Application for homestead entry must be made in person by the applicant at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency. Entry by proxy may be made by an agent on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader.

An application for entry or cancellation made personally at any sub-agency office may be wired to the Agent by the Sub-agent, at the expense of the applicant, and if the land applied for is vacant on receipt of the telegram such application is to have priority and the land will be held until the necessary papers to complete the transaction are received by mail.

In case of "personation" or fraud the applicant will forfeit all rights of claim or if entry has been granted it will be summarily cancelled.

An application for cancellation must be made in person. The applicant must be eligible for homestead entry and the application for cancellation will be received from an individual under that application has been disposed of.

Where an entry is cancelled subsequent to institution of cancellation proceedings the applicant for cancellation will be entitled to prior right of entry.

Applicant for cancellation must state in what particular the homesteader is in default.

A homesteader whose entry is not the subject of cancellation proceedings may, subject to the approval of the Department, relinquish it in favor of father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister, if eligible, but to no one else, on filing Declaration of abandonment.

DUTIES.—An applicant required to perform the duties under one of the following provisions:

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years.

(2) A homesteader may, if he so desires, perform the duties in the way of duties by living on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, or the way of duties by joint ownership in land with a homesteader, joint ownership in land with a homesteader, or upon a homestead entered for by him in the vicinity, such homesteader may perform his own residence duties by living with the father or mother.

(3) The term "vicinity" in the two preceding paragraphs is defined as meaning not more than six miles in a direct line, exclusive of the width of road allowance crossed in the measurement.

(4) A homesteader intending to perform his residence duties in accordance with the above while living with a parent or on farming land owned by himself must notify the Agent for the district of such intention.

Before making application for patent the settler must give six months' notice in writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of his intention to do so.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST MINING REGULATIONS. GOLD.—Cost mining rights may be leased for a period of twenty years at an annual rental of \$1 per acre. Not more than 2,500 acres shall be leased to one individual or company. Royalty at the rate of five cents per ton shall be collected on the marketable coal mined.

QUARIES.—A person eighteen years of age or over, having discovered mineral in place, may locate a claim 1,000 ft. square.

The fee for recording a claim is \$5. At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year or paid to the mining recorder in lieu thereof. When the year has expired or paid, the locator may upon having a survey made, and upon complying with other requirements, purchase the land at \$1 per acre.

The patent provides for the payment of a royalty of 2 1/2 per cent on the sales. Placer mining claims generally are 100 feet square; entry fee \$5, renewable yearly.

An applicant may obtain two leases to stodge for gold of five miles each for a term of twenty years, renewable at the discretion of the Minister of the Interior.

The lease shall have a dredge in operation within one season from the date of the lease for each five miles. Rental \$10 per annum for each five miles river leased. Royalty at the rate of 2 1/2 per cent collected on the output after it exceeds \$10,000.

RESTRAINT FOR JUDGE
