Synopsis of Canadian Northwest

HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, or any one Province, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person the sole head of a family, who is over 21 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, or 160 acres, more or less.

Application for homestead entry must be made in the office of the Superintendent of Lands Agency or Sub-agency. Entry by proxy is allowed, but not at an Agency on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, or sister of a homesteader.

An application for entry or cancellation made personally at any sub-agency office may be wired to the Agent by the applicant, and if the applicant is in receipt of the telegram such application is to have priority, and the land will be held until the necessary papers to complete the transaction are received by the Agent.

In case of "personation" or fraud the applicant will forfeit all priority of claim or if entry has been granted it will be summarily cancelled.

An application for cancellation must be made in person. The applicant must be eligible for homestead entry, and only one application for cancellation will be received from an individual or company. When an entry is cancelled subsequent to institution of cancellation proceedings, the applicant for cancellation will be entitled to prior right of entry.

Applicant for cancellation must state in what particulars the homesteader is in default.

A homesteader whose entry is not the subject of cancellation proceedings may, subject to the approval of Department, relinquish it in favor of father, mother, son, or daughter, or sister, if eligible, but to no one else, on filing Declaration of abandonment.

DUTIES.—A settler is required to perform the duties under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years.

(2) A homesteader may, if he desires, perform the required residence duties by living on farming land owned solely by him, but less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of his homestead, or by himself and his homesteaded, joint ownership in land must meet this requirement.

(3) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) is a settler, and he has permanent residence on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of the homestead, or upon a homestead entered for by him in the vicinity, such homesteader may perform his own residence duties by living with the father (or mother).

(4) The term "vicinity" in the two preceding paragraphs is defined as meaning not more than nine miles in a direct line, exclusive of the width of road allowance crossed, or the width of waterway.

(5) A homesteader intending to perform his residence duties by means of the above while living with parents or on farming land owned by himself must notify the Agent for the district of such intention.

Before making application for patent the settler must give six months' notice in writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of his intention to do so.

WEST MINING REGULATIONS.

COAL.—Coal mining rights may be leased for a period of twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1 per acre. Not more than 2,500 acres shall be leased to one individual or company. A royalty at the rate of one per cent shall be collected on the merchantable coal mined.

QUARTZ.—A person eighteen years of age or over, having discovered mineral placers, may locate a claim 1,500 ft. x 150 ft.

The fee for recording a claim is \$5.

At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year or paid to the mining recorder in lieu thereof, or the claim shall be forfeited and the locator may upon having a survey made, and upon complying with the requirements, purchase the land at \$1 per acre.

The patent provided for the payment of a royalty of 2 1/2 per cent on the sales of placer mining claims generally are 100 feet square, or for less, renewable year by year.

An applicant may obtain two leases to a tract of gold of five miles each for a term of twenty years, renewable at the discretion of the Minister of the Interior.

The leases shall have a dredge to operation within one season from the date of the lease for each five miles. Rental \$10 per annum for each mile of river leased. Royalty at the rate of 2 1/2 per cent collected on the output after it exceeds \$10,000.

MYSTERY REVEALED

AN AGED TRAPPER TELLS OF A TRIPLE MURDER.

Says He Was Eyewitness of Slaying of Three Canadians By a Hunter Forty Years Ago.

Kinoe, Me., Nov. 26.—From the village of St. Mary's, Canada, comes a report that Pierre Le Chance, an old-time trapper, when on his deathbed, had revealed to the parish priest his knowledge of a triple murder that occurred just forty years ago last September. Le Chance, at the time of the murder, was known as Peter Laabon. He was one of a number of hunters who frequented the big woods at the upper end of Moose Head lake at the time of the murder, and while all who knew him were confident that he did not have a hand in the killing, he was reported to have said on several occasions that he could tell something about it, but did not do so for fear of death.

The victims of the mysterious murder were James and William Owen, of St. George, Canada, and Louis Duplax, of St. Francis, a neighboring hamlet. All three had been working in the lumber camps in the vicinity of Moose Head, since September 13th, 1867, bound for their homes, with about \$1,000 between them, the season's earnings. At St. Francis, awaiting mail, were the three men, Veilleux, the acknowledged belle for miles around.

The three lumbermen were going through their work by canoe, but when they failed to arrive after a wait of some weeks, a party of Canadian neighbors came down to Moose Head to search for them. Early in November, a short distance in the woods, the bodies of the three men were found under their blankets on a bed of fir boughs. The remains were in an advanced stage of decomposition, but it was found that they had been slain by blows of a hunter's axe while they slept, and robbed of their earnings.

The bodies were taken to Canada for burial and were reported to the authorities, but has never been cleared up.

Salena Veilleux died of a broken heart soon after the discovery of the murder.

It is reported here that Le Chance told the priest he was an eyewitness of the murder, and accused a certain trapper who died near here about fifteen years ago.

CHOKED TO DEATH.

Glen Rowley Had Kernel of Corn in Windpipe.

Chicago, Nov. 26.—Glen Rowley, a six-year-old boy of Canton, Ill., died in the operating table at the Presbyterian hospital. Extension of Manitoba.

S. J. Jackson, M.P. for Selkirk, in a speech at Winnipeg, said: "It was only the compulsory attendance of the Earl of Dufferin at the Colonial Conference that prevented the extension being made at the last session of Parliament. The extension of the boundary had been practically agreed upon under the map of the agreement it would extend along the eastern boundary of Saskatchewan to the sixtieth parallel, thence easterly to Hudson Bay, then southward to the Perch and Churchill and Churchill River, York Factory and Nelson River as far down as James Bay, thence along the waterway to a point 100 miles east of Port Portage, leaving a substantial area on the eastern side of Kewatin to be annexed to Ontario. This will add 200,000 square miles to the province of Manitoba, and will make her of a larger total area than Saskatchewan. I expect the bill giving effect to this will be introduced at the next session. It is proposed that, if Mr. Oliver's land bill goes through, the money received from the sale of the pre-emptions shall be devoted to the construction of the Hudson's Bay railway as a government enterprise. Other roads would have funding rights, and this would be of inestimable value to all of Western Canada."

ALL TO SHARE ALIKE

PROPOSED CHANGES IN CARNEGIE PENSION FUND.

Professors in State and Sectarian Universities to Be Admitted to Its Benefits—Statement of Principal Peterson of McGill.

Montreal, Nov. 26.—Principal Peterson of McGill has returned from New York, where he was attending the third annual meeting of the Carnegie Pension Fund committee, of which he is a member. In an interview he told of the work and future plans of that committee. At present state and provincial universities are not allowed to share in the benefits of the fund, the founder holding that if the state can establish a university it ought to be able to maintain it. The committee, however, find that about half of the colleges in America are under state or provincial control, and to exclude these from the benefits of the fund is to divide the colleges into two factions. With the idea of standardizing education and putting all the professors on an equal footing the committee has decided to recommend that professors of all colleges should be treated alike. This will be finally decided at the next meeting of the committee.

Principal Peterson pointed out that if this were done the professors of Toronto University would share in the fund, and institutions like McMaster and other sectarian colleges would also be benefited.
