APPORTIONING THE COST

Of the Queen Street Sewer Extension.

There was a meeting yesterday afternoon of the special committee appointed by the city council to apportion the cost of the sewer extension. Mayor Mowat and Ald. Gaskin, Elliott, Chown and Toye were present. The whole cost of the sewer will be under \$4,000, or \$500 less than the estimate. The cost of the light and power committee and the board of works were both heard, the mayor acting as arbitrator. The board of works' representatives held that the light plant was responsible for the nuisance, in the sewer which consisted of tar and oil, and should pay the whole cost of the remedy. The light committee representatives opened their case, claiming that the general sewage of the city entering the Queen street sump was as much a nuisance as the tar and oil. The mayor, it is understood, apportioned the cost to each committee at about equal.

To Honor a Staunch Friend.

Gannaque, Ont., Nov. 12.—The corporation of Gannaque, Ont., in honor of the late Mr. J. M. Platt, who died on the 10th inst., will present a silver casket to the town of Gannaque, his father's home and his own in childhood, a clock tower, costing over \$10,000 and which will be placed in the Grand Opera House, which will be opened for the first time on this occasion. The presentation will be made by Mayor Lieut.-Col. J. A. McCann, being carried by a banquet at the Provincial hotel.

MOVING HIS FAMILY.

Marlbank, Nov. 11.—George Woodhouse, Tweed, intends to move his family here, where he is employed as timekeeper and freight agent for the Canadian Portland Cement company. Miss Jean Armstrong, who is at St. Agnes' Ladies College, Belleville, is visiting her home for a few days. John Toppings, a former resident of Marlbank, was killed in a collision between two cars. Mr. Toppings was a brother of Mrs. Delbert Murphy, and had been employed as brickman on the P. R. Thomas street. His death is a family misfortune. Mr. Toppings was doing some work for the Canadian Portland Cement company.

St. Pierre in Darkness.

Halifax, N.S., Nov. 12.—A dispatch from St. Pierre says the town is in total darkness, and will likely remain so for some time, the result of an accident to the engine. That no loss of life occurred is almost a miracle, as when the machinery went wrong, parts of it were hurled with great force, tearing out a portion of the power house, and wrecking it to the extent of \$2,500. The accident occurred near midnight, when the streets in the vicinity of the electric station were deserted, or there would have been some deaths.

Shot in Mistake For Deer.

Peterboro, Nov. 12.—Lying in St. Joseph's Hospital in a serious condition is William Cones, as a result of being shot in the thigh by his cousin, Roy Cones, who mistook him for a deer. The party was hunting in the vicinity of Deer Bay. Hearing twigs cracking and catching a glimpse of what he thought was a deer, Roy Cones fired. William Cones received the bullet just below the left hip, the missile coming out near the right hip.

Western School Lands.

Winnipeg, Nov. 12.—W. M. Ingram, commissioner of school lands has returned from Esbarn, Man., where he had been holding a sale of school lands. A little over 7,000 acres were disposed of at \$69.55, or an average of almost \$10 per acre. In two sales held at Russell and Rossburn over \$160,000 was realized from 16,000 acres.

SHE KNEW FATHER

HOW HE CAME OUT AS METHODIST MINISTER.

Hopes the Son Who Becomes a Minister of the Crown May Be Good and Wear a Crown Some Day.

Peterboro Examiner.

A day or two ago, the Examiner had an interesting conversation with Mrs. Andrew Huyck, Hastings, paying a visit to the city. Mrs. Huyck is one of the pioneers of Percy township, where she settled, with her husband, in 1842, and though she has reached the venerable age of eighty-four years, many of them difficult with the hardships and hard toil of pioneer life, she is, physically as robust as an oak, and as alert in intellect, as young in spirit, as many a modern woman of half her age—like Moses, at his end, "her sight is not dimmed nor her natural force abated."

Mrs. Huyck is a keen politician, and a "Grit," of the deepest dye. She took an intense interest in the East Northumberland by-election, whose loss to the Hon. G. P. Graham, minister of railways and canals.

"Why, I knew his father well. We only lived half a mile from Andrew Graham, George's grandfather. He lived in the 'Backwoods of Percy,' in the 10th concession. He came with his family from Ireland, sixty-seven years ago. The family originally came from Ireland. George's father, William Henry, was converted when he was about twenty-five or twenty-eight years of age. I think the revival meetings were held in Flemming's log school house, which was on a corner of our farm, either there or in a log school house about two miles away on the Trent, that was in the 13th concession."

"Wasn't that a good distance to go?"

"Bless your heart, no! I we'd hitch the oxen to the sleigh and away we'd skid over the crooked roads, and through the woods to the meeting. We'd put straw in the bottom of the sleigh, pile in as many as it would hold, all sitting on the straw, without seats, with quilts over us to keep us warm. I tell you those were happy days—going to those meetings. Everybody worked hard, had good health, and was contented. It was like living, compared to these times. Then we'd—O, yes, George Graham's father was converted at one of these meetings, which were conducted by N. A. Howard, an Episcopal Methodist preacher—that was before they joined the union—and a grand man he was."

Well, William Henry when he was converted, felt he was called to the ministry. Brother Howard gave him a license as "exhorter," or "local preacher." He had a high school education, but he was an awful smart man, and a good speaker. All the education he got then was got in the log school-house on our place."

"What was it?"

"Why, it wasn't much to look at. The slanting desks ran around the outside walls, with the seats made of slabs, flat side up, and with legs put on."

PAID NINE YEAR DEBT.

Got Seventy-five Cents From Rich Stranger.

Woodstock, Ont., Nov. 12.—Monday morning a big, well dressed, prosperous-looking stranger, walked into the Oxford house, one of the leading hotels, and paid the clerk seventy-five cents, which he said was due for lodging and breakfast nine years ago. "Nine years ago," he said, "I stayed here and had my breakfast. I was broke, and I skipped out without paying. Since then I have been all over the world, but never until today have I had the opportunity of personally paying the debt here. Six months after the occurrence I could have signed a cheque for \$30,000. My conscience has been troubled at these years, but now I will get some peace." With those words he put seventy-five cents on the counter and was gone before any questions could be asked. Enquiries later did not locate the man in the city, and it is impossible to learn anything of his identity.
