washington, Oct. 25.—The tribe of Ute Indians which more than a year ago wandered away from their reservation in Utah and created trouble in Colorado and Wyoming, by threatening to take the warpath and raid ranches, is reported to have again broken out on the Cheyenne River reservation in South Dakota, where the tribe was given temporary quarters.

At the request of the secretary of the interior the war department ordered troops from Fort Meade, S. D., to the scene of the trouble. The character of the outbreak is not known here.

TO REDUCE THE SIZE OF LOAF OF BREAD.
