MAN'S HAND BLOWN OFF BY BOMB IN TRAIN.

Found it Under Seat and Was Throwing it Away When /Explosion Occurred.

The bomb exploded, blowing off his hand and slightle injuring a enard in the service of the federal

The police authorities, who were immediately advised, opened an inquiry into the matter, and the train was inspected by the police. The injured man was taken to the Sion Infirmary, According to later details, the bomb exploded at the moment when two expresses were standing in the station. The traveller in the Lausanne express noticed an infernal machine shaped like a bottle, and with a lighted fuse in it, under the seat. He had seized it in order to throw it out of the window, when it exploded with

The victim's name is M. Gindraux, proprietor of an hotel at Zermatt. His hand was torn off and he received severe injuries in different parts of his hody. The guard was struck on the emple by a fragment of the bomb. The outrage is supposed to be the work of anarchists.
