THE 5 P.M. EDITION AT COUNTY COUNCIL

JAIL SURGEON PRESENTS HIS REPORT.

Says Jail is Not the Place For Aged Woman Sent There Recently—Some Statistics Given.

At the opening session of the county council on Tuesday afternoon, Warden Drew presided, and all the members were present, with the exception of Councillors Fisher and Aylsworth, the latter being confined to his home, owing to illness.

Several communications and accounts were received and referred to the proper committees.

On motion of Councillors Miller and McDonald, a resolution was passed, expressing the sincere regret felt by the members at the long-continued illness of Councillor John Aylsworth, reeve of Kingston township.

When the council met on Wednesday morning, the clerk read a letter from R. H. Fair, applying for position of road overseer. No action was taken on this, for the present.

On motion of Councillors Franklin and Briceford, grants were made as follows: General Hospital, \$1,000; Hotel Dieu, \$700; Infants' Home, \$100; Orphans' Home, \$100.

On motion of Councillor Wood, seconded by Councillor Thomson, Thomas D. Minna was appointed auditor for the year 1908.

An interesting report was submitted by the jail surgeon, Dr. Edwards. The doctor stated that since his appointment as jail physician, he had made 132 official visits to the jail.

"There are at present in the jail, sixteen male prisoners and one female," read the report. "I would respectfully call your attention to the fact that the number of male prisoners is apparently about ninety years of age. The jail does not appear to me to be a suitable place for those whose only crime against the state, is their inability to do the work of their infirmities which come with advancing age."

Dr. Edwards reported that there were no cases of contagious or infectious diseases in the jail, and furnished the council with some statistics. From October 1st, 1907, 109 prisoners were committed to the jail, of whom twelve were from the county of Frontenac. Of the twelve committed from the county, one was not inside the jail, two were in for one day, and four were in for four days or less. In other words, only five from Frontenac county served out sentences in the jail during the year. The aggregate number of days in jail for all the prisoners, during the year ending September 30th, 1907, was 3,462. The aggregate number of days in jail of all the county prisoners was 129.

Among the communications was one from P. M. Lawson, clerk of Loughboro council, requesting the council to pass a by-law, empowering the Loughboro council to establish a road at the corner of the Ed Lake road, at a width of forty feet.

The council adjourned at 11:30 o'clock, on Wednesday morning, until 2 p.m., for the benefit of the road and bridge committee.

The note from the girls of St. John's school, Kingston-on-Thames, was handed to Inspector King, who in turn passed it on to Miss Lovick, principal of Louise school. This school, at one time called Johnson street school, was renamed by the Princess Louise, who visited the school during her visit here about thirty years ago. Also Louise has the largest percentage of girls of any school in the city.

The Board of Education will give a silk flag to be sent to England and picture poets showing the principal schools and other buildings here will be sent to the St. John's girls. The children at the school here are very pleased with the thought of the girls in Kingston-on-Thames.

A meeting of the local council of women was held in the city council chamber on Tuesday afternoon, when some routine business was disposed of. The most interesting part of the proceedings was the reading of a report of the last annual meeting of the national council, which was held at Victoria, B.C. This report was prepared by Miss Nan Skinner, and read by Mrs. William Skinner. The report reviewed the work of the various sessions, and the whole tone of it went to show that great interest was being taken in the work, and that the various councils were doing good work. The president, Mrs. Hugh Fraser, occupied the chair at the meeting.

The court of appeals yesterday unanimously declared the act unconstitutional, but in its opinion points out that Hearst has still a sufficient remedy in the quo warranto suit now pending.

MAKE GOOD OVERDRAFT.

This is What Government is Asked to Do.

Montreal, Nov. 20.—The statement was made, to-day, by a banking official of high standing, that Hon. Mr. Fisher, on the occasion of his recent visit to Montreal, did not make any arrangement with the Canadian Bankers' Association with reference to providing funds to facilitate the movement of the non-returned drafts and was not asked to do so.

