WEST MINING REGULATIONS. COAL—Coal mining rights may be leased for a period of twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1 per acre. Not more than 2,500 acres shall be leased to one individual or company. A royalty at the rate of five cents per ton shall be collected on the merchantable coal mined QUARTZ—A person eighteen years of age or over, having discovered minetal in place, may locate a claim 1,500x1,500 feet.

The see for recording a claim is \$5.

At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year or paid to the mining recorder in lieu thereof. When \$500 has been expended or paid, the locator may spon having a survey made, and upon somplying with other requirements, purchase the land at \$1 per acre.

The patent provides for the payment of a royalty of \$2 per cent on the sales. Placer mining claims generally are 100 feet square; entry see \$5, renewable yearly.


