Synopsis of Canadian Northwest

HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.
Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the North-West Provinces, excepting 3 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person the sole head of a family, or male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 100 acres, more or less.

Application for homestead entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency. Entry by proxy may, however, be made at an Agency on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader.

An application for entry or cancellation made personally at any sub-agency office may be filed to the Agent by the Sub-agent, at the expense of the applicant, and if the land applied for is vacant on receipt of the telegram such application is to have priority and the land will be held until the necessary papers to complete the transaction are received by mail.

In case of "personation" or fraud the applicant will forfeit all priority of claim or if entry has been granted it will be summarily cancelled.

An application for cancellation must be made in person. The applicant must be eligible for homestead entry, and only one application for cancellation will be received from an individual until that application has been disposed of.

Where an entry is cancelled subsequent to institution of cancellation proceedings, the applicant for cancellation will be entitled to prior right of entry.

Applicant for cancellation must state in what particulars the homesteader is in default.

A homesteader whose entry is not the subject of cancellation proceedings may subject to the approval of the Department, relinquish it in favor of father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister if eligible, but to no other person without declaration of abandonment.

DUTIES.—A settler is required to perform the duties by him of the following plans—

- (1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years.
- (2) A homesteader may, if he so desires, perform the required residence duties by living on his land, owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of his homestead, or on any other land he may acquire by purchase, which will not meet this requirement.
- (3) If the father or mother, if the father is deceased, or homesteader has permanent residence on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of the homestead, or upon a homestead entered for by him, in the vicinity, such homesteader may perform his own residence duties by living with the father or mother.
- (4) The term "vicinity" in the two preceding paragraphs is defined as meaning not more than nine miles in a direct line, exclusive of the width of roads and all ways crossed in the measurement.
- (5) A homesteader intending to perform his residence duties in accordance with the above while living with parents or on farming land owned by himself, must notify the Agent for his district of such intention.

Before making application for patent the settler must give six months' notice in writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of his intention to do so.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST MINING REGULATIONS.
COAL.—Coal mining rights may be leased for a period of twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1 per acre. Not more than 2,000 acres shall be leased to one individual on any one tract. The rate of five cents per ton shall be collected on the merchantable coal mined QUANTITY.—A person eighteen years of age or over, having discovered minerals in place, may locate a claim 1,500x1,500 feet.

The fee for recording a claim is \$5. At least \$100 must be expended on the claim, either year or paid to the mining recorder in lieu thereof. Then a lease has been extended or renewed, the locator must have a survey made and upon complying with the requirements, purchase the land at \$1 per acre.

The patent provides for the payment of a royalty of 24 per cent on the sales. Placer mining claims generally are 100 feet square; entry fee \$5, renewable yearly.

An applicant may obtain two leases to dredge for gold of five miles each for a term of twenty years, renewable at the discretion of the Minister of the Interior.

The lessee shall have a dredge in operation during one season from the date of the lease for each five miles. Rental \$10 per annum for each mile of river leased. Royalty at the rate of 24 per cent collected on the output after it exceeds \$10,000.

Tips For The Farmers

A visitor in the city this week, made the remark that Kingston had a very large market. According to the statement of "old-timers," however, the attendance is not nearly as large as a few years ago.

"I remember the time when Brock street, as far up as Wellington Street, was crowded with rigs," said one farmer.

"Would it not be a good thing for Kingston to have a market now just like it was in the olden days? We want all the farmers. Kingston has room for everybody."

A large amount of the pressed hay, shipped down to Quebec early in the season, is now finding its way back to this district, owing to the scarcity of feed.

The cheese board did not meet this week owing to the holiday. The board will meet on Thursday next at 1.30 p.m. Farmers are again asked to board hogs. Boom the hog board.

Will feed be cheaper in the spring? That's the question that is now being asked.

If you have hogs for sale, board them at the Kingston hog board. They will not "squel" on you.

"Do not sacrifice your best stock; hold on to every good animal you can carry through," summarizes the advice given by Duncan Anderson, the well-known Farmers' Institute lecturer, on his return from the eastern provinces.

"Two years ago," said Mr. Anderson, "conditions in the maritime provinces were much the same as in Ontario to-day. Feed was short, and the people sacrificed their cattle to such an extent that now they are not able to make their way naturally, and to buy a cow or a pig, one must resort to something like a similar sacrifice in Ontario with a reasonable certainty that there will be very high prices for dairy products next year. While it would be better to sell, even at very low prices, scrubby which are unprofitable at any time, it would be the height of folly to sacrifice a good animal if there is feed enough in the barn to carry it through."

