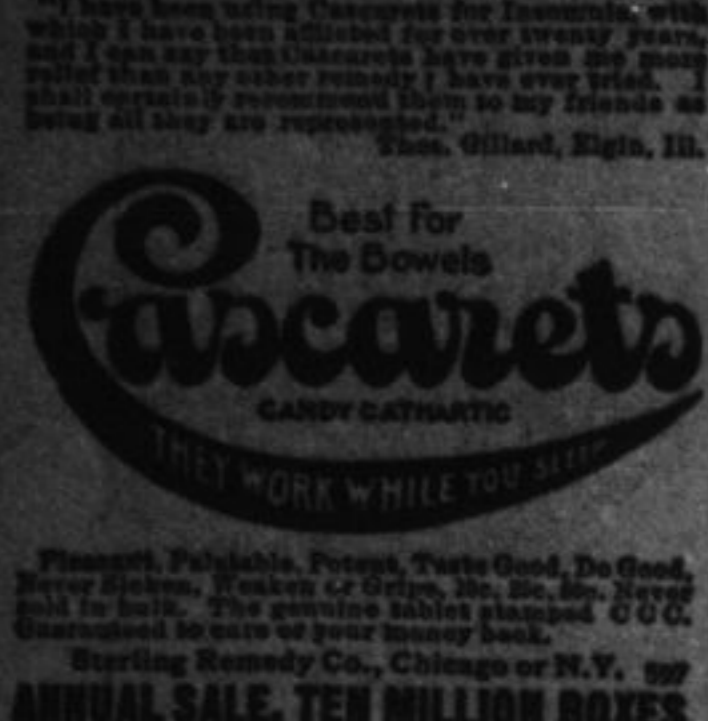

The English Peasants Helping the Poor.
