**THE CEREMONY BARRED.**  
Refuses to Marry Miss Vanderbilt and Count.

New York, Nov. 14.—Archbishop Farley let it be known, yesterday, that under no circumstances will he perform the marriage ceremony of Count Laslo Saebenyi and Miss Gladys Vanderbilt on December 10th next. Besides his grace will not permit any bishop or priest in the diocese to perform the ceremony unless such ceremony shall precede any similar form before a priest or minister of another faith, or the signing of a civil contract of marriage.

The archbishop strongly disapproves of mixed marriages, and has never performed the marriage ceremony except when the man and woman have both been Catholics.

Drawing a line even against a civil contract of marriage preceding the Roman Catholic service, as Archbishop Farley does, will surprise a great many persons. A civil marriage and then a religious one has been the accepted rule in France, and other foreign countries for centuries. Monsignor Lavelle was asked to explain this stand.

"This is America," answered he. "No ceremony is so sacred as that of the church. Therefore, nothing must precede it or be put on a plane with its dignity."

**DOG SAVES MASTER'S LIFE.**  
Man in Quicksand Was Almost Engulfed.

New York, Nov. 14.—John Cronin came precious near being swallowed by quicksand on the woods near North Arlington, N.J., yesterday. Cronin was up to his neck—or down to his neck—in the quicksand when he was saved.

## Synopsis of Canadian Homestead Regulations

Any even numbered lands in Manitoba, Province, accepting 8 acres, may be homesteaded by the sole head of a family over 18 years of age, male-quarter section, 40 or less.

Application for homestead may be made in person by the applicant, or by proxy, at an Agency on certificate of the father, mother, son, or sister of an intestate.

An application for entry made previously at office may be varied to suit circumstances.

Entry by proxy may be made at the Agency on certificate of the father, mother, son, or sister of an intestate.

An application for entry made previously at office may be varied to suit circumstances.

Where an entry is made on receipt of the telegraphic notice to have priority, the land will be held until the transaction is complete.

In case of "personal" application will forfeit all or if entry has been summarily cancelled.

An application for cancellation of a homestead certificate may be made by the applicant or by a person entitled to the land, or by a person who has been appointed receiver of the land, or by a person who has been appointed receiver of the land, or by a person who has been appointed receiver of the land.

A homesteader whose certificate is cancelled is subject to the appointment, re-issuance of it in favor of his wife, or daughter, if eligible, but to no other declaration of abandonment.

WEST MINING CANADA

COAL—Coal mining leases for a period of not more than 2000 acres, one individual or company the rate of five cents per acre on the merchant's price or over, having the place, may locate a lease.

The fee for recording a lease for a period of not more than 2000 acres, claim each year of \$10 per annum for each acre, plus a royalty of 25 per cent on the net proceeds of the coal.

An applicant may dredge for gold of five acres in the territory of the Minister.

The lease shall have effect within one season of the lease for each \$10 per annum for each acre, plus a royalty of 25 per cent on the net proceeds of the coal.