"The cost of feeding can, too," Mr. Anderson went on, "be reduced very much below that which is ordinarily incurred. I remember some thirty-six years ago, when conditions were exactly the same as now, a number of farmers bought oil cake, diluted it, and sprinkled it over the straw when the latter was being fed to cattle. Every bit of the straw thus treated naturally bought the ingredients only and mixed them at home. A FINANCIAL POWER.

In His Section of the United States.
Senator James Piper Taliaferro, United States Senator from Florida, was born at Orange Court house, Virginia, on September 30th, 1847. He was given an ordinary common school education and served as private in the Confederate army during the Civil War. After the war Senator Taliaferro went to Jacksonville, Florida, and went into the lumber business, becoming a practical logger and saw-mill operator. He was very successful and branched out into the banking business, becoming a financial power in his section of his state. He was chairman of the democratic executive committee of his state for three years. His home is in Jacksonville.

"It is my firm opinion that the present talk about butter-going as high as 40c, and 50c, a pound is all nonsense," said J. A. Buddick, dairy commissioner, recently to a representative of the Ottawa Valley Journal.

"Butter can be bought in the old country to-day for 25c. a pound, and landed in Canada at a cost of 4c. a pound for duty and 1c. a pound for handling, making the total cost per pound less than 30c. Many people in Canada imagine that Great Britain is absolutely dependant on its imports for dairy produce, manufacturing little or none of it. The fact is that in Great Britain the year's manufacture of cheese will total 150,000 tons, while in Ireland there are 500 creameries which will produce during this year to the value of \$30,000,000, two-thirds of which is creamery. The total production of butter and cheese in the British Isles is twice as much as in Canada. Of course it can all be used right at home, but the dealers there are like all other dealers; if they can get a higher price in Canada they will export to us as quickly as they will import from us for profit. The same is true with Australia and New Zealand. Butter from these countries can be laid down in Canada for not more than they are paying the factories here. Of course, one cannot judge future market conditions accurately, but these are my firm impressions."

Produce And Prices.
Kingston, Nov. 2.—Prices were quoted to the Whig, to-day, as follows:
Flour and feed—Flour, bakers' \$2.70 to \$2.90; farmers' \$2.70 to \$2.90; Hungarian patent, \$3 to \$3.10; oatmeal and rolled oats, \$4.40 to \$4.50; cornmeal, \$1.65 to \$1.75; bran, \$25 to \$28 per ton; shorts, \$26 to \$27 per ton; straw, \$12 to \$13; hay, loose, \$18 to \$20; pressed, \$18 to \$19. This does not look like bad times for Ontario farm lands.

Church Advertising.

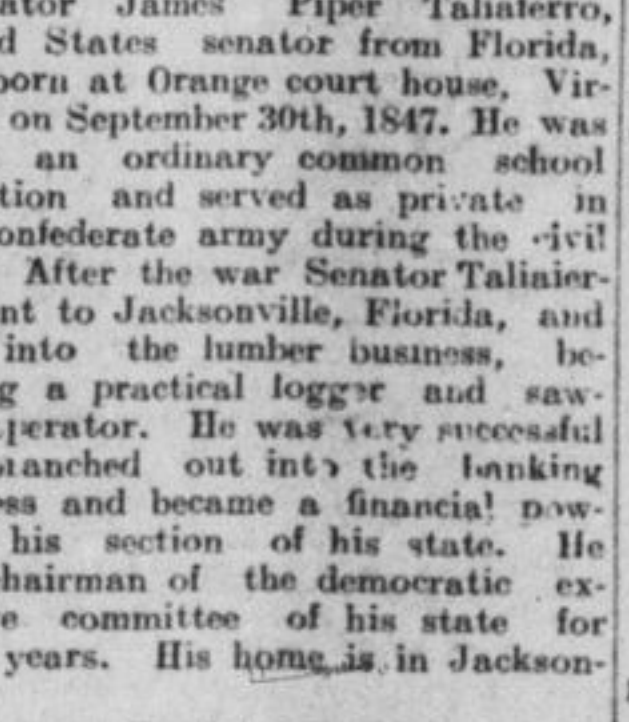