The bank official said, could manage matters of that kind themselves without outside assistance. What the government was asked to do was to make response, in a practical way, to the many demands which have been made on it to make its overdrafts. The government, he said, had no right to default on its payments especially at a time like the present, when those who could but would not should be made to pay.

OCURRENCES RECOUNTED IN BRIEF FORM.

Abbot Gaspert, president of the English Benedictines, has arrived in Rome to undertake another revision of the Vulgate, or St. Jerome's Latin version of the Bible.

At Toronto the climax in the Law mining case was reached when Frank Law and W. Lockhard Russell were indicted for conspiracy and Frank Law taken into custody.

Despatches from New England industrial centres show a further curtailment of working hours, due to the scarcity of currency and to a falling off in the demand for goods.

St. George's Society, Ottawa, has sent a protest to the minister of justice against the uses made of the Union Jack in advertising. A few samples were enclosed for the minister's perusal.

As the result of this season's football, the Ottawa University Association's books will show about \$1,800 to be taken into custody.

George Crocker, of Millerton, N.B., who for two years had charge of a ranch near Denver, Col., was drowned in a lake there, on Monday.

The shock of the news killed his mother, Mrs. David Crocker, who was spending the winter with him.

Though a proclamation was issued some time ago declaring that the royal mint would be opened on November 9th, it has since been declared closed by the British authorities till January 1st, 1908, when it will be opened for business. The reason assigned for this delay is that the fence around the mint is not yet completed.

HIS HEAD CRUSHED.

A Fatal Accident at a Quebec Wharf.

Quebec, Nov. 20.—A fatal accident occurred, this morning, aboard the S.S. Aramoor, at King's wharf. A laborer, named P. Labbe, residing at 47 Sault au Mathlot street, had his head frightfully crushed by a large coal discharging tube, which fell accidentally upon him, and was killed instantly.

The coroner was immediately notified and an inquest will take place to-morrow morning at the morgue. Labbe was thirty-five years of age, and leave a large family.

Operator Held Up.

Bridgeburg, Ont., Nov. 20.—A robber entered the station of the Grand Trunk railway, at Stevensville, about 11:30 last night, and forced the night operator, William Hodgson, to part with twenty-one dollars all the money he had in his possession.

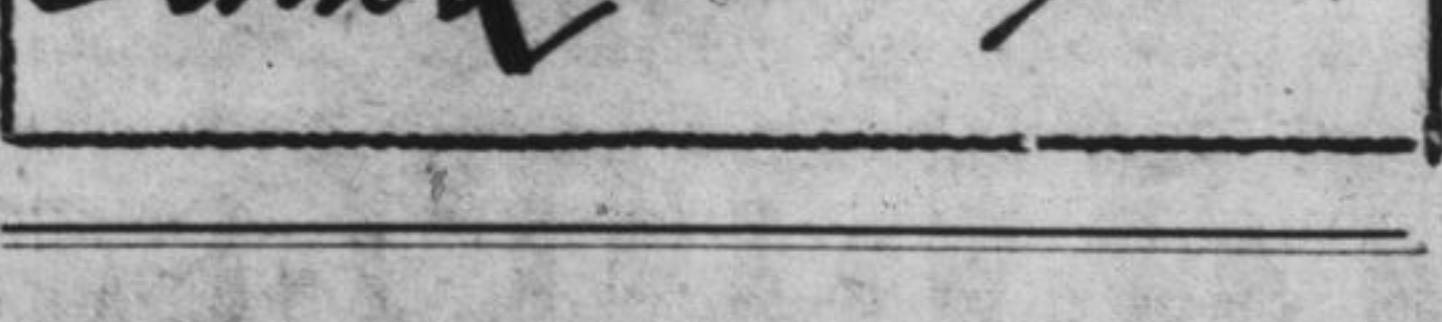
