ESKIMOS CANNIBALS

UNGAVA NATIVES FORCED TO EAT HUMAN FLESH.

Many Die of Starvation—Crew of a Newfoundland Vessel Discover Thirty Skeletons on the Beaches.

St. John's, Nfld., Oct. 29.—Cannibalism has been reported to by the Eskimos in the Ungava Bay district and on the shores of Hudson Strait, according to Rev. Mr. Stewart, an Anglican missionary to the Ungava Bay Eskimos.

Recently the crew of a Newfoundland vessel, which was in Ungava Bay, discovered thirty skeletons lying on the beaches.
